The <u>International Diploma (Business)</u> and the <u>International Diploma (Computer Science)</u> are suitable for international students who do not have the equivalence of New Zealand University Entrance. Combining the first year of the Bachelor of Business or the Bachelor of Science with English language development and a comprehensive programme of academic support and development activities, ensures you are prepared for your studies in New Zealand. The <u>Diploma in Postgraduate Preparation</u> is designed for international students whose personal and professional goals include the completion of a postgraduate qualification but they don't currently meet the entry criterial for a New Zealand university. PART 2:

Programme Information



General English

The General English course offers an exciting opportunity for people from around the world to learn everyday English in an English-speaking environment. The programme has a general focus suitable for students who need English for everyday contexts or for students preparing to enter the English Language programme. You will cover core language skills and vocabulary, fluency and accuracy in listening, speaking, reading and writing.

Features of the programme include:

- Classes offered from elementary to advanced levels
- Study options include full-time (23 hours per week) or part-time (15 hours per week)
- Class sizes are restricted and do not exceed 22 students
- If you don't have evidence of an external examination, you will be asked to sit an English language
 placement test during the first week to assess your entry level, with the option of further testing
 to move up to higher levels
- Upon completion of your study with us, you will receive a University of Waikato College Certificate
 of Attendance. Individual graded reports are also available (fee applies). Individual graded reports

As a full-time student:

- Your core programme will be 23 hours per week over 10 weeks
- Your class size will not exceed 22 students.
- You will be involved in independent learning, an important part of your study
- Homework can be expected to take at least 2 hours per night
- Set homework should be handed to the teacher on the due date and will be handed back to you as detailed in the relevant paper outline
- You will achieve a University of Waikato certificate upon successful completion, and will be included in the University of Waikato graduation ceremony booklet
- You will receive a report that shows the grade for each of the four language skills.

Foundation Studies:


Certificate of Attainment in Foundation Studies

Successful completion of the Certificate of Attainment in Foundation Studies (CAFS) guarantees you entry to most University of Waikato undergraduate degrees.

The normal minimum period of enrolment for completion is two trimesters, following an approved programme of study, as shown in the image below. Candidates must gain 120 points, including 45 points from the three compulsory papers, as prescribed in the <u>Pathways Programmes</u>.

For students who can demonstrate a sufficiently higher level of writing and academic capability, a one-trimester *accelerated* option is available. For this option, candidates must gain 60 points, including 15 points from the compulsory paper, as shown in the image below.

Every candidate for the Certificate must complete, to the satisfaction of the Academic Board, such class work, practical work, assignments, tests, and oral and written examinations as may be required.

Foundation Studies:

Certificate of University Preparation

The Certificate of University Preparation (CUP) is a one-trimester programme that can provide students who have a New Zealand secondary school qualification with the equivalent of University Entrance as well as the tools and skills needed to confidently transition into degree-level study.

For those needing additional academic preparation, or seeking a career change, then this programme will help you gain the confidence for university degree study. It will help you develop skills including research, note-taking and essay writing, time management and critical thinking.

Successful completion of the Certificate of University Preparation programme will enable you to progress to any New Zealand university and most degrees at the University of Waikato.

You will be required to take a total of four papers: two compulsory and two electives. Elective options are listed below:

International Diploma (Business)

This programme offers direct entry into year two of the Bachelor of Business (BBus) at the Waikato Management School, a triple-crown accredited Business School at the University of Waikato. It incorporates the first year papers of the Bachelor of Business with English language development, a complete programme of academic support, and development activities to ensure international students are well equipped to undertake higher education studies in New Zealand.

Candidates must gain 120 points, including key papers from the first year of the Bachelor of Business programme, and four compulsory support modules, as prescribed in the Pathways Programmes.

As you progress into year two of the Bachelor of Business (BBus), you can complete your qualification within the same timeframe as students who gained direct entry to the programme.


International Diploma (Computer Science)

This International Diploma offers direct entry into year two of the Bachelor of Science or the Bachelor of Computer Science at the University of Waikato. It incorporates the first year papers with English language development, a complete programme of academic support and development activities to ensure international students are well-equipped to undertake higher education studies in New Zealand.


As you progress through the International Diploma and degree programme, you will gain hands-on experience with some of the most up-to-date and high-tech computing facilities and laboratory equipment in New Zealand[^].

Candidates must gain 120 points, comprising of papers from the first year of the Bachelor of Science or Bachelor of Computer Science programme, as well as complete the four compulsory support modules, as prescribed in the Pathways Programmes. Once you successfully complete the International Diploma (Computer Science), you can go on to study the Bachelor of Science or Bachelor of Computer Science at the University of Waikato.

Diploma in Postgraduate Preparation (Pre-Masters)

The Diploma in Postgraduate Preparation – Pre Masters (DipPP) is an eight-month (two-trimester) level 7 Diploma that aims to prepare international students for postgraduate studies at the Waikato Management School, a Triple-Crown accredited business school in New Zealand.


The DipPP provides international students, who either do not have the equivalent of a New Zealand bachelor's degree or do not meet the requirements for direct entry, with an alternative pathway into the Master of Business Management (MBM) and the Master of Professional Accounting (MPAcct) at the University of Waikato.

This programme teaches the English language, academic literacies, and personal and professional skills students need to succeed with postgraduate studies at a New Zealand university.

Once successfully completed, students will be able to study at the University of Waikato's Triple-Crown accredited business school, ranked in the top 1% worldwide, choosing one of these degree options:

- Master of Applied Finance
- Master of Professional Accounting
- Master of Business and Management
- Master of Management (Marketing)
- Master of Digital Business
- Master of Management (Supply Chain Management)

Students will complete a total of six papers, worth 120 points:



Information for Students



Teaching and Learning

As a student at The University of Waikato College, you will work closely with your teachers and tutors during your study. You will experience a variety of learning activities in class and for assessments, which may include the following in face-to-face or online delivery format:

- Workshops and tutorials
- Lectures
- Quizzes
- Discussions
- Student presentations
- Group activities
- Problem solving activities.

Teaching and learning

You should treat full-time study like a full-time job. You can expect to spend around 40 hours per week studying, either in class or independent study.

- Teaching and learning may be in class (face-to-face) or online, or a combination of the two, called blended learning
- Lectures may be pre-recorded and available on Moodle
- Tests and some assessments may be online
- Information about your paper will be in the relevant paper outline and on Moodle

Expectations

Your teachers and tutors have expectations of you as a learner. You are expected to:

- Attend classes unless you have a valid reason (see Attendance, page 21)
- Participate in class, to contribute your ideas and answers, and respect those of your classmates
- Engage in homework tasks in your own time
- Submit your assignments on time
- Behave in a manner that is respectful and courteous to staff, students and yourself
- Act with honesty and integrity in all your study activities
- Ask if you need help or do not understand.

Academic Integrity

Me tika. Me rite. Me pono. (To be correct, to be prepared and to be ethical)

The University of Waikato is committed to excellence, respect, and honesty in scholarship and to ethical professional conduct. Academic integrity is at the core of this commitment and requires all members of the University community (students, academic and general staff) to uphold academic integrity as a personal, academic, and professional responsibility.

What is academic integrity?

Academic integrity is an important concept for you, as a student, to understand. It means being honest in all your academic work. It means that the work you submit is all your own work, that you did not copy from other sources, that you didn't have help from friends or family, and didn't cheat or copy. It is perfectly fine to discuss your work with others to help form your ideas and clarify your thinking, but the work you submit must be entirely your own.

It is good practice to use resources and published material to help justify our viewpoint, and these must be properly referenced, showing that these ideas belong to other people. Sometimes we use their exact words, and we must show this in the citation. Sometimes we refer to their ideas but use our own words to explain this, called paraphrasing. When we do this, we must indicate that this thinking belongs to that person. If we don't do this, we are copying someone else's work, pretending that it's our own, and this is called plagiarism.

You will be shown how to reference properly in your classes, and it is important that you take note of this and apply it to all your assignments. Marks will generally be awarded for doing this correctly, and details will be included in your marking rubric.

What is academic misconduct?

If you don't reference properly, or don't write in your own words (paraphrase), you may be considered to have committed academic misconduct. This is taken very seriously by the University and by the College, and can result in reduced marks for the assignment, a zero grade, a failed paper or, in extreme circumstances, removal from the programme and university.

Our teachers refer all assessments that they consider may include academic misconduct (including plagiarism, copying and collusion) to be investigated. If it is considered to be a case of misconduct, the student will receive a letter inviting them to a meeting to discuss the matter, usually with the College Director.

Where can I find more information?

You will talk about academic integrity in your classes, but if in doubt, ask you teacher, tutor or student advisor.

University Support Services

Waikato Student Union Advocacy

The Waikato Student Union (WSU) provides free and confidential advocacy services for students, independent from the University. They can help with a range of issues, including budgeting and financial concerns, tenancy, academic issues and misconduct. Contact Waikato Student Union for more information.

Counselling service

The <u>Student Counselling Service</u> is free to all students. The University will also work with you and other support services as needed.

Student health

<u>Student Health</u> provides Hamilton-based students with access to comprehensive health care. Cost depends on whether you are an international or domestic student, and whether you enrol with Student Health as your primary health provider (fees will be waived when a student is in crisis).

Muslim Prayer rooms (on-campus, Hamilton)

The University has Prayer Rooms available in <u>L Block</u>. To access the space, you will need swipe access entered on your Student ID card from the Security Office in the <u>Annex</u> beside B Block.

Places of worship, Hamilton

The Lady Goodfellow Chapel is situated opposite UniRec, in the same building as Student Health.

Additionally, there are nearly <u>places of worship</u> for faiths including Bahá'í, Buddhist, Hindu, Jewish, Muslim and Sikh. For details, contact Brother Andrew at the Chaplaincy.

Accessibility Services

Staying Safe

Safety and Security on campus

In an emergency situation off-campus, call the New Zealand emergency services on 111.

Please be prepared to state your name, location and whether you require the police, fire service or ambulance.

To contact the University security team, call the main University number which is monitored 24/7. Call 0800 WAIKATO (0800 924 5286) or +64 7 838 4610 (International).

If you need to contact a staff member urgently, the 24-hour contact number is 0800 WAIKATO or 64 7 856 2889.

On campus, Blue Light phones put you in direct contact with University security staff on campus. If you are ever feeling unsafe, witness suspicious behaviour or would like to request an escort to your car or residential hall, locate a Blue Phone (you will see the bright blue light) to speak to security.

If you have been treated unfairly by another student, including bullying, harmful behaviour or intimidation, in the first instance, contact the student advisors who will be able to advise you on the next steps. More information is provided about the Student Complaint procedure on page <u>21</u>.

Attendance

What is the Attendance requirement?

You will be required to attend their classes <u>at all times</u>, unless you have a genuine reason to be absent.

This includes:

- If you are sick
- If you have an *important* appointment, for example, with Immigration New Zealand, court hearings or the police. This generally does <u>not</u> include family or social occasions or holidays.

If you are going to be absent, you must advise the University of Waikato College as soon as you know.

Note: you must provide evidence for your absence, for example, a medical certificate, a letter from New Zealand Immigration.

How do I advise The University of Waikato College that I will be absent?

To advise the College, either tell your teacher the day before, or email the College reception (pathwayscollege@waikato.ac.nz) and tell them:

- Your name
- Your Student ID number
- The period of time you expect to be away
- Your reasons for being away.

If you are unsure what is required, please contact your student advisor.

What about medical certificates?

If you are sick and cannot come to class for three days or more, you must present a medical certificate.

The medical certificate should be on your doctor's official letterhead and include:

- The date you went to see the doctor
- The period of time that you were not able to come to class
- The doctor's name and signature
- An English translation where necessary.

Withdrawing From Your Programme

You are entitled to withdraw from your paper or programme at any time, for example, for family reasons or because of illness.

If you need to withdraw from your paper, you must follow the College's withdrawal procedure outlined below, starting with a discussion with a student advisor.

If you are withdrawing for personal reasons, you will not usually be eligible for any refund. However, it is still important to withdraw from the paper following the correct procedure.

For international students, you will need to confirm that your right to hold a Student Visa in New Zealand is not affected.

How to withdraw:

- 1. Talk to a student advisor to discuss your situation and refund options.
- 2. The Advisor will assist you with lodging an application to withdraw and applying for a refund (if applicable.)
- 3. To apply for a refund (after the withdrawal period) you will need to apply for a compassionate / medical withdrawal. Your Student Advisor can provide you with advice and support.
- 4. If you are an international student and intend to stay in New Zealand you will need to arrange for a new visa.



Complaints Procedure

The University of Waikato College has a process for dealing with student concerns and complaints. You should follow this procedure to ensure that any issues you have are resolved quickly and efficiently. The procedure covers the informal resolution of concerns and the formal complaints procedures including the rights and responsibilities of the parties involved.

- If you feel you have grounds to lodge a complaint, in the first instance, you are encouraged to raise it informally with the relevant staff member and seek a satisfactory resolution within the College. If necessary, you may discuss the situation with a student advisor in preparation for your informal discussion with the staff member.
- If it is not possible to resolve informally, you can formalise your complaint by submitting the details of your case and associated evidence on the form found here, which is considered by the College Director.
- If you feel this is a very serious situation, you may send your complaint direct to the Senior Deputy Vice-Chancellor.

Rights and Responsibilities of Parties to a Student Complaint

Parties to a student complaint have the right to:

- be treated with courtesy at all times
- a fair and timely investigation process in accordance with the principles of natural justice
- express their points of view without fear of recrimination
- receive full information at all stages of the complaint process
- be advised in writing of all decisions made in relation to the complaint
- appeal the outcome.

Parties to a student complaint have a responsibility to:

- treat all parties with courtesy at all times
- respect the points of view of others
- respect the rights of all parties to confidentiality
- ensure that the complaint is made in good faith and complies with the requirements of the Student Complaints Procedures
- provide full and accurate information to the person investigating the complaint
- not take any action that may prejudice the situation or be regarded as an act of recrimination against any other party.

For students studying English, our College is a member of English New Zealand. As an international student, if you have a complaint that we haven't been able to resolve, you may wish to contact our professional body and ask for assistance on 03 383 7153 or email <u>admin@englishnewzealand.co.nz</u>. If you are not satisfied, you can contact the New Zealand Qualifications Authority (NZQA) on 0800 697 296 or email <u>risk@nzqa.govt.nz</u> (regarding the <u>Education</u> (Pastoral Care of International Students) Code of Practice 2016) or iStudent Complaints on 0800 00 66 75 (regarding financial or contractual disputes).

Additional Information for International Students:

Learning culture

You may be an experienced student but still find that studying in the New Zealand environment is different from what you are used to. It is important for you to know what The University of Waikato College expects from you as a student. You may also experience a different 'learning culture' in our classrooms.

Your guide to the University of Waikato College classroom

- You can have strong opinions about issues, but you should also consider other opinions, and express your opinions gently.
- When you ask a question a New Zealand teacher might not answer your question directly. It is their role to help you find the answer. They might ask you what you think and/or ask the class to help you find the answer.
- When another student has a question, you should listen to the question and help with the answer if you can. You should listen to the answer. You should not talk when another student is asking a question. You will need to listen to other students.
- New Zealand teachers love students to take part in discussions. Politely interrupting the teacher with a question or an opinion is good in New Zealand. Remember - strong opinions but gentle words.
- New Zealand teachers love students to help each other. Helping each other means discussing
 the problem together. Helping each other does not mean copying your friend's work or letting
 your friend copy your work. Copying is plagiarism or cheating, and New Zealand teachers must
 fail copied work. For more information, refer to page 19.
- In New Zealand we communicate with words. We say what we think. When we are happy, we say we are happy. When we are sad, we say we are sad. There is no guessing needed. New Zealand teachers may speak more loudly and strongly when the information is important.

You are responsible for:

- Learning and doing your homework
- Speaking in English whenever you can (even at home)
- Creating good learning habits, eating well and getting good, regular sleep.

Things you must not do in class:

- Copy assignments and tests (remember that a good friend does not ask to copy an assignment)
- Sleep
- Chat (in your first language)

Answer your cellphone.


