Introductions

• K. Nelson and Dr. David Hardy, HTF Co-Chairs, called the meeting to order, conducted introductions, and welcomed attendees the meeting.

Co-Chairs' Report:

- K. Nelson referred attendees to the packet for the meeting summary for the April 25, 2025 meeting. She also reviewed the workplan and reminded the group about completing the housing survey as a key deliverable for 2025.
- HTF members inquired about the status and future of LAHSA in light of the Board's
 decision to pull their share of funding to LAHSA and the creation of a Department in the
 County to address housing.
- Members indicated that LAHSA will remain in some way under a much more focused charge such as conducting the annual homeless count. 43% of LAHSA budget has been cut and some services have closed as a result.
- D. Hardy note that the HTF should keep track of the meetings and Board discussions on the formation of the new Department.
- The housing survey may help inform service transitions and policy decisions. Consider including a question on impact on access centers and intake process.


