3. Expanding County Action to Reduce Greenhouse Gas Emissions through Food Procurement

Recommendation as submitted by Supervisors Horvath and Solis: Instruct the Director of Public Health and the Chief Sustainability Officer, in coordination with the Chief Executive Officer, the Director of Internal Services, and County Counsel, where applicable, to do the following:

Work with County Departments to develop a protocol for amending existing contracts if feasible, and integrate the Department of Public Health's (DPH's) updated *Standards for Prepared Foods, Snacks, and Beverages* in all new and renewing County food service solicitations and contracts;

Develop evaluation criteria for use in food service Requests for Proposals, where new criteria should encourage plans and/or proposals that incorporate more plant-based food options and prioritize local growers, when fiscally feasible;

Collect annual food purchasing data from County Departments that purchase, serve, or distribute food, and in all new and renewing food service contracts, County Departments shall develop contract language that requires all food vendors to share annual food purchasing data;

Provide an annual report back to the Board on the total amount of meat, poultry, fish, dairy and egg products, and the total amount of plant-based food products for all County Departments that purchase, serve, or distribute food, including County vendors, including a section highlighting annual changes, the status of contracts that have been updated with the new food standards, and progress towards emissions reduction goals, with the first report back to the Board in writing in 180 days, including any potential cost impacts of the new food model and related to the development of an annual report; and

Instruct the Chief Sustainability Officer and the Director of Public Health, in coordination with the Director of Internal Services, to do the following:

Establish a baseline level of greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions and, when feasible, identify additional environmental and social impacts related to County food products; and explore incorporating the food-based emission data into the County's municipal GHG inventory;

Using the established baseline, create food-based emissions and impact reduction targets for the next decade, consider aligning targets with the World Resources Institute's "Coolfood Pledge" and adding the targets as part of the OurCounty Sustainability Plan update;

Use the annual purchasing report from the above directive, generate an annual climate impact report and post it publicly on an online dashboard on DPH's website, where the report should track progress towards reduction targets and consider using sources like World Resources Institute; and

Create and disseminate educational materials to County Departments on ways to meet the food-based emissions targets, where the materials should be informed by the 2024 Departmental survey and include information related to animal-based products' environmental and social impacts. (25-0195)

4. Enhancing the Continuum of Care for Former Foster Youth and Those Exiting Department of Children and Family Service's Care

Recommendation as submitted by Supervisors Horvath and Barger: Instruct the Director of Children and Family Services, in collaboration with the Prevention and Promotion Coordination Implementation Team (PPCIT), the Executive Director of the Homeless Initiative, Chief Executive Office, and with other County Department Heads, including the Directors of Mental Health, Public Health, Health Services, Public Social Services, Justice Care and Opportunities, Consumer and Business Affairs, Economic Opportunity, and Youth Development, the County Librarian, the Chief Executive Officer of the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority and the Executive Director of the Los Angeles County Development Authority, to report back to the Board in writing in 180 days on the following:

An assessment of the bed capacity needed and utilization rates of existing resources for all interim and permanent housing resources, including emergency housing, for young people exiting care up to age 21;

An assessment of the bed capacity needed and utilization rates of existing resources for all interim and permanent housing resources, including emergency housing, for former foster youth ages 21 through 26;

In collaboration with PPCIT, an assessment of existing programs to identify which programs can be better aligned to serve young people exiting care and those that have exited care, as well as recommendations for shifting resources to both better meet the needs and desires of young people exiting the foster care system and those who have already exited foster care;

Work to identify and designate sustainable funding for guaranteed same-day access and wraparound supportive services, including meals, basic needs resources, and onsite case management, mental health supports, transportation, and education and employment services, for youth aging out of foster care, including CalAIM community supports and enhanced care management, and the strategies to implement and maximize these resources; The housing supports and services for current Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) involved youth, former DCFS youth, and young people not impacted or involved with the DCFS system, reporting back to the Board on the continuum of resources and housing options, with work to include engagement with youth with lived experience; and

An assessment by Service Planning Area of the rate of exits from foster care and the need for same-day housing placements for young people exiting foster care or falling out of their transition plans; and

Instruct the Prevention and Promotion Services Governing Committee (PPSGC), with support from the Executive Directors of the Homeless Initiative, Chief Executive Office, and the Center for Strategic Partnership, to take the following actions:

In collaboration with other County Departments and partners, including, but not limited to, the Directors of Mental Health, Public Health, Health Services, Public Social Services, Justice Care and Opportunities, Consumer and Business Affairs, Economic Opportunity, Youth Development and Probation, the Chief Executive Officer of the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority, the County Librarian and the Executive Director of the Los Angeles County Development Authority, to engage stakeholders to develop additional strategies and efficiencies to support the Transition Age Youth population, and regularly report back to the Board on those efforts at PPSGC;

In coordination with the Director of Children and Family Services and the Chief Probation Officer, recommend improvements to transition and exit planning for young people exiting these systems, to enable young people to access safe and secure housing, including immediate access to alternative resources in the event of a disruption to a young person's plan, before their exit;

Explore the feasibility of prioritizing former foster youth ages 21+ who are facing housing insecurity and need housing supports and services for the Coordinated Entry System, including young people who have recently exited care but whose housing plans fell through after exit, and report back to the Board in writing in 180 days, including strategies and recommendations to ensure the County can build out an adequate and supportive infrastructure for young people who have exited care, particularly those between the ages of 21 through 26; and

Report back to the Board in writing in 180 days and then bi-annually, on the progress of this group and with opportunities for additional funding or challenges to the collective effort of preventing foster youth homelessness in the County. (25-0187)

Executive Committee members shall include the Chair of the Board of Supervisors, who shall serve as Chair of the Executive Committee, Alternate Public Defender, Chief Executive Officer, Chief Probation Officer, the Directors of Mental Health, Public Health, Justice, Care, and Opportunities, the District Attorney, Los Angeles City Attorney, Los Angeles Police Chief, Mayor of the City of Los Angeles, President of the County Prosecutors Association, President of the Los Angeles County Police Chiefs Association, a representative appointed by the Presiding Judge of the Superior Court, the Public Defender, the Sheriff, and the Executive Director of the California Contract Cities Association;

Members shall not be permitted to designate proxies/alternates for the Executive Committee; the Executive Committee should meet, at minimum, every other month until and unless the Executive Committee establishes an alternative schedule of meetings; the Executive Committee shall have the authority to act on behalf of the full CCJCC general membership, including addressing membership issues, establishing and organizing subcommittees, amending the committee's bylaws and organizational rules, and making recommendations to the Board of Supervisors or any other agency as appropriate; CCJCC's Executive Director and staff shall provide administrative, and staff support to the Executive Committee as they do for the CCJCC general membership; and

Review and amend the Committee's bylaws within 60 days, including to reflect the establishment of the Executive Committee and other updates, as needed; and develop a meeting format and structure for convening meetings of both the Executive Committee and General Membership that supports collaboration and alignment throughout CCJCC's overall operation. Raising awareness of healthy familial and romantic relationship dynamics;

Plans and resources needed to facilitate a public outreach campaign, in multiple languages, that is culturally responsive and inclusive of different gender identities and sexual orientations, and utilizes traditional, ethnic, hyperlocal, and social media to raise awareness on intimate or domestic violence, prevention, and existing County resources; and Request the Sheriff to report back to the Board in writing in 120 days with a feasibility study on options to better partner and develop a coordinated response to the needs of people experiencing domestic or intimate partner violence, their families, and abusers. 19. Equity Needs Assessment of Los Angeles County 2025 Report Sole Source Contract

Execute amendments that allow the rollover of unspent contract funds, if allowable by the grantor, provide an increase or decrease in funding up to 10% above or below the annual base maximum obligation, effective upon amendment execution, or at the beginning of the applicable contract period, correct errors in the contracts' terms and conditions and/or update the statement of work and/or scope of work, as necessary, extend the term up to six additional months, as needed, through December 31, 2025, at amounts determined by the Director, contingent upon the availability of funds and contractor performance;

Execute change notices to the contracts that authorize modifications to the budget with corresponding modifications to the statement of work and/or scope of work, that are within the same scope of services, as necessary, and changes to hours of operation and/or service locations; and

Immediately suspend or terminate the contracts upon issuing a written notice if contractors fail to perform and/or fully comply with contract requirements, and terminate the contracts for convenience by providing a 30-calendar day advance written notice to contractors. (24-5830)

In accordance with the Brown Act, all matters to be acted on by the Board must be posted at least 72 hours prior to the Board meeting. In cases of an emergency, or when a subject matter needs immediate action or comes to the attention of the Board subsequent to the agenda being posted, upon making certain findings, the Board may act on an item that was not on the posted agenda.

The majority of the Board's Tuesday agenda is a consent calendar. All matters included on the consent calendar (including Board of Supervisors items and Administrative Matters) may be approved by one motion unless held by a Board Member for discussion. During the reading of the Agenda, the Executive Officer will indicate which items have been requested to be held for discussion or continued to a future meeting, and the remaining items will be approved. Items which are set for a certain time may or may not be called up at exactly the time indicated, depending on the business of the Board. The items that are held for discussion may be taken up at any time, depending on the business of the Board. Each item includes a brief summary of the Board member's motion or department's recommended action, and in some instances, a corresponding recommendation from the Chief Executive Officer, indicated in capital letters.

Included at the end of each agenda are items which have been continued from previous meetings for further discussion and action by the Board. This portion of the agenda is commonly referred to as the "A-item Agenda." At the request of a Supervisor, the A-items may be called up for consideration at any time.
