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


HISTORY.

The competition that was to develop and become known as The Amateur Championship was first held at Hoylake in 1885. Proposed by Thomas Owen Potter, the championship was contested by a total of 44 players from 12 clubs. Allan Macfie defeated Horace Hutchinson 7&6 in the Final to become the first champion.

Following the success of the first event, it was agreed that a Championship open to all amateur golfers should be played at St Andrews, Hoylake and Prestwick in rotation. Representatives, known as Delegates of the Associated Clubs, were elected from these clubs to run the Championship until 1919, when The R&A adopted the Championship.

John Ball won a record eight Amateur Championships between 1888 and 1912, while Sir Michael Bonallack triumphed five times between 1961 and 1970. The 1984 champion José María Olazábal and the 1998 champion



Sergio Garcia have both gone on to win major titles.

With the Championship's popularity and reach at record levels, an 18 hole pre-qualifying event was introduced in 2022, enhancing the opportunity for players throughout the world to qualify. In 2024, pre-qualifying for non-exempt players will take place over the Old Links at Ballyliffin. Thereafter, the first stage of the Championship involves 288 players, each of whom plays two rounds of 18 hole stroke play qualifying over both courses (Old Links & Glashedy Links) The lowest 64 scores and ties will compete in the match play stage of the Championship over the Glashedy Links at Ballyliffin. Each match will consist of one round of 18 holes, except the Final which will be played over 36 holes.

NOTABLE WINNERS.

Six Amateur champions have also won major championships. Many have represented Great Britain and Ireland in the Walker Cup. Some have taken their place in the Ryder Cup.

JOHN BALL JNR'S name is synonymous with the early days of The Amateur. He lifted the trophy eight times (1888, 1890, 1892, 1894, 1899, 1907, 1910 and 1912). Ball also won The Open in 1890 at Prestwick, becoming not only the first Amateur to win The Open, but the first Englishman.

The 1930 Amateur Championship at St Andrews is one of the greatest in history. It was in that year that **BOBBY JONES** won his only Amateur title. It was an important milestone for it was the first leg of his journey to the Grand Slam of The Amateur, US Amateur, The Open and US Open, known then as the “Impregnable Quadrilateral.” Jones won three Opens, four US Opens and five US amateurs. He retired from competitive golf after the 1930 Amateur and created Augusta National and the Masters Tournament.

INTERESTING FACT.

OLDEST CHAMPION: The Honourable Michael Scott was 54 and a grandfather when he won the 1933 Championship at Royal Liverpool.

SIR MICHAEL BONALLACK'S record of winning three years in succession (1968-1970) will probably never be matched considering many champions don't remain in the amateur game these days. Bonallack, who would go on to become secretary of The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St Andrews until 1999, also won the English Amateur on five occasions. He played in nine consecutive Walker Cups between 1957 and 1973, captaining the Great Britain and Ireland team in 1969 and 1971, leading a team to victory at St Andrews as Captain in the 1971 contest.

PETER McEVOY OBE took over the reins from Bonallack in the 1970s as England's top amateur. He won back-to-back titles in 1977 and 1978, the last player to win consecutive titles. He played in five Walker Cups between 1977 and 1989, missing the 1983 and 1987 matches before being a member of the 1989 Great Britain and Ireland team that recorded a first away victory. He also captained the 1999 and 2001 teams to victory, the first GB&I teams to win consecutive matches.

Many watching the 1984 final at Formby might not have realised they were watching two future superstars. **JOSÉ MARÍA OLAZÁBAL** defeated Colin Montgomerie 5&4 as part of a unique R&A triple in which the Spaniard won the Boys' Amateur in 1983 and Youths Amateur in 1985. Olazabal is one of a select band of Amateur champions to go onto earn a major title, winning the Masters Tournament in 1994 and 1999. He has won 21 times on the now DP World Tour, achieved six PGA Tour wins, played in seven Ryder Cups and captained the victorious European team in 2012.

INTERESTING FACT.
YOUNGEST CHAMPION: Italy's Matteo Manassero was 16 when he defeated England's Sam Hutsby 4&3 at Formby in 2009.

SERGIO GARCIA'S 7&6 victory over Welshman Craig Williams at Muirfield in 1998 made him the second Spanish winner after Olazabal. Like his compatriot, he owns a green jacket, winning the 2017 Masters Tournament. He has also collected 15 DP World Tour trophies, 11 PGA Tour titles and holds the record for most Ryder Cup points with 28½ points from ten appearances, six times as a member of the winning team.

England's **GRAEME STORM** continued a run, begun by Garcia in 1998, with his 1999 win at Royal County Down that would see four straight champions go on to become DP World Tour winners. Storm has two victories. Finland's Mikko Ilonen amassed five wins before announcing his retirement in 2019. Northern Ireland's Michael Hoey graduated from his 2001 win to match Ilonen's five tournament win tally.

INTERESTING FACT.
BIGGEST COMEBACK: In the 2021 Final at Nairn, Laird Shepherd was eight down after 17 holes and still four down with four to play against fellow Englishman, Monty Scowsill, but recovered to level the match at the 36th. Shepherd eventually triumphed when Scowsill three-putted at the 38th.

MATTEO MANASSERO became The Amateur's youngest winner when he carried off the title at Formby in 2009. He is a four-time DP World Tour winner, a tally that includes the 2013 BMW PGA Championship.


