623,988 Low-Income North Carolinians Connected to Benefits in 2022-2023

Thanks to federal funding that supports efforts to find and enroll low-income people on Medicare into benefits they are eligible for, 623,988 low-income older and disabled North Carolinians received assistance that can help them to afford their prescription drugs and doctor visits.

This federal funding supports North Carolina's:

- State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP)
- **16** Area Agencies on Aging (AAAs)
- 1 Benefits Enrollment Center (BEC)

Funding also supports BenefitsCheckUp®, a free online screening and enrollment tool.

These organizations help older adults making less than \$22,000 a year apply for:

- Medicare Part D Low-Income Subsidy (LIS/Extra Help)
- Medicare Savings Programs (MSPs)



Thanks to previous federal funding, in 2022-2023:

- 504,688 Medicare beneficiaries and their caregivers in North Carolina received help with access to low-income benefits
- **119,300** North Carolinians used BenefitsCheckUp® to connect with benefits online

... But Far Too Many Are Still Missing Out

 680,731 Medicare beneficiaries in North Carolina are living at or below 150% of the federal poverty level and need help affording health care

Mr. G's Story

As he approached age 65, Mr. G began to worry about how he would afford Part B premiums when he enrolled in Medicare. A benefits counselor screened him for Medicaid and Medicare Extra Help. As winter was arriving, the counselor also encouraged him to apply for the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program. She walked Mr. G through the process. Shortly before Christmas, Mr. G received news that he was eligible for all. He was overjoyed at starting the new year with greater financial security.
