







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Allegations by Mandated Reporter Type (Los Angeles: 2019)








All Children referred to child protection by Law Enforcement (Los Angeles: 2019)






All Children referred to child protection by Educators (Los Angeles: 2019)








All Children referred to child protection by Mental Health Professionals (Los Angeles: 2019)






All Children referred to child protection by Other Professionals (Los Angeles: 2019)




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All Children referred to child protection by CWS Personnel (Los Angeles: 2019)





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MALTREATMENT ALLEGATIONS

Allegations of maltreatment for Black children are the **most likely to be investigated**






Almost **25% of White children** in the California birth cohort were investigated by CPS by age 18



This compares to roughly


50% of Black and Native American children



GENERAL NEGLECT

was **a** removal reason in 87.6% of removals

What comes to mind when you think of general neglect?





Neglect is the most common formof child maltreatment, comprising75% of child maltreatment cases in the US

General neglect lacks a standard definition

Every state has its own statutory definition



California is one of five states with an expanded definition of neglect.

Expanded in definition, includes:

- (a) Emotional neglect
- (b) Physical neglect
- (c) Threat of harm

Expanded: includes more circumstances that constitute neglect, but also restrict the state's ability to intervene



SPOTLIGHT: Texas' General Neglect Reform

Texas passed legislation effective 9/1/2021 (H.B. 567) making **several changes** to its neglect statute

H.B. 567 changed the statutory definition of neglect which now stipulates that the caregiver must have **"blatant disregard"** for the safety of the child, which means their actions or failure to act are deliberate

Substantively, in the statute, the standard of "substantial risk" is raised to "immediate danger"





SPOTLIGHT: Texas' General Neglect Reform

"Neglect" means an act or failure to act by a person responsible for a child's care, custody, or welfare evidencing the person's blatant disregard for the consequences of the act or failure to act that results in harm to the child or that creates an immediate danger to the child's physical health or safety..."



SPOTLIGHT: Texas' General Neglect Reform

Immediately preceding and after the change in statute, entries into out-of-home care in Texas **began to decrease**

Early data suggest this reform is **contributing** to a reduction in removals





Structured Decision Making (SDM)

SDM is tool used in CA to assist social workers with consistent decision making based on California's child welfare statute



Unpacking Allegations with Specific SDM Hotline Data

Caregiver absence/abandonment	3.8%	1.6%
Threat of neglect	4.8%	3.0%
Prenatal substance abuse	3.2%	1.8%


THREAT OF NEGLECT: Prenatal Substance Abuse



A 2018 analysis of investigations of allegations of general neglect **alone** indicated:

Infants exposed to drugs during pregnancy – where there is an indication that the mother will continue to use – are **7 times more likely** to be placed in foster care

This pattern is true for Black families, and across all races





General Population Racial Disparity Indices: Los Angeles 2021







Community Prevention Linkages Program





Ramped up our efforts to address the disproportionality that **starts** with the report to the Child Protection Hotline

Safely defer Black families from DCFS to supportive services in communities

Core strategies include enhanced staff training and coaching

Goal was to increase by 20% - from 62 Black families referred per month to 75
