CALL TO ORDER: Ms. Nelson called the meeting to order at 1:16 pm followed by introductions and attendees' statements of their conflicts of interest. *Quorum was not achieved*.

II. PUBLIC COMMENT

OPPORTUNITY FOR PUBLIC TO ADDRESS COMMISSION ON ITEMS OF INTEREST WITHIN COMMISSION JURISDICTION: There were no comments.

III. COMMITTEE NEW BUSINESS ITEMS

4. OPPORTUNITY FOR COMMISSIONERS TO RECOMMEND ITEMS FOR FUTTURE AGENDAS, OR ITEMS REQUIRING IMMEDIATE ACTION DUE TO AN EMERGENCY, OR IF NEED FOR ACTION AROSE AFTER POSTING AGENDA: There were no items.

IV. REPORTS

- 5. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR/STAFF REPORT:
 - a. Committee Work Plan 2019:
 - Ms. Nelson noted the addition of an item to monitor President Trump's new plan to end AIDS, its potential funding, and the recently relaunched President's Advisory Council on HIV/AIDS (PACHA).
 - Cheryl Barrit, MPIA, Executive Director, was working with Commission Co-Chairs Al Ballesteros, MBA and Grissel Granados, MSW to schedule visits to the Board of Supervisors (BOS) to support the STD resolution.
 - b. County Advocacy Procedure: The memorandum in the packet on "Development of County Advocacy Positions" is a reminder that, as a body under the BOS, Commission positions are recommendations subject to the County vetting process.
 - c. Health Equity Assessment Worksheet:
 - Ms. Tolentino reported Ms. Barrit presented this at the last meeting and opened it for feedback. None was received.
 - Agreed to retain tool for use.
- 6. CO-CHAIR REPORT: There was no report.

V. DISCUSSION ITEMS

- 7. COUNTY POLICY ISSUES:
 - a. Los Angeles County HIV/AIDS Strategy (LACHAS) Policy Work Group:
 - Ms. Nelson reported the Work Group was folded into the Committee so there was no separate meeting that day.
 - On a related item, Mr. Pulsipher reported the California HIV/AIDS Research Program (CHRP) was funding some community education activities for "End the HIV, HCV, and STDs Epidemics" initiative. Discussion has highlighted hosting town halls in key areas including Los Angeles. Planning was in early stages so no date or location was available. The body agreed to Commission engagement, e.g., presentation at a Commission meeting or at a dedicated meeting.
 - Regarding Recommendations Matrix Items 4 and 5, Mr. Pulsipher reported the California HIV Alliance has requested an in-person meeting with the California Office of AIDS (OA) which is expected to be 4/25/2019. He has asked that the meeting address data-sharing issues and barriers, and what statutory changes would be required to alleviate them.
 - Ms. Nelson will discuss "End the HIV, HCV, and STDs Epidemics" presentation logistics with Ms. Barrit.
 - Mr. Pulsipher will report back on the California HIV Alliance meeting with OA at the May Public Policy meeting.

b. Housing Policy:

- Ms. Nelson reported Homeless Count results have not yet been released. The Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority (LAHSA) did issue a formal letter responding to a 150-page report from the Los Angeles Times. It was national, but used some LAHSA data in criticizing its approach to housing and suggested other models to house people more quickly.
- The Los Angeles County (LAC) Chief Executive Office (CEO) was hiring someone to help translate data for the public.
- ⇒ Ms. Nelson will email the *Los Angeles Times* housing report to the body for review.

c. STD Motion Follow-Up:

➡ Request update from Kyle Baker, DHSP, on the 11/20/2018 Motion's report back to the BOS within 45 days on the proposed advocacy strategy and within 90 days on Department of Public Health (DPH) efforts to sustain and expand the publicly supported STD service delivery system, as outlined in the Motion.

8. HIV AND AGING POLICY RECOMMENDATIONS:

- ⇒ Request addition of "Policy Issues" item to the 4/30/2019 Aging Task Force Agenda.
- Tor the next meeting, Mr. Rosales will present on City of Los Angeles aging activities and the body will review packet items.
- 9. STATE LEGISLATION AND BUDGET: Recommend to Executive Committee that it forward, "2019-20 State Budget Support HIV, HCV, STD Proposals," to the Commission on HIV for approval to sign on.
 - a. Legislative Docket:
 - Care 4 All California, Insure the Uninsured Project, and Drug Policy Alliance priorities were available for review.
 - Ms. Nelson will report back on the value of bringing forward companion bills.
 - Add for review: AB 1683, STDs; SB 50, housing; Equality California priorities; and any other items forwarded.
