





About LACDA

1982 – The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors (Board) consolidated the Housing Authority, Community Development Department, and the Redevelopment Agency to form the Community Development Commission of the County of Los Angeles (CDC)

Until April 2019, the agency was comprised of two separate legal entities, the CDC and the Housing Authority of the County of Los Angeles (HACoLA), both of which were part of the County family, but were independent agencies and not County Departments

2019 – On April 9, 2019, the Board approved the merger of the CDC and HACoLA into one legal entity. As of May 16, 2019, the agency was renamed the Los Angeles County Development Authority (LACDA)



Rental Subsidy Programs

One of 19 Public Housing Agencies in Los Angeles County, serving the unincorporated areas and 62 incorporated cities

- 3,229 public and affordable units at 68 sites
 - Three major public housing communities:
 Carmelitos (713 units), Nueva Maravilla
 (504 units), and Harbor Hills (301 units)
- 23,000+ Section 8 Housing Choice Vouchers
- 2,692 Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing Vouchers
- 1,827 Continuum of Care Vouchers linking rental assistance with supportive services for homeless individuals and families with disabilities

Ordinances

Collaborates with various County departments to help make housing more affordable for all residents

Rent Stabilization Ordinance (RSO)

In collaboration with Department of Consumer and Business Affairs


The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors (Board) enacted a temporary RSO for eligible rental units that limits rent increases and extends eviction protections

Mobile Home Ordinance

In collaboration with Department of Regional Planning, Department of Consumer and Business Affairs, Chief Executive Office, and County Counsel

 The Board also approved a motion to protect mobile home owners from unreasonable space rental adjustments





Housing Investment & Finance

Finances development and rehabilitation of affordable housing for renters, homeowners, and persons with special needs.

Home Ownership Program

Assisted 57 families in purchasing their first home in Fiscal Year (FY) 18-19, totaling \$3,686,540 in loans

Mortgage Credit Certificate Program

Reduced the federal income tax liability for 140 firsttime home buying families totaling \$48,037,155 in FY 18-19

Home Improvement and Handyworker Programs
Improved 72 units & provided 34 Handyworker grants in FY 18-19

Residential Sound Insulation Program

Provided sound insulation to 167 units in FY 18-19

Homelessness

Strategizes and collaborates to create innovative programs to combat homelessness, such as:

Homeless Initiative

- On February 9, 2016, the Board unanimously approved the Homeless Initiative, the most comprehensive effort to combat homelessness
- The LACDA is either the lead or collaborative partner in 27 of the 51 strategies


Homeless Incentive Program (HIP)

 Through the Homeless Initiative, HIP was created to incentivize landlords to rent units to homeless voucher holders



Homelessness (cont.)


Strategizes and collaborates to create innovative programs to combat homelessness, such as:

Bringing Families Home

- LACDA teamed up with Department of Children and Family Services to house homeless families and help them reunite with their children in foster care
- 107 families housed in FY 18-19

Accessory Dwelling Unit

- LACDA, along with the Arts Commission, Department of Regional Planning, and Public Works, worked together to create an ADU Pilot Program
- Program allowed homeowners to build ADUs in their backyard to house tenants who experienced homelessness



Community Development


Administers the largest Urban County Community Development Block Grant Program in the nation

- Over \$23.4 million in CDBG funds to distribute
 - Every \$1 in CDBG spent was leveraged with \$1.36 in local funding.


Works with five supervisorial districts, seven County departments, and 48 participating cities to assess local needs and identify funding priorities


 Community centers, senior centers, park facilities, streets, public spaces accessible to persons with disabilities
