These adaptations will accommodate the student's individual disability as much as possible, but may not alter the quality or degree of difficulty of a unit of study or an examination. In all cases, the student must fulfil the exit qualifications for the study programme. The request referred to in the first paragraph must be accompanied by a statement from a doctor or psychologist. If possible, an estimate should be given of the potential impact on the student's study progress. In case of a chronic disability a single (one time) request suffices. - 4. is able to problematize and analyse in depth a problem of considerable complexity from the field of Ancient Studies;
- 5. is able to conduct academic research in the field of Ancient Studies in a critical, creative and inventive manner and to propose solutions to the problems identified;
- 6. is able to explain and justify the choices he or she makes in his or her research with clarity, both in writing and orally;
- 7. has a thorough understanding of the relationship between Ancient Studies and society and is able to articulate with clarity the role and significance of antiquity for the present day as well as to assess this in a critical manner.
