CORINTO

Corinto is located on the Pacific coast of Nicaragua, in the province of Chinandega. Founded in the 19th century, it was a small town of great importance from the beginning thanks to its favourable geographical position.

Like the rest of the country, Corinto over the centuries was shaped by a rather tumultuous history involving the Spanish conquest, a brief occupation by the British, and a series of wars and revolutions in the 20th century. This has also contributed to the development of different forms of artistic expression, including primitivista paintings and the UNESCO-protected Güegüense.

However, nothing shapes life more in Nicaragua than ubiquitous rainforests, volcanoes — a total of 19 — and vast bodies of water, giving the country the nickname "the land of lakes and volcanoes." Fortunately for visitors to Corinto, the town is a great base for exploring some of the country's most stunning landmarks.

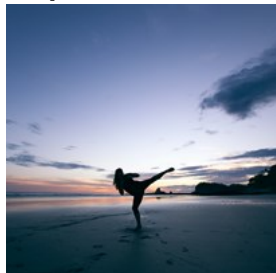
Isla El Cardón



With a length of just under a mile, El Cardón is a small rocky island off the coast of Corinto. It was once the home of Rubén Darío, Nicaraguan poet whose poems do not lack depictions of this small paradise. Today, the only sign of man is the iconic white lighthouse, so anyone visiting by boat will mostly encounter unspoilt nature, with the backdrop of crashing waves and squawking seagulls.

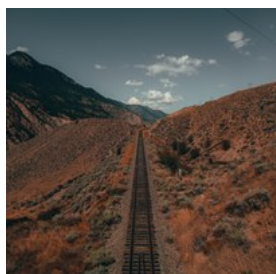
Playa Corinto

Railway of Corinto



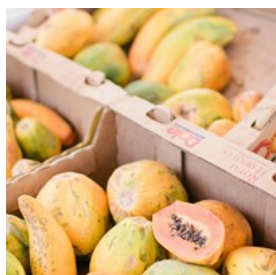
In the 19th century, Corinto was a central element in the first projects by the Nicaraguan government to construct rail lines in the country. As a result, León and Corinto were among the first cities connected by rail, with the port as the terminus of the line. In today's Corinto, a well-kept locomotive bears witness to that era, standing adjacent to the Museo Municipal, where further relics are on display.

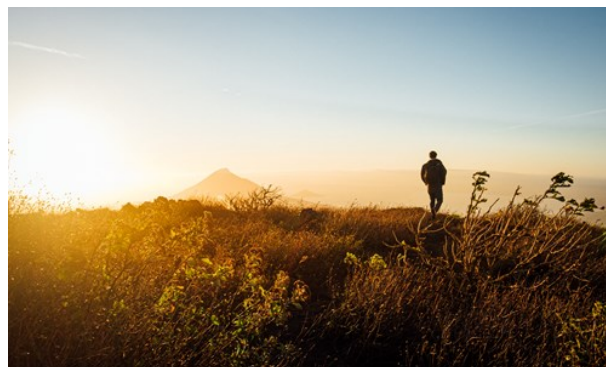

With colourful patches of nature reserves, regularly smoking volcanoes and shores washed by the Pacific, northwestern Nicaragua is a place unlike anything else, boasting not only lush nature but also interesting stories of history and culture.

Cathedral of León



Also known as the Cathedral of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, this eclectic cathedral is one of the most notable attractions in Nicaragua, which bears the influence of several nations and architectural styles. Built in the 18th and 19th centuries, it is the largest cathedral in Central America, where you can admire not only various works of art but also stunning views of the city of León.

Cerro Negro

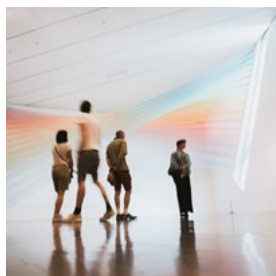


Standing 24 kilometres (15 miles) from the city of León, Cerro Negro is one of Nicaragua's youngest volcanoes. It appeared in the 1850s and is only 728

metres (2,388 feet) high, which makes it a popular choice for moderate hikes. And when it comes to the way back, why not slide down on a sandboard while cutting through the fine, black dust of this outlandish terrain — you won't be alone.

A well-frequented cultural centre with an extensive selection of artworks, made by local and foreign artists — including Picasso and

Andy Warhol — who created in a wide range of styles and periods. Along with its courtyards, the building complex is also a fine example of Leonese architecture from the 18th century.

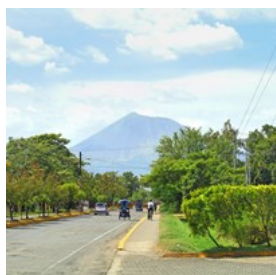

San Cristóbal is Nicaragua's highest volcano, rising to 1,745 metres (5,725 feet) as part of a volcanic complex. Although still

active today, it serves as an exciting destination

for a range of popular activities. Organized tours are usually available from León and Chinandega, allowing you to explore the nature reserve in the comfort of a vehicle or during a strenuous but all the more rewarding hike.

Flor de Caña Rum Distillery

Finca Emma Banana Plantation



A little over 32 kilometres (20 miles) from the port of Corinto is one of the world's largest banana plantations, covering 300 hectares (741 acres) of

land. Organized tours are available, where visitors can get a glimpse into the secrets of banana and plantain production. They usually also include a visit to Hacienda San Jerónimo, a famous sugar plantation from the colonial era.

A small but well-endowed museum in the eastern part of Chinandega, with a remarkable selection of pre-Columbian artefacts.

Due to its location in a residential area, it is also a good place to observe everyday life in a city whose history began well before the arrival of the Spanish.

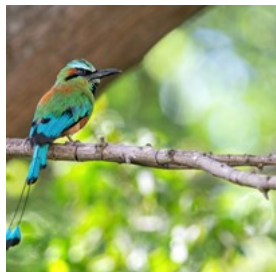

In a country which is home to over 700 species of birds — including the national bird, the turquoise-browed motmot — and natural reserves

covering 20% of its land, birdwatching is an activity of ever-growing in popularity. In the northwest, León is generally a popular base for such trips due to its proximity to areas such as the Isla Juan Venado Natural Reserve and the Volcan Telica Rota Natural Reserve.

Best Time to Visit



The dry season in Nicaragua runs from November to May. This time of year is preferred by most tourists over the wet season that follows, especially if your itinerary includes hiking and visiting volcanos. From June to October, the crowds are usually smaller and occasional downpours do not mean that your stay will not be enjoyable.

Passport & Visa



All visitors to Nicaragua must hold a passport valid for at least six months. Generally speaking, citizens of countries in the Global North and Latin America can visit Nicaragua visa-free. Holders of passports of from 91 jurisdictions can visit Nicaragua without a visa for up to 90 days, provided they show proof of sufficient funds to cover their stay and documents required for next destination.

Citizens of 74 more countries and territories can visit Nicaragua by obtaining a visa on arrival. Passport holders of many African and Asian countries are granted a visa on arrival for US\$50 provided the passport contains a credible US, Canada or Schengen visa.

Augusto C. Sandino International Airport (MGA)



Nicaragua's largest international airport is located in the capital, Managua, around 160 km (100 miles) from Corinto, with the major cities of León and Chinandega on the way. Travelers can avail of a range of services at the airport, including car rental, shops, ATMs and hotels.
