Chrome

ithin the last issue I painted a '62 Mercury Monterey front-end headlight section. For this issue we're going to take it up a notch and attempt something a little more difficult. In this painting, I'm not only painting the chrome, but I'm also painting the car a Candy Apple Red.

The beauty with candy colors that I have always admired is their ability to reflect many different shades at different angles. A '57 Chevy front-end hood is one of the best cars to show how reflections can be really radical and extreme. Follow along as I show you once again how you can paint chrome and more using the simple color by number process.



1- I first enlarged the photo onto canvas. Then I painted in all the black areas and then began with a very light blue and added a medium blue.



2 - Next I continued by adding darker shades of blue.



3 - Here I used a striping brush and laid in the grill stripes. Notice they're not all the same color. Some are darker because of shadows.



4 - Now it's time for color #2 - tans/browns. Here I painted in all the areas reflecting the ground and Chevrolet emblems.



5 - Now it's time to paint in the sky, leaving white areas for clouds to be added.

6 - While the blue sky sets up I went back to the tan colors in the headlight.



7 - Here I painted in some white clouds and airbrushed light gray to the bottom section of the clouds.



8 - Here I'm adding just a little white with my Iwata airbrush to soften the brush-blended blues.



9 - Now onto the next color sections, here I'm painting various reds into their proper place.



10 - Continuing with shades of red/maroon, this is so the vehicle will reflect the changing colors in Candy Apple Red.



11 - This part shows the various reds painted into the clouded area on the hood.




12 - Continue on with lighter and darker shades of red.



13 - Here I'm doing some blending to soften color changes.




14 - Now it's almost complete but the clouds need some help.



15 - Here I've put more detail into the clouds so as not to appear so cartoonish.



16 - Lastly I added a small touch by painting myself into the painting.
