Western Australia is an unpolished gem, unspoiled, and a bit wild. Western Australia is ancient tracks brimming with adventures, ready to welcome you in.

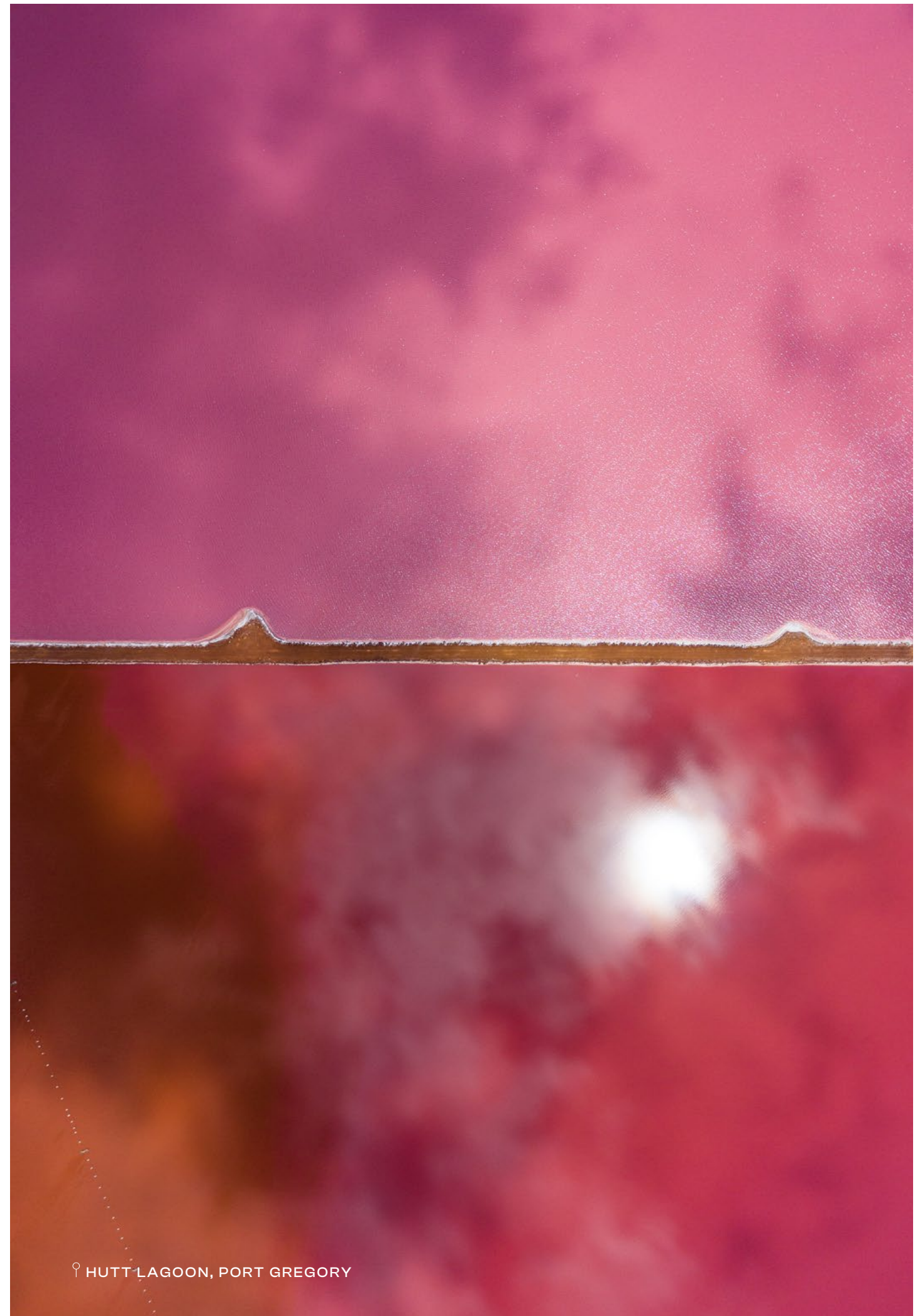

THE SPIRIT OF ADVENTURE

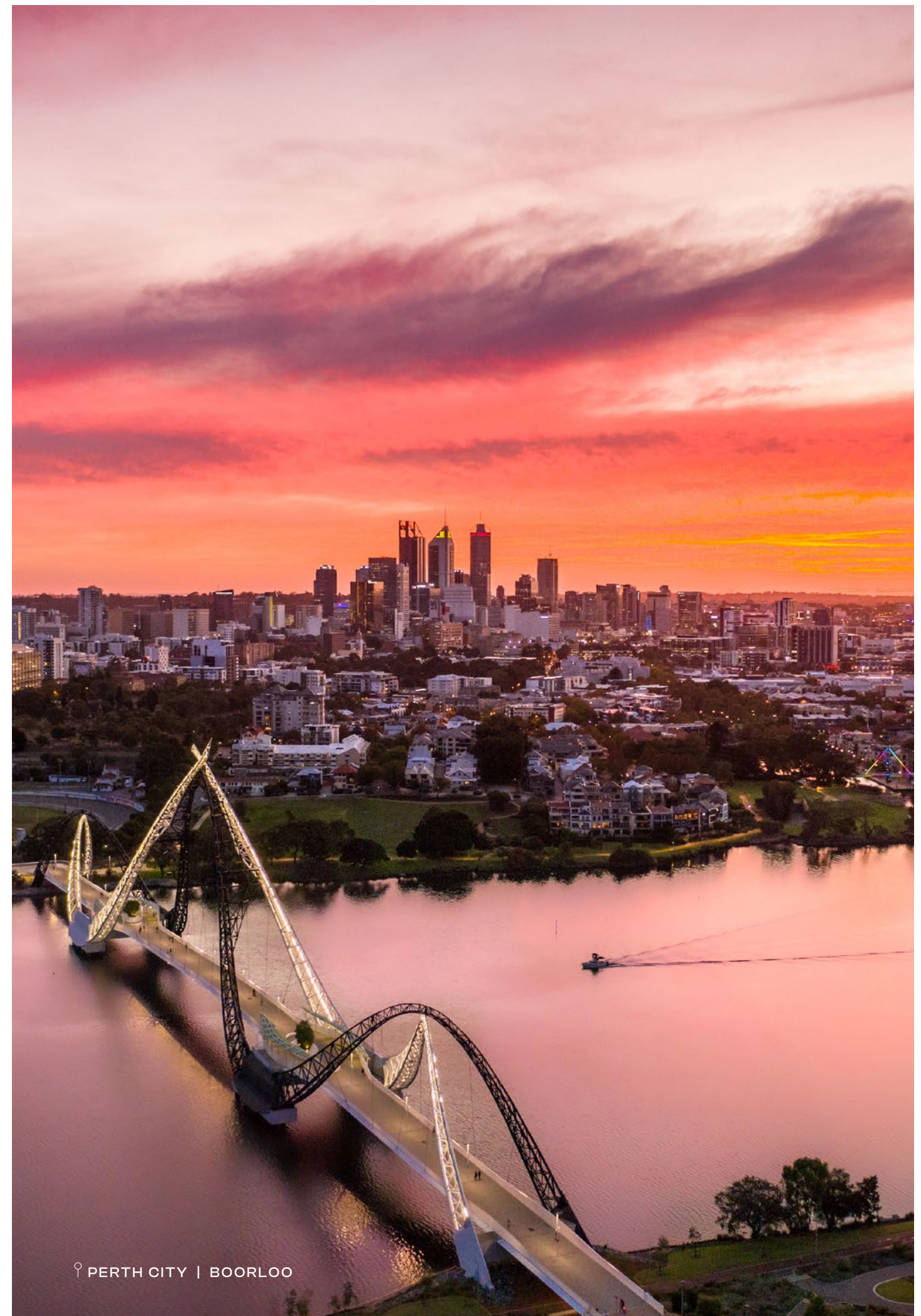
DESTINATION PERTH

Perth (Boorloo) is effortlessly Australian, the most relaxed and naturally adventurous capital city in the world.

Australia's sunniest capital is home to 19 pristine beaches; ocean sunsets; a world class wine region; one of the world's largest inner-city parks that gets taken over by wildflowers; a summer festival season and the world's most beautiful stadium, framed by the Swan River (Derbarl Yerrigan).

Perth's luxury hotels make it an effortless day trip city across the six seasons: Boat up the Swan River to explore the world class wineries and pick fruit in Perth's pantry; wander through the historical, spirited port city of Fremantle (Walyalup); indulge in a wild seafood cruise or swim with wild dolphins; choose from one of 63 beautiful beaches on Rottnest Island (Wadjemup) to lay out your towel alongside the world's happiest animal — the quokka.

While the food, events and experiences are special, Perth is anything but stuffy. It's a city you can dress up or down and feel comfortable.



AVON VALLEY

A vintage and vibrant adventure

An hour's drive from Perth (Boorloo) lies the historic Avon Valley. Rich in stories of the Ballardong Noongar people, spiritually connected to the Wagyl (Avon River) and early pioneers who built this gateway to the Wheatbelt.

Revisit yesteryear, with main streets lined with bullnose verandas, quaint cafes, bakeries and welcoming locals. Check into an historic hotel restored to its former glory or lunch in a country pub where the 'parmi' is bigger than your plate and yarns of resident ghosts flow like cold beer from the tap.

Home to hot air ballooning and skydiving. A bird's eye view of the valley reveals tributaries flowing into the Avon and endless fields of barley and canola; Australia's green and gold.

Year-round events bring this region to life. Antique fares and vintage car rallies, flower shows, farmers markets and the famous Avon Descent.

Pile the scones high with jam and cream, wind back the clock and feel worlds away on this charming historical adventure.



DWELLINGUP

A trailblazing adventure

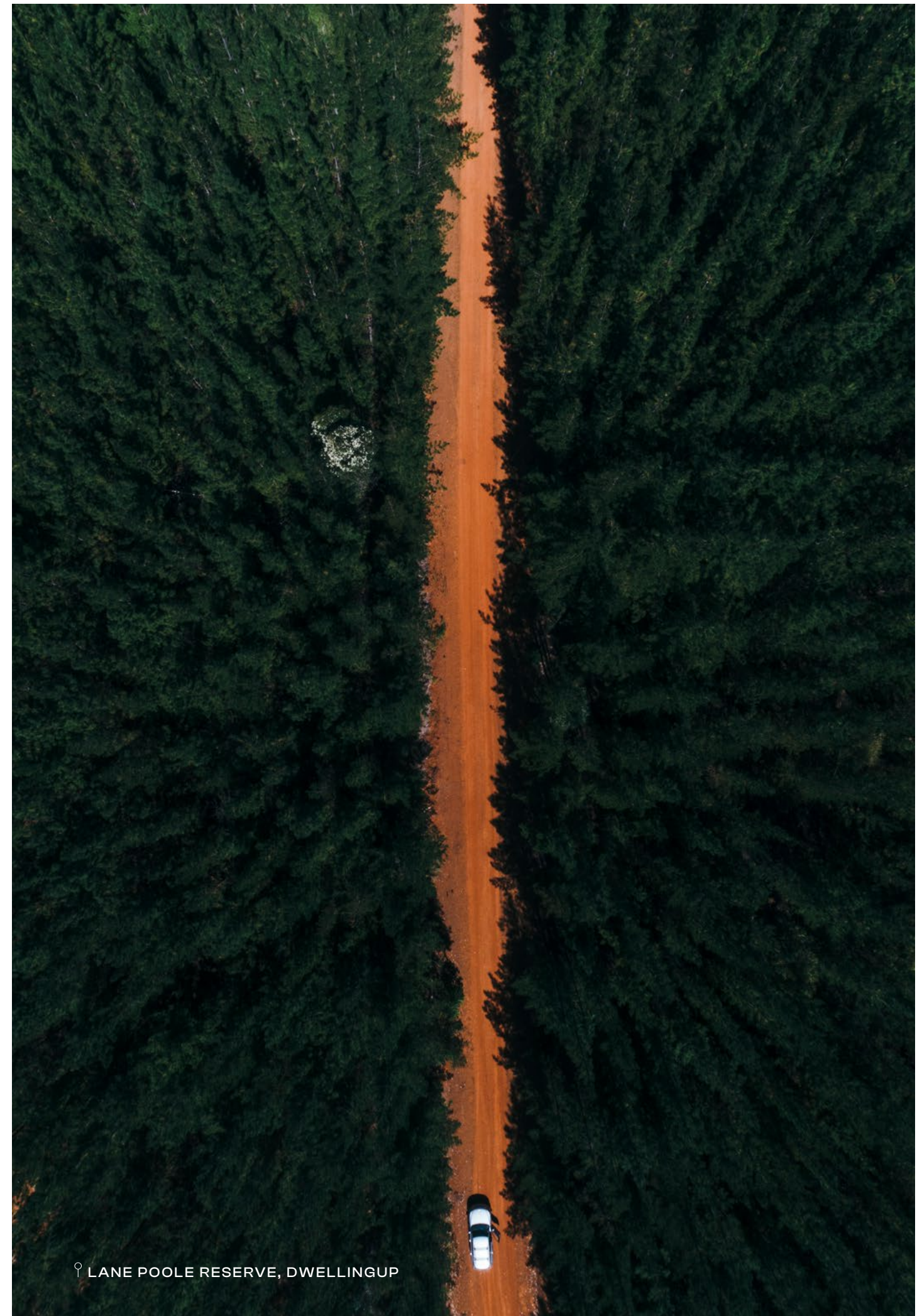
Raise your oars and launch your kayaks, lace up your hiking boots and pump up your bike tyres, get ready to burn off some energy on this outdoor adventure.

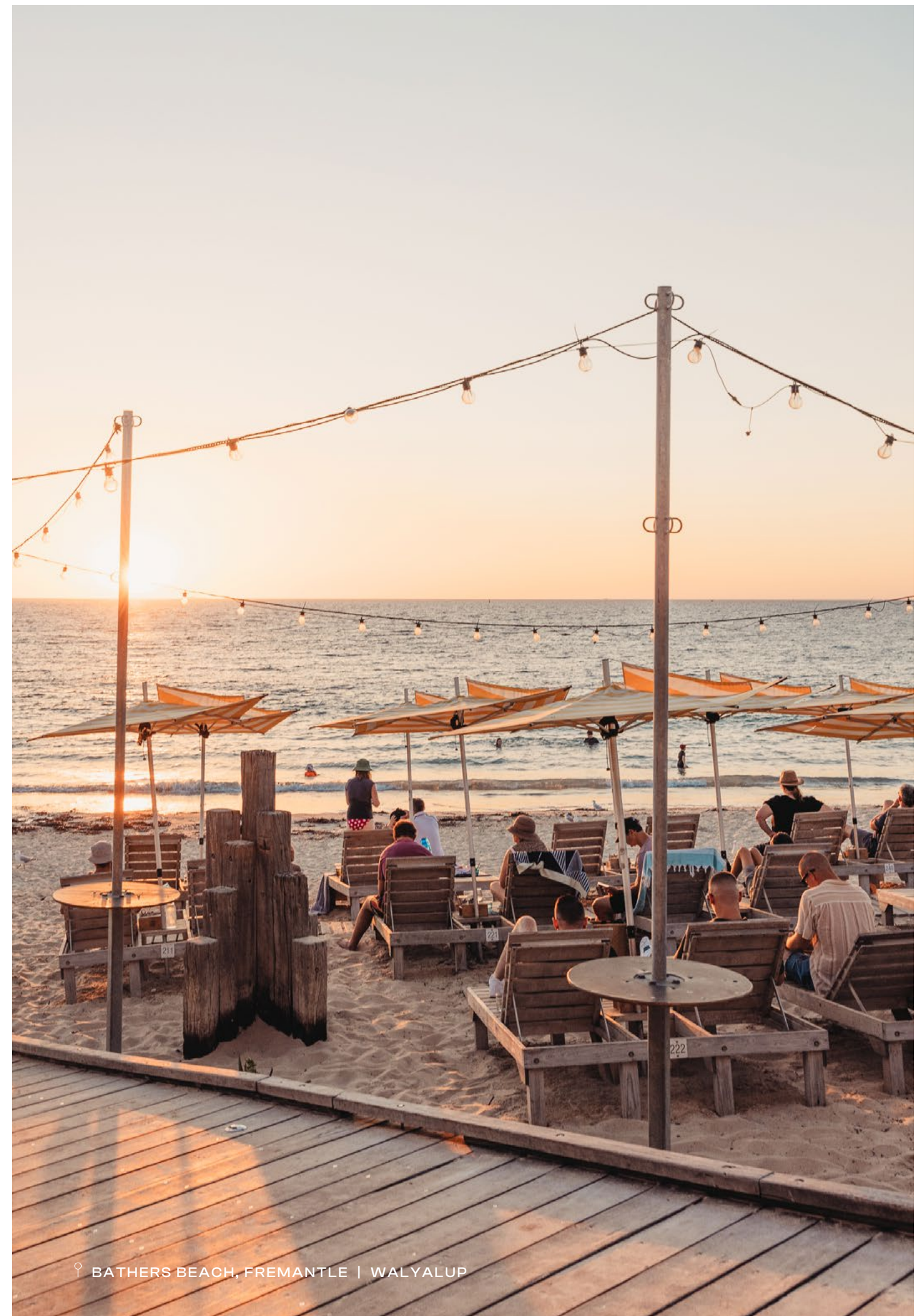
FREMANTLE

A summer carnival adventure

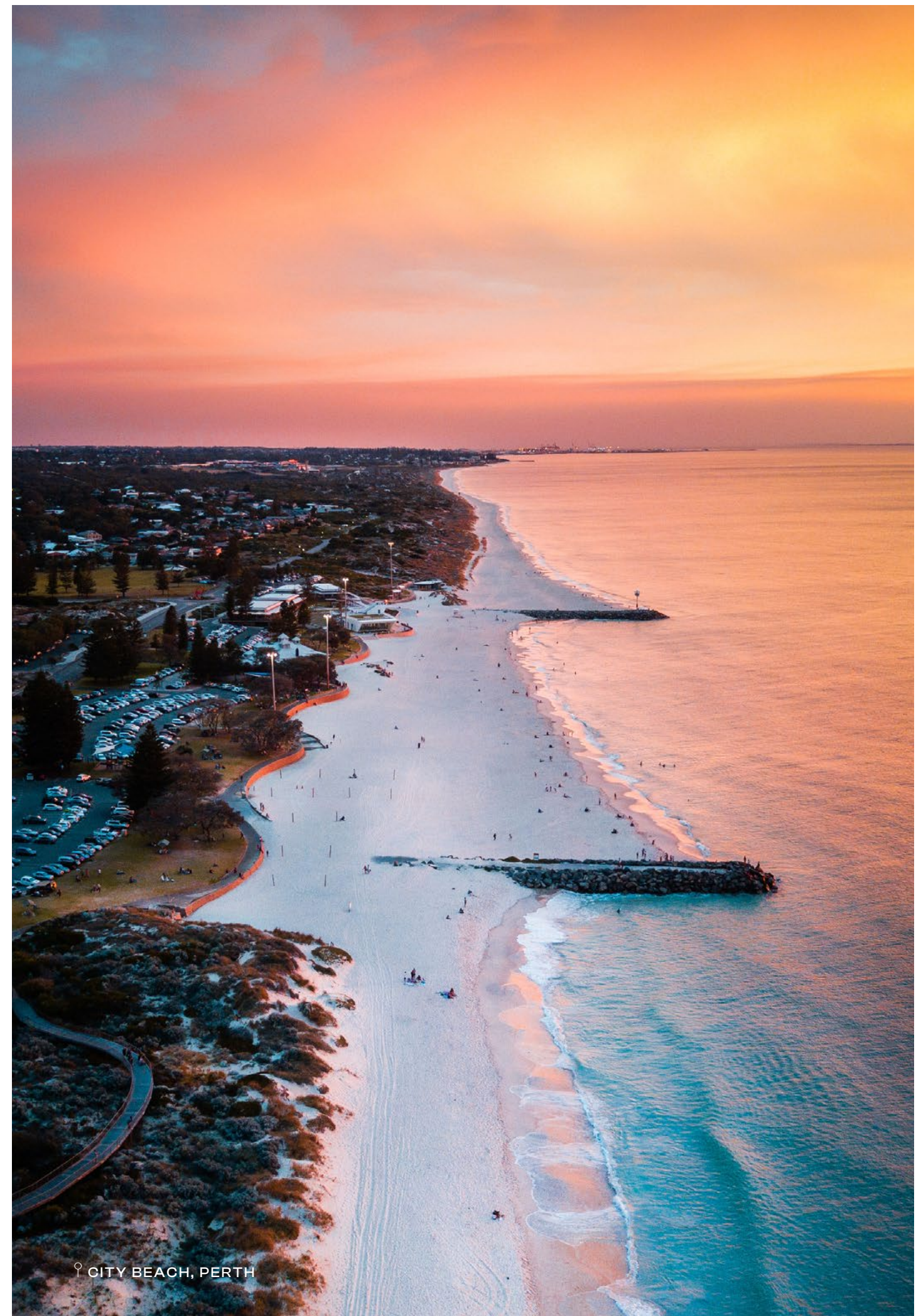
Splashes, smiles, suntan lines and sandcastles.

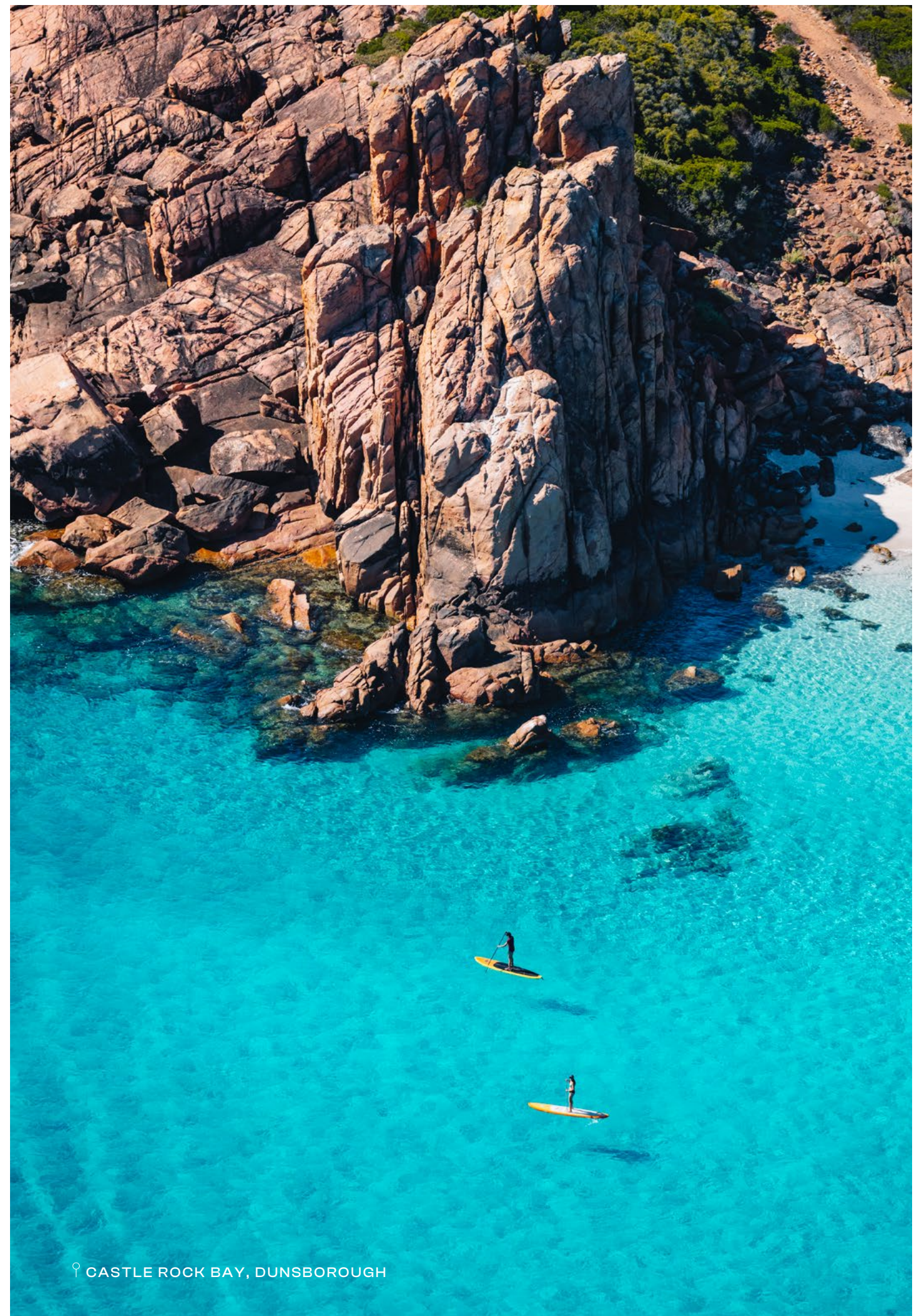
AUSTRALIA'S SOUTH WEST

A wild waves, wine and wilderness adventure

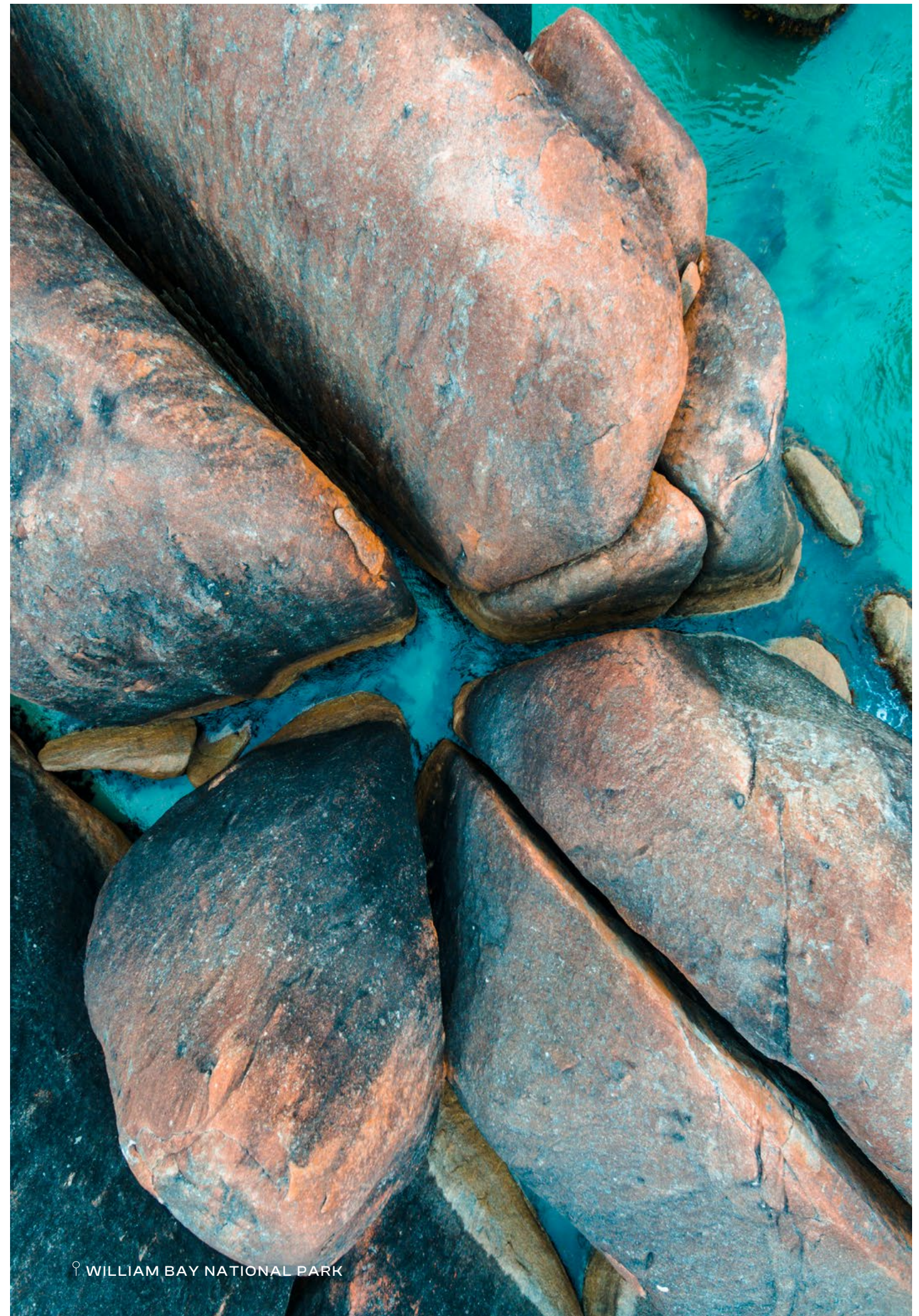
On Western Australia's southern-most shores, a wonderland of national parks, rugged coastline and history awaits the intrepid traveller.

A lighthouse adventure

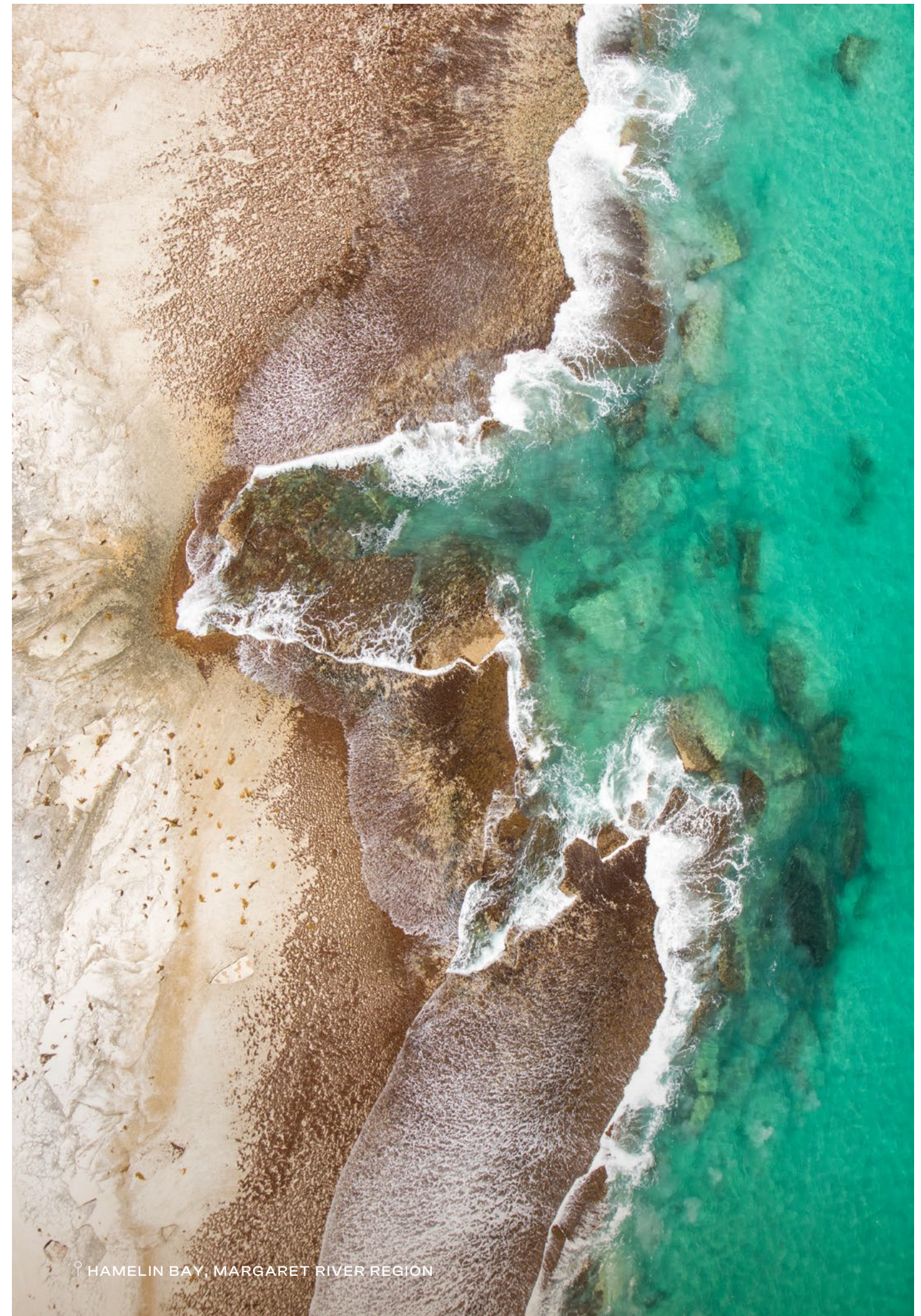
On the most South-western point of Australia, resting upon Flinders Bay, is the peaceful hamlet of Augusta.

BUNBURY GEOGRAPHE

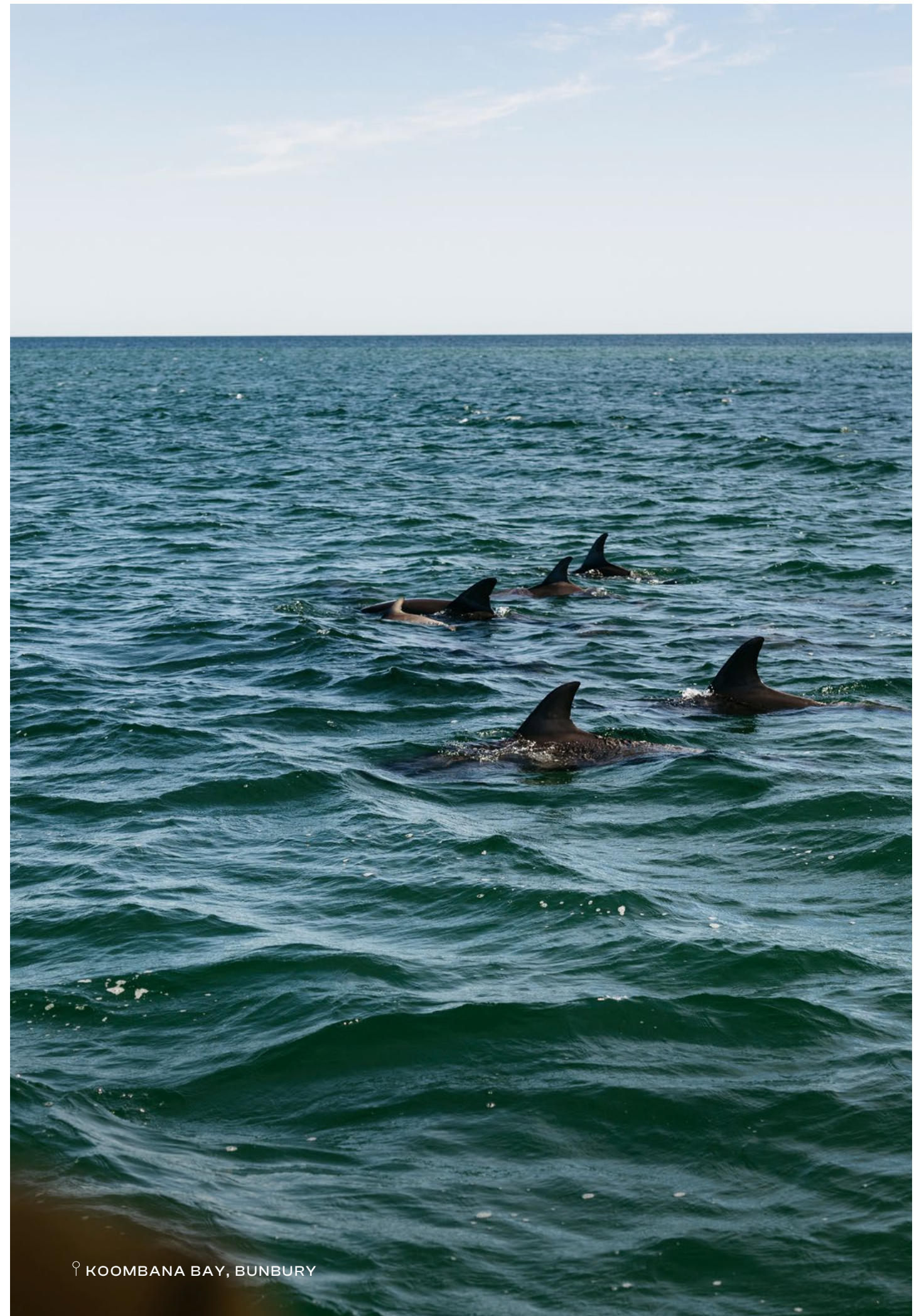
A cool, cultured adventure

A nostalgic jetty adventure

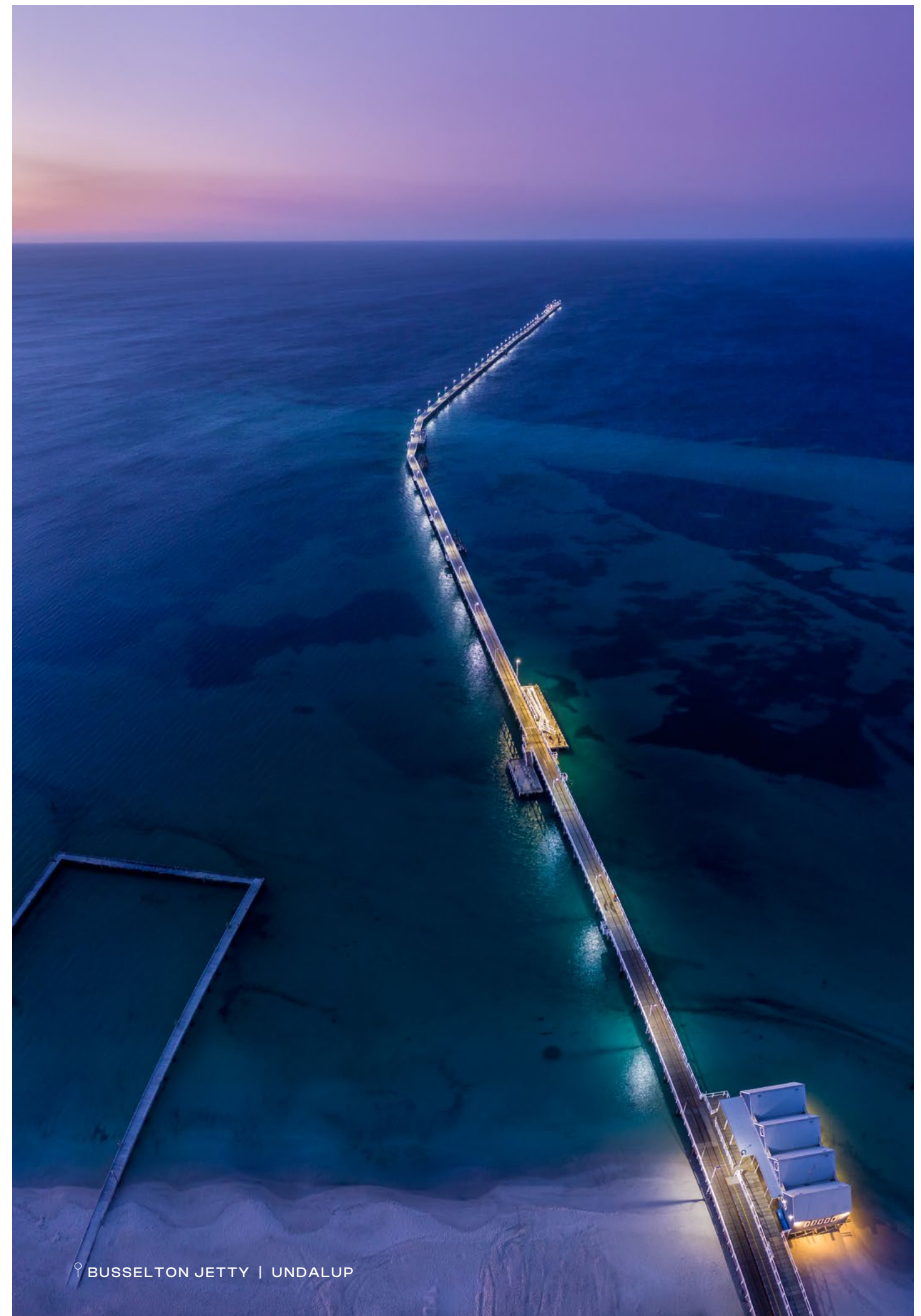
Busselton (Undalup) has long been a hot spot for holiday makers, whether visiting from far off places or just down the road. Relive holidays of yesteryear with new vigour.

Rocky lagoons, ocean spray, surfers and sunsets.

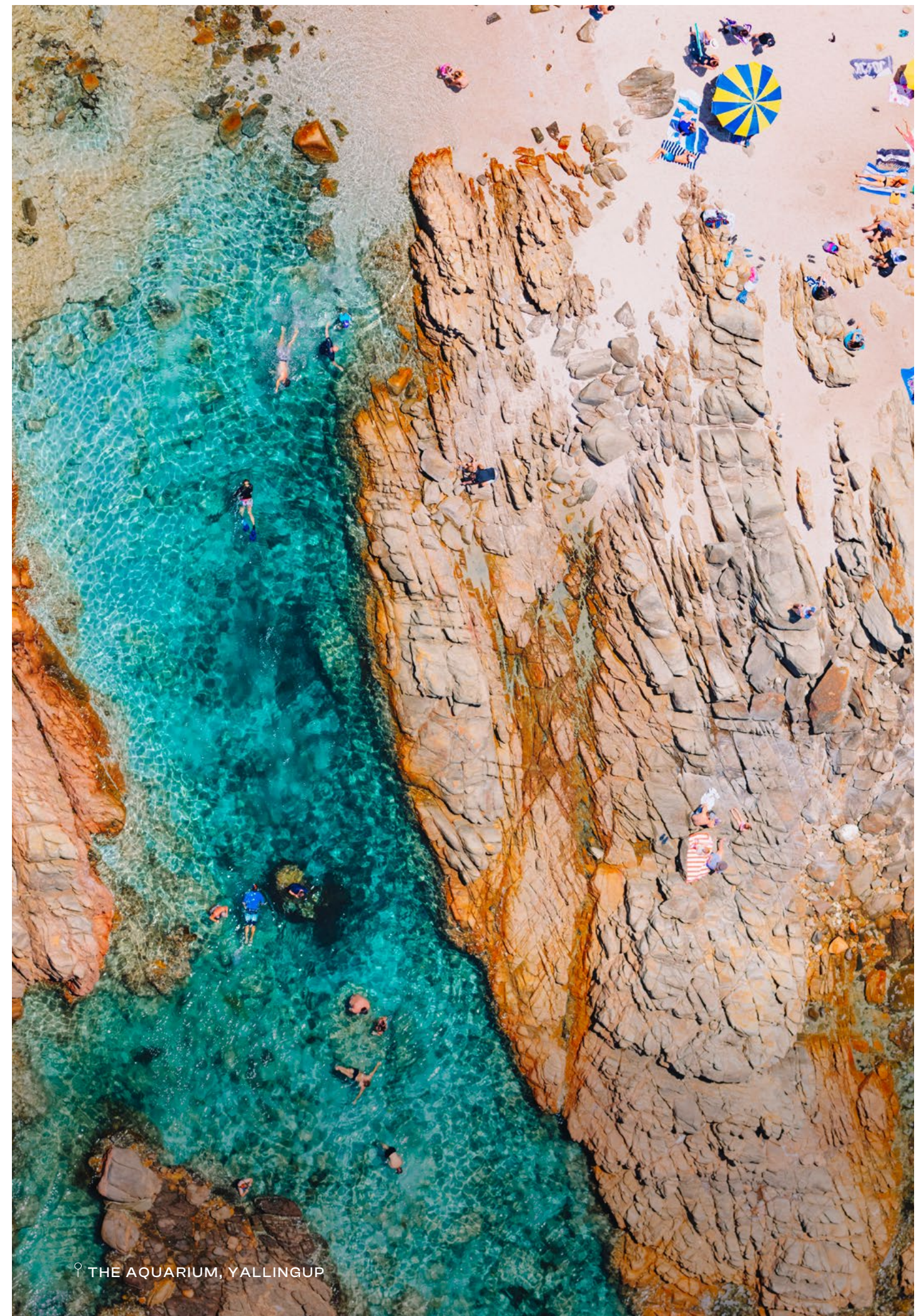
Take the summer break up a notch, surround yourself with family and friends to discover majestic beaches, secluded bays and landscapes of breathtaking beauty.

From basic bush camps and caravan parks to flour mills converted into luxury hotels and Dutch-inspired cottages looking out to the mountain ranges. Accommodation choices are as unique as the seasonal wildflowers.

This region delivers exactly what's on the label. A trove of great southern treasures and the time, space and cooler climate to savour them.



THE MARGARET RIVER REGION

A naturally generous adventure

The Margaret River Region — the grazing platter of the West. Premium wines, cheese, chocolate, cured meats, seafood, preserves and oils. Gifts of the land, earth and sea.

Tracks and trails wind along stunning beaches. Lush forests sprawl, ancient Karris rise. Surfers, artists, vigneron and purveyors find harmony and beauty in landscapes as green as their environmental conscience.

The main street buzzes with alfresco diners, sandy-foot shoppers, gallery browsers. Blue-tongued children lick bubblegum ice cream, as roof racks laden with waxed-up boards cruise past. It's holiday central, an eclectic mix, an authentic vibe.

The Margaret River Region is a marriage of manicured wineries, rustic cellar doors, silky white beaches framed by granite boulders, caves and protected forests.

SOUTHERN FORESTS & VALLEYS

AUSTRALIA'S CORAL COAST

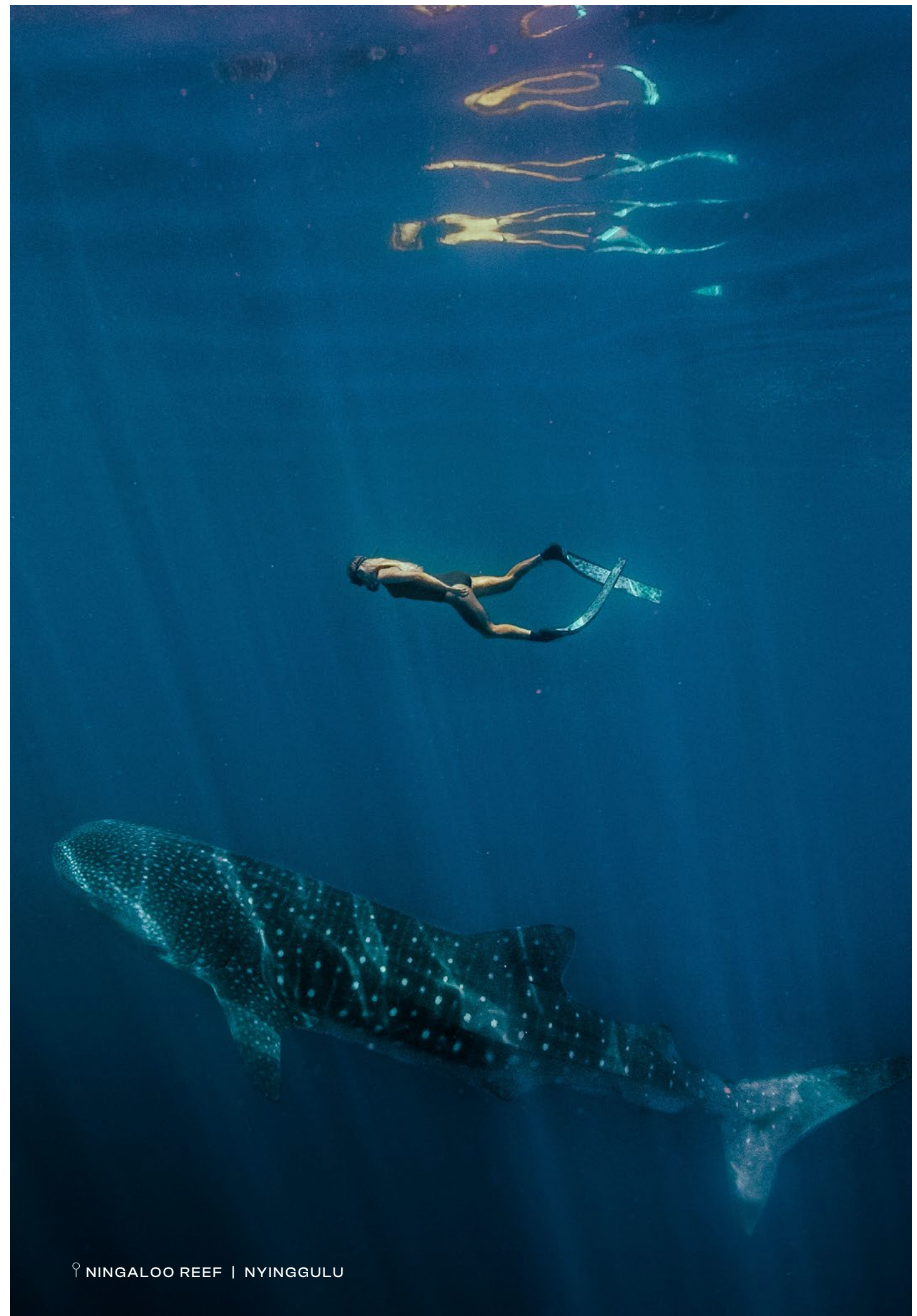
The most exhilarating marine adventure in the world.

Ningaloo Reef (Nyinggulu) is Australia's largest fringing coral reef. Pristine, close to shore, and extending along 300kms of untouched coastline.

EXMOUTH, CORAL BAY & CARNARVON

A whale of an adventure

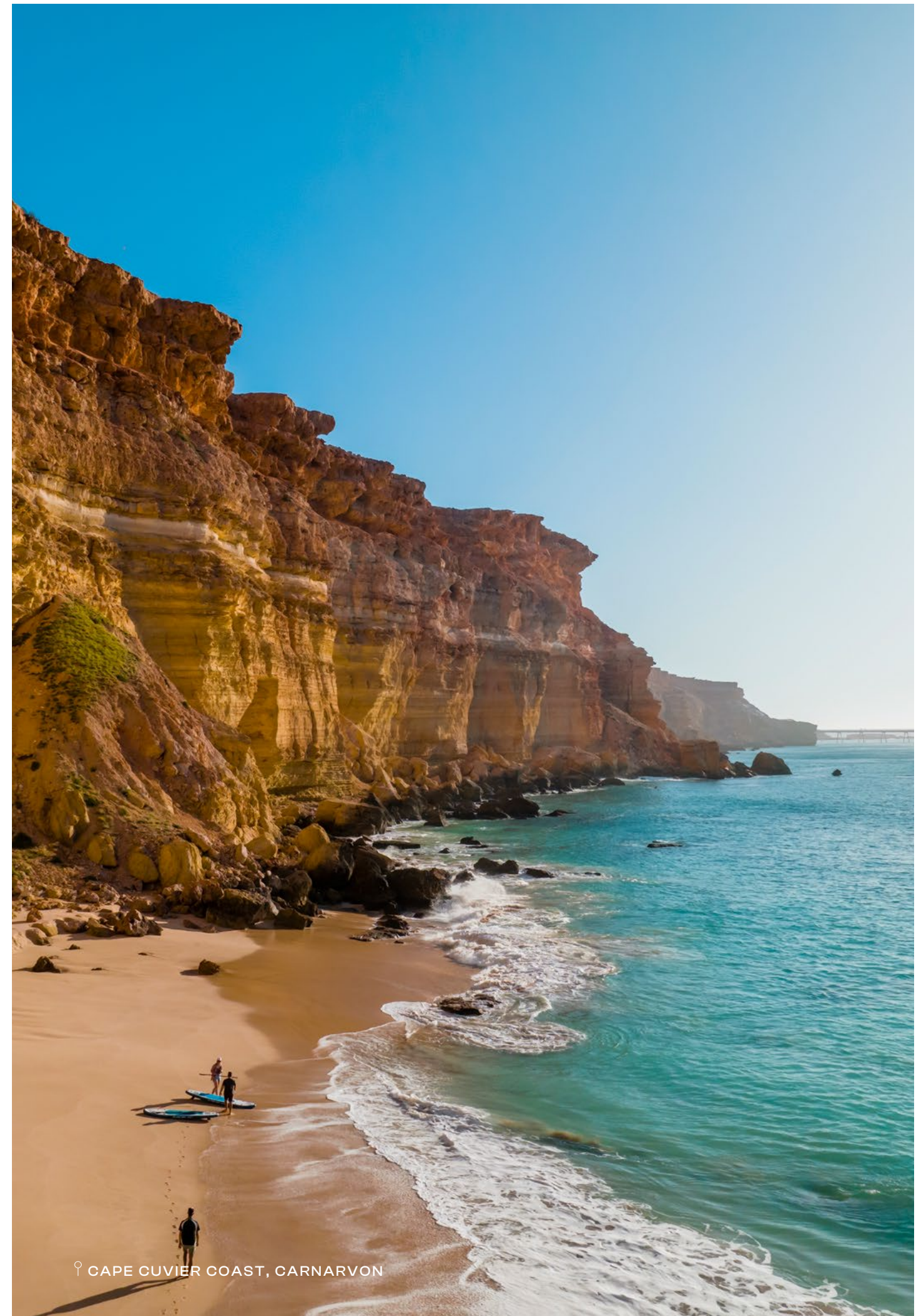
Exmouth (Warnangoora), Coral Bay and Carnarvon sit on the northern shores of Australia's longest fringing coral reef. Home to one of the world's most pristine marine environments, even whale sharks choose to linger a while before continuing on their annual migration.

Beyond the fruit bowl of WA, where banana trees sway and seafood is plentiful, landscapes morph from termite mounds and deep red earth to alabaster sandbanks stretching into limpid waters. Schools of fish dart and weave through beds of rainbow coral.

Take the plunge to get up close and personal with gentle giants; a once-in-a-lifetime experience the region is renowned for, or witness a wondrous underwater world through a glass bottomed boat.

Go cruising up canyons, buggying through dunes or trekking through ranges. No day is complete without witnessing a sunset from Vlamingh Head lighthouse.

Whether you choose to stay at a world-class eco-retreat, a stationstay, or a back-to-basics campsite, the theme here is simple; relax, unwind and enjoy a whale of a time.



GERALDTON

An adventure of seafarers and the sea

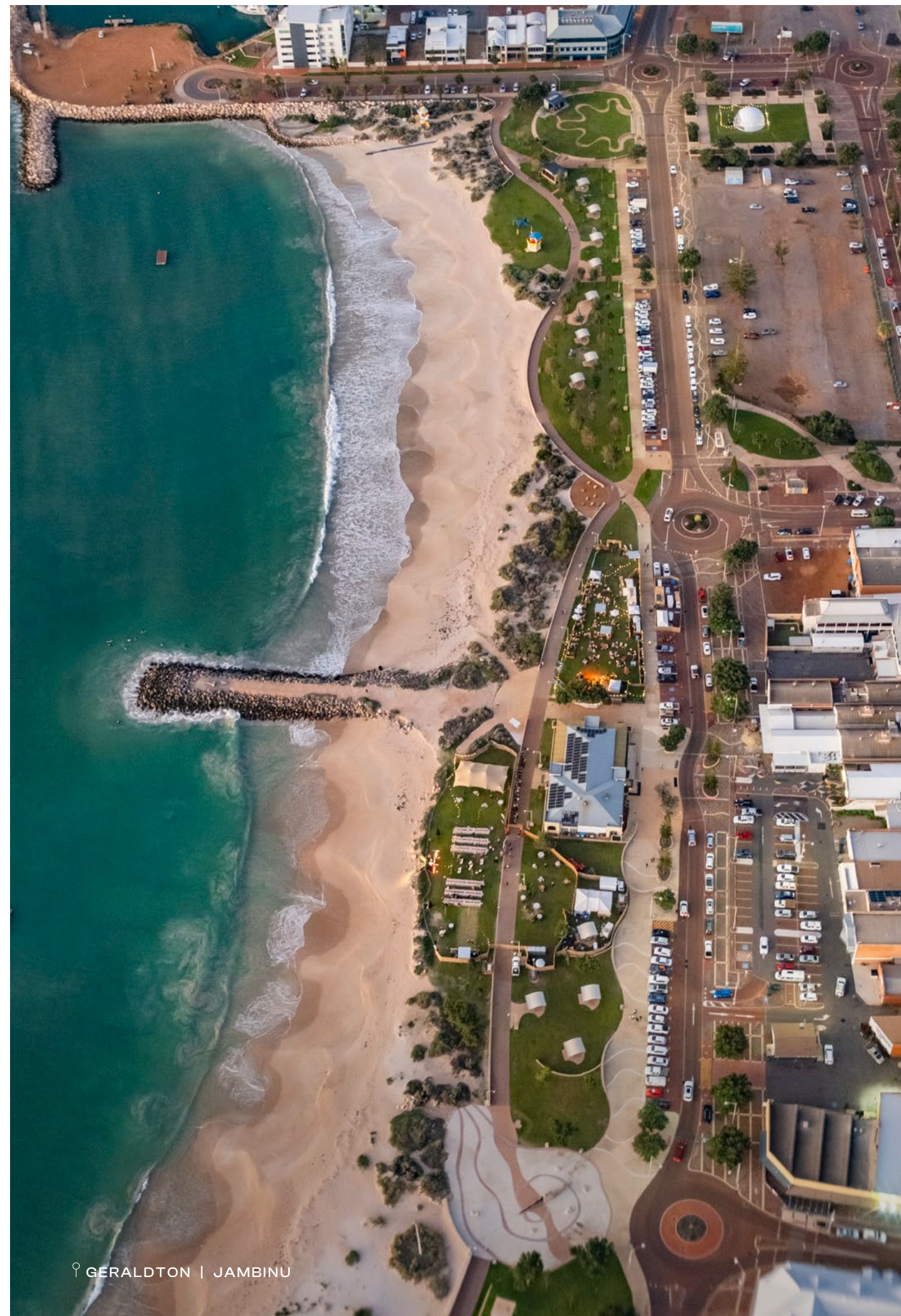
Along the Coral Coast Highway where snow-like dunes rise unexpectedly from sage-green scrub and trees bow low acknowledging your arrival, a modern beachside city emerges.

INDIAN OCEAN DRIVE

Beach shacks and shanties, boat ramps and bakeries, are signature staples of the seaside communities along this gateway to the north.

Beyond shifting white sand dunes, a misty blue ocean ebbs and flows. Salty sea air evokes a natural holiday high, lifting the spirits against a rhythm of crashing waves and masterpiece sunsets.

The limestone Pinnacles of Nambung National Park jut haphazardly from the earth providing a strange moonscape to wander. Nightfall showcases the starry milky way against dark skies.

Seals laze, rock lobsters fill fishman's pots, WWII memorabilia regale stories of the past and wildflowers and caves add to the adventure of discovery.

Absorb the untainted coastal beauty, its laid-back nature. Sink your toes in the sand or dangle a hook from the jetty. Feel windswept and rustically romantic under sunshiny skies and blissfully unaware of the passing of time.

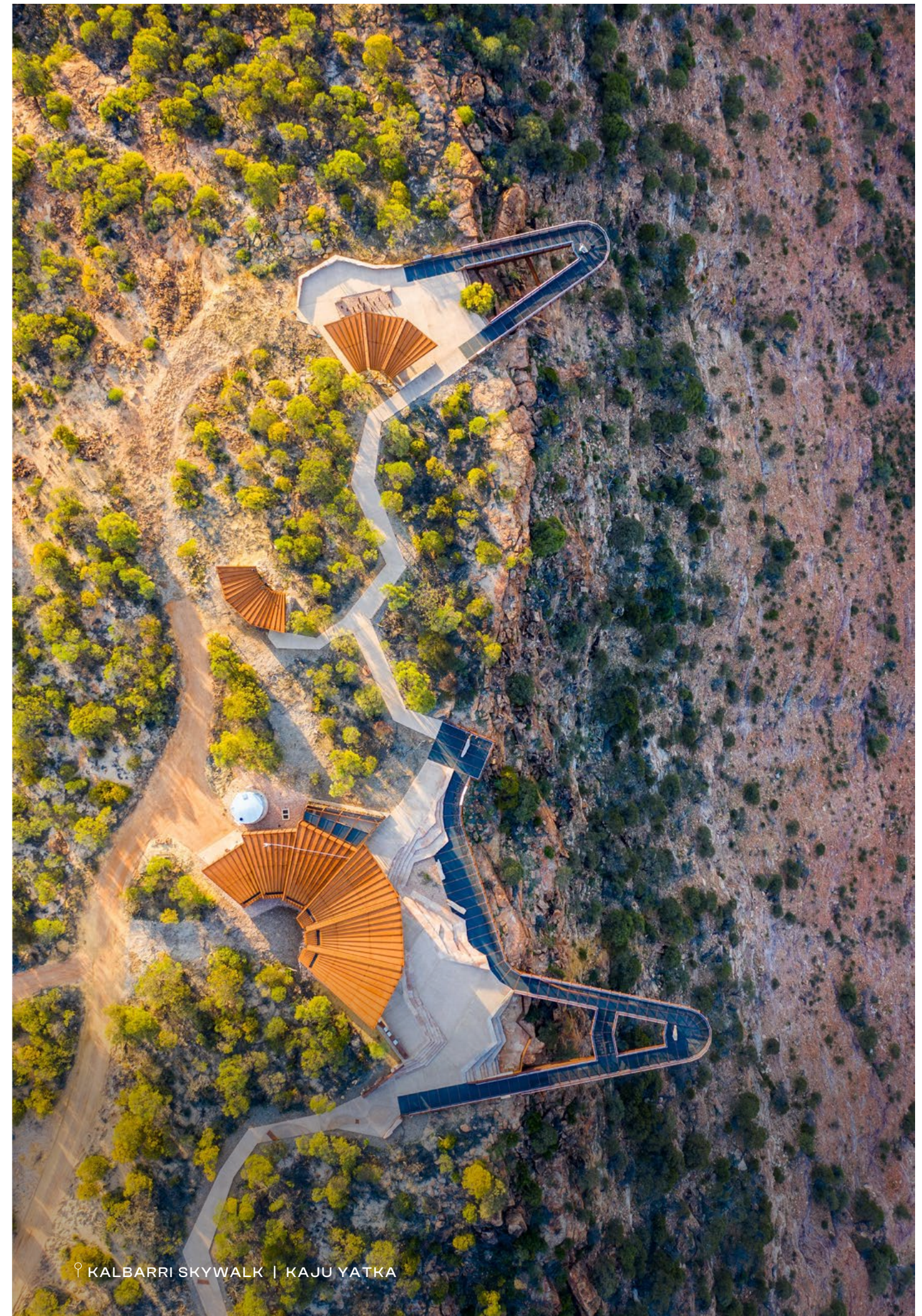

An oceanic adventure

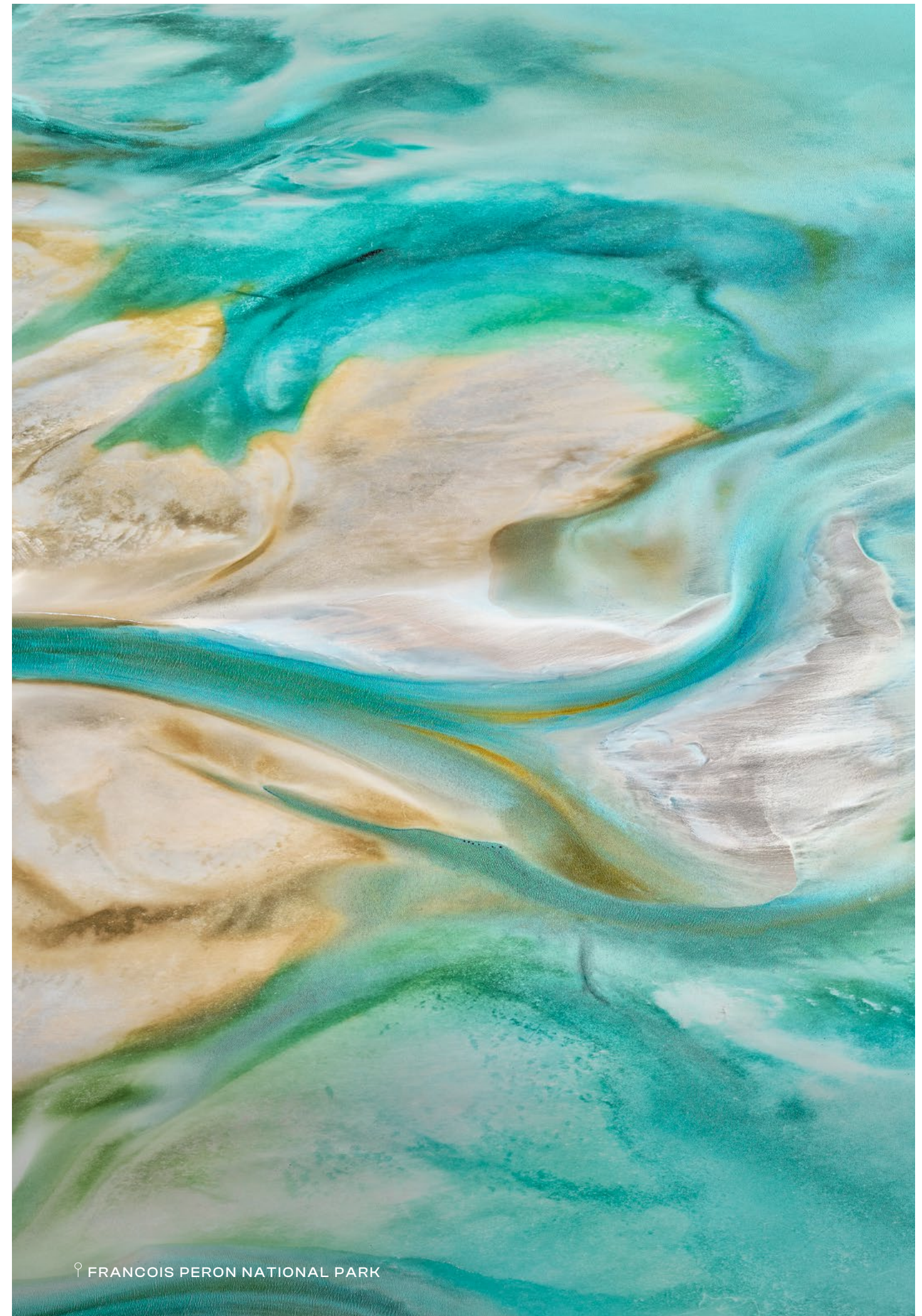
On the Western-most point of the continent lies Shark Bay (Gutharraguda) country; the land of two waters.

A magical carpet ride adventure

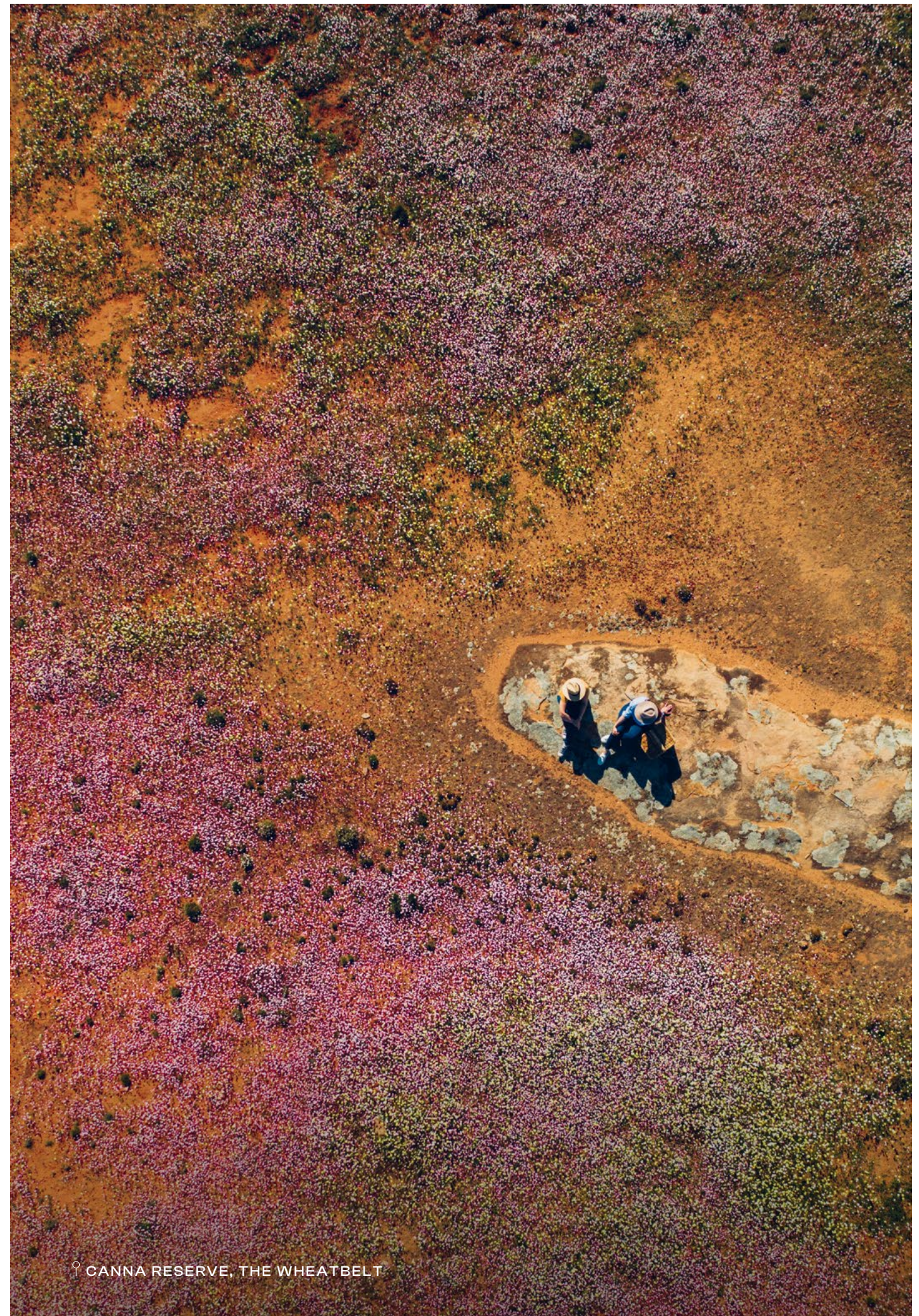

The most otherworldly outback adventure in the world.

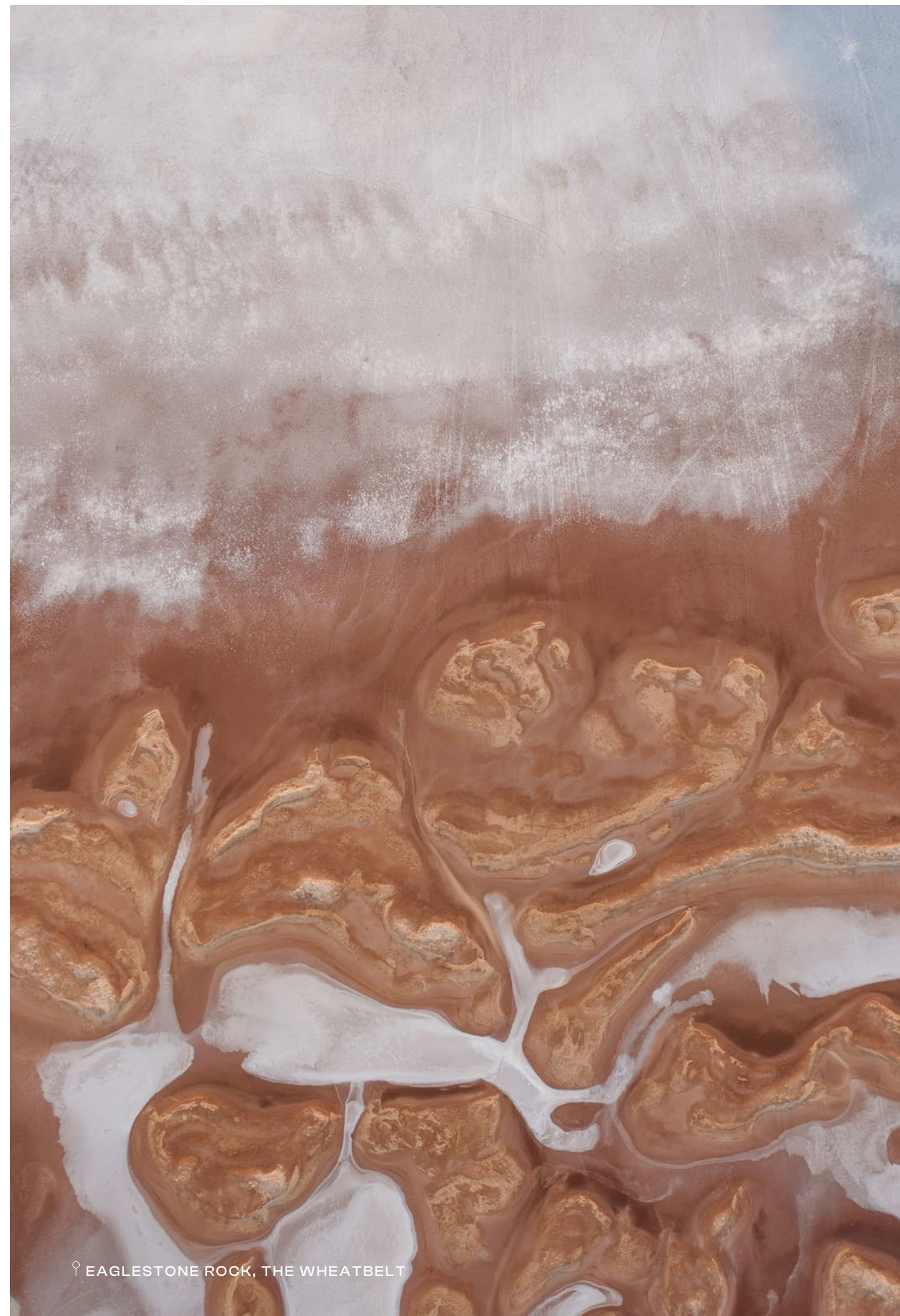

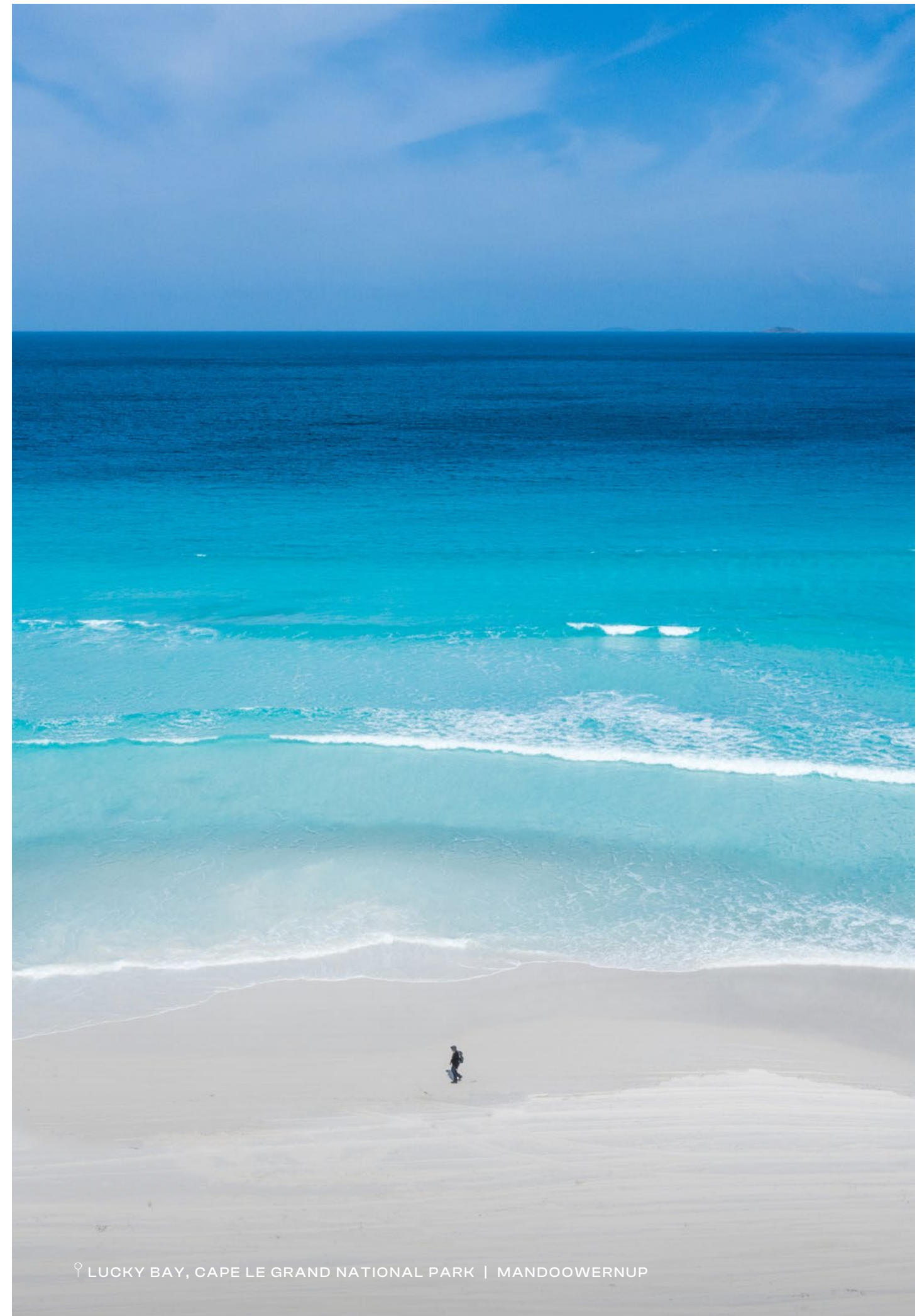
Its teal and turquoise waters are an attraction all on their own. If beaches won beauty pageants, Esperance would be crowned Miss Universe.

A rock solid adventure

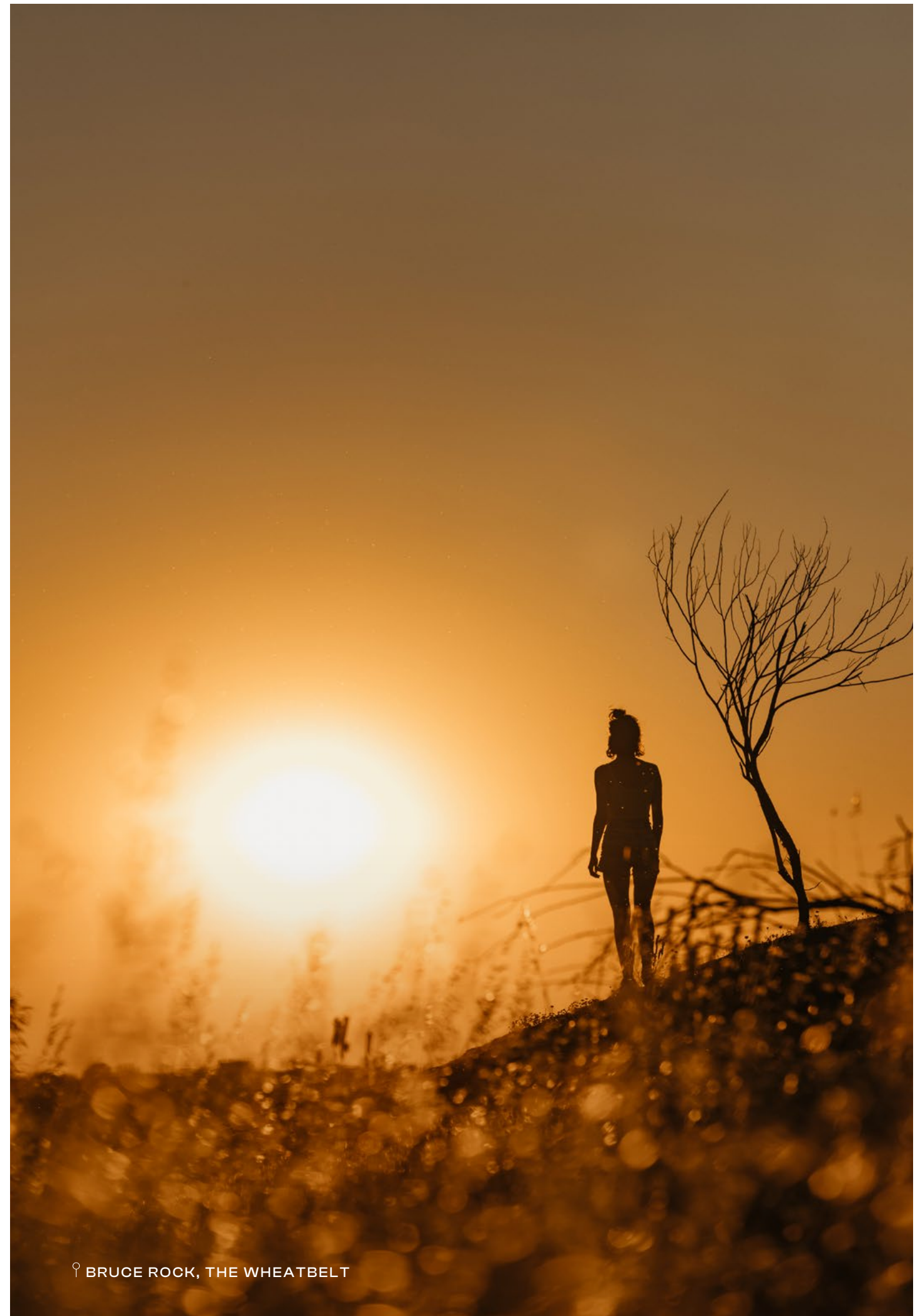

A sun-soaked adventure

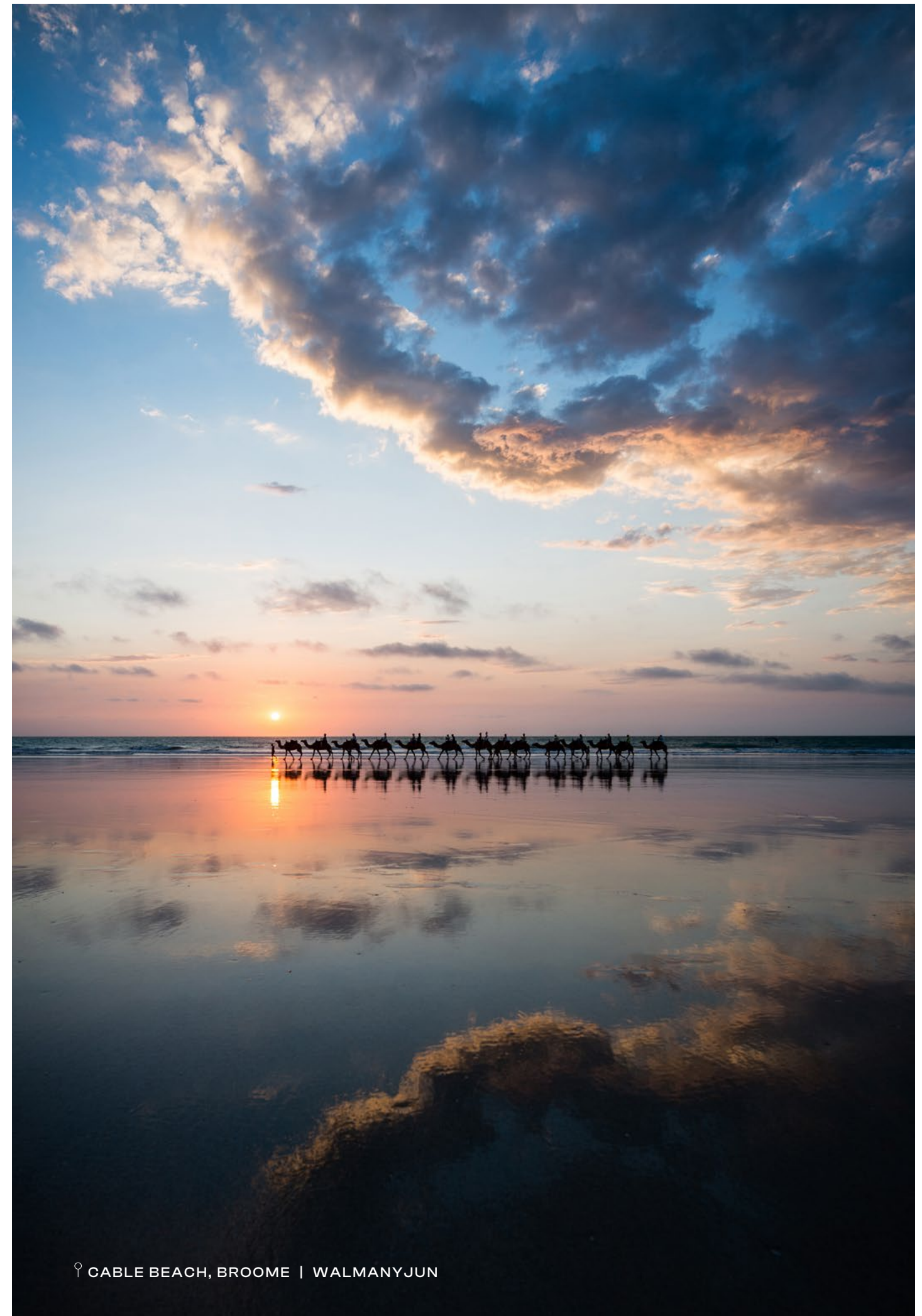

Kununurra (Goonoonoorrang) is not a place, it is an awakening. A connection to the land, the beginning, creation itself.

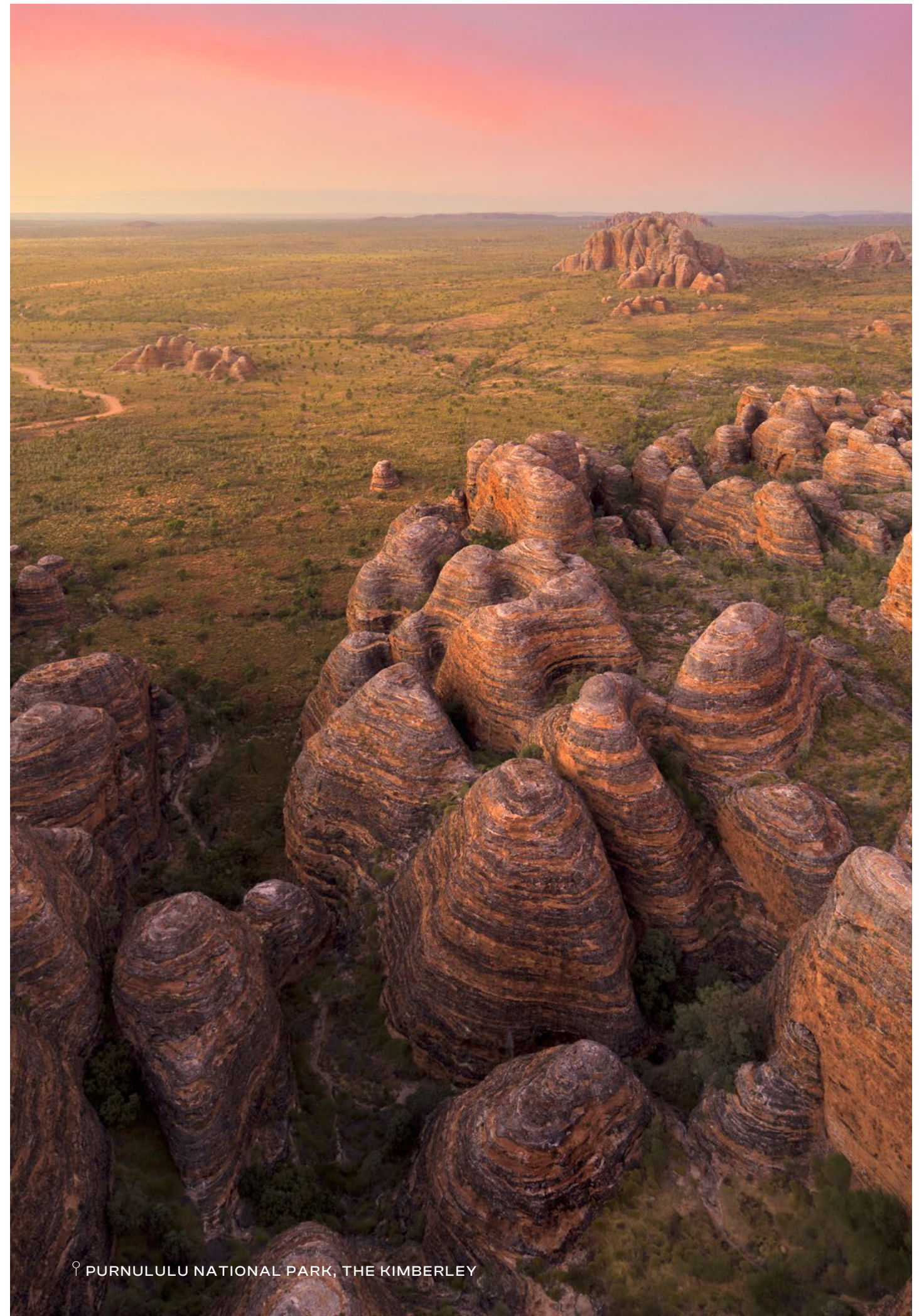
