
Goals motivating the MCS

- Assess the effects of state policy reforms, including realignment and Prop 47, on correctional populations and recidivism.
- 2) Identify the most effective programs, services, and sanctions at the local level.
- Assist counties with using their data for evaluation, resource allocation decisions, and program improvement.





Types and sources of MCS data




MCS research-to-date


Jail ADP increased after realignment, but decreased after Prop 47








Capacity releases fell considerably following Prop 47







The number of new felony and misdemeanor probation cases declined after Prop 47






December 2017 PPIC Report: Did realignment affect recidivism?

- We examine the effect of realignment on recidivism outcomes for PRCS and 1170(h) offenders released in the MCS counties.
- We compare these post-realignment groups to individuals with similar characteristics released from prison pre-realignment.
 - Pre-realignment group: released Oct 2009 Sept 2011
 - Post-realignment group: released Oct 2011 Sept 2013
- We measure recidivism using rearrest and reconviction rates, adjusted for changes in the use of revocations.






PRCS offenders had higher recidivism rates compared with those released pre-realignment







1170(h) offenders in Los Angeles had higher recidivism rates than those released pre-realignment








June 2018 Report: Did Prop 47 affect recidivism?

- We use MCS data to examine changes in rearrest and reconviction rates for offenders convicted of Prop 47 offenses.
- We compare recidivism outcomes before and after the proposition took effect for similar individuals with similar characteristics.
 - Pre-Prop 47 group includes individuals released between Nov 5, 2011 and Oct 31, 2012.
 - Post-Prop 47 group includes individuals released between Nov 5, 2014 and Oct 31, 2015.






Rearrests declined in the MCS counties after Prop 47, driven by reductions in arrests for drug offenses








In LA, rearrests for Prop 47 offenses – particularly drug possession – declined








Reconvictions declined in the MCS counties, driven by reductions in reconvictions for Prop 47 offenses







In LA, reconvictions for Prop 47 offenses declined substantially






June 2018 Report: Did Prop 47 affect crime?

- We draw on data from the FBI and California Department of Justice to analyze the effects of Prop 47 on crime rates.
- We examine changes in violent and property crime rates over time within California and in comparison to other states.






California's crime rates are still at historic lows








Changes in violent crime were similar to other states







California's larceny theft rate deviated from other states







Reports of violent and property crime have increased in Los Angeles





Next steps for the MCS

- MCS team has created Tableau data dashboards for each participating agency and set up a secure server.
 - Need to set up data use agreements to govern dashboard access
- We are working with partner counties to:
 - Update jail and probation population data
 - Improve data capturing program and service interventions
