number of bestselling children's picture books, illustrated by Charles Fuge. And 2005 she graduated with a distinction from the PG


Cert in Professional Photography, at Central Saint Martins School of Art & Design. Currently, Vicki is studying a part-time MA in

Creative Writing at Oxford Brookes, graduating in 2020.


Charles Fuge made his picture book debut in 1988 with *Bushvark's First Day Out*, which won both the Macmillan Prize and the

series has garnered international recognition for its warm and humorous depiction of an iconic marsupial.




Hour of the Bees




So the shortest day came, and the year died...






The Boy and the Gorilla

Dear Reader,


I wanted to write a story with glass at its heart. I used to work with glass – selling materials to tradespeople and crafters, teaching methods and techniques, learning from my colleagues in the studio and making my own artwork.

During this time my fascination for it exploded and I absorbed every detail I could. That glass has an atomic structure more like a liquid. That it's often coloured with metals and gold turns it pink and red. These details all inspired me. A former monk even taught me how to engrave! In the world of glass, I found a meeting of science and art, history and innovation, and discovered the magic that utterly bewitched me.

This book is all about that meeting point — between worlds and ideas, what we can see and what we feel. For the hero of the story, Nona, it's about opening up her world to all the possibilities that lie beyond the trauma of her past — and fighting for a future. I wanted to explore Nona's relationships, not only with her uncle — the stained glass craftsman — but with all the characters in the book. But I wanted to delve into so much more, too. The concept of reassembling a life after yours has been blown apart. And the healing power of art, nurturing and love, that can help a person find the strength to face even their most dreaded demons.

My hope is for children reading this story to feel like they're looking through a window into another world, and for that window to show them whatever they need to see. Whether it's what family and community look like to them, what gives them strength and makes them unique, or what it means to live through life-changing – even world-changing – events. And afterwards, I hope they return to the world with ideas, and a piece of magic in their hands.


