**Review of Contacts by School Resource
Deputies with Elementary and Middle
School Students**

June 11, 2024

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INTRODUCTION

In two prior reports, the Office of Inspector General examined the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department's (Sheriff's Department) contacts with school-age youth in the Lancaster School District and reported on racial disparities in those contacts.¹ The more recent report focused on contacts by School Resource Deputies (SRDs), which the Department provides under contract with school districts to provide on-campus police services, and identified 21 such contacts of elementary school students and 165 contacts of middle school students during the single school year reviewed.

Because of the potential impact these contacts with younger students may have on their emotional and academic growth, the Office of Inspector General in this report reviews additional documentation for the contacts with elementary and middle school students to examine the reasons for and outcomes of those contacts. This report assesses the appropriateness of the contacts and makes recommendations for Sheriff's Department's policies and practices related to SRDs and contacts with youth, in order to improve school climate and minimize adverse impacts on students.

BACKGROUND

In its prior report, [*Allegations of Racial Disparities in Contacts with High School Youth by the Sheriff's Department's Lancaster Station*](#) (Racial Disparity Report), the Office of Inspector General reviewed publicly reported data for the 2019-2020 school year to determine whether there were racial disparities in contacts made by Sheriff's Department deputies of students who attend school in the Lancaster School District. The analysis revealed that deputies disproportionately made contact with Black high-school-aged students more than any other race group at or near Lancaster School District high schools. For school year reviewed, Black high school students made up only 17.9% of total student enrollment, yet over 66% of the contacts made by Lancaster Station deputies at or around high schools involved Black high school aged people. Deputies also cited and arrested Black youth at disproportionately higher rates than other race groups.

These findings are troubling given that the Sheriff's Department Antelope Valley stations in the cities of Lancaster and Palmdale were previously found to have engaged in a pattern and practice of conducting unconstitutional stops, searches, and seizures that ultimately caused the Department in 2015 to enter into a settlement agreement with the U.S. Department of Justice that mandates reforms and oversight by a court-appointed monitor.² Despite the ongoing monitoring under the settlement agreement, the Office of Inspector General's review of Sheriff's Department data from 2019-2020 reveals that Lancaster Station deputies still disproportionately contacted Black people, who accounted for 43.4% of all contacts by Lancaster Station deputies while making up only 20.5 % of the population of Lancaster.³

On June 28, 2022, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors passed a series of motions related to SRDs. A previous motion passed on June 8, 2021, delegated authority to the Inspector General to review and approve each amendment to the contracts between the Sheriff's Department and school districts for the provision of on-campus police services, to include SRDs, prior to the execution of those contract grants and any amendments thereafter. In response to these motions, the Office of Inspector General reported on SRD contacts with students at all school districts contracting with the Sheriff's Department in a report titled [Report Back on Improving School Climate and Safety](#) (School Climate Report) published on April 18, 2023.

In the School Climate Report, the Office of Inspector General examined 811 SRD school contacts: 625 related to high-school-aged students, 165 related to middle-school-aged students, and 21 related to elementary-school-aged students.⁴ The analysis examined the 811 SRD contacts in two groups: 1) SRD contacts from the Lancaster School District, and 2) SRD contacts from schools outside of Lancaster.⁵ The Office of Inspector General bifurcated this analysis to verify the prior findings in the Racial Disparity Report and to compare the level of disproportionality observed in other

school districts, if any, with the known disproportionality found in the schools serviced by Lancaster Station SRDs.

The Office of Inspector General found that in the schools outside of the city of Lancaster, Sheriff's Department deputies disproportionately contacted Black and Hispanic students in comparison to their percentage of school enrollment. In the Lancaster schools, only Black students were disproportionately contacted, but the degree of disproportionality of Black student contacts was much higher in the Lancaster schools than in the schools outside of Lancaster.

The Office of Inspector General noted concern about the number of general contacts of younger students and the impacts these contacts have on student's emotional and academic growth. At the time the Office of Inspector General published the School Climate Report, the Sheriff's Department had not yet provided all of the documentation for the contacts with elementary and middle school students. The documentation was made available to Office of Inspector General staff as of June 9, 2023. This report analyzes that documentation and makes recommendations regarding SRD contacts with students and recommendations for amendments to the contracts between the Sheriff's Department and the school districts.

INTERACTIONS BETWEEN SCHOOL RESOURCE DEPUTIES AND ELEMENTARY AND MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS

The School Climate Report found that out of a total 811 SRD contacts with elementary, middle, and high school students logged during the period of observation, 21 (2.5% of total contacts) were of elementary school age students and 165 (20.3% of total contacts) were of middle school students.⁶ The Office of Inspector General analyzed the contacts with elementary and middle school students in an effort to determine the reasonableness of the contacts and to make recommendations. Many of the contacts contained only the most basic information about the stop and failed to provide any factual summary of the basis and outcome of the contact. Due to the lack of documentation and transparency by the Sheriff's Department, the Office of Inspector General can make only partial findings at this time.

METHODOLOGY

The Office of Inspector General reviewed Sheriff's Department documentation related to the elementary and middle school contacts, including citations, incident reports (SH-49), supplemental reports, Juvenile Information Form (JIF), Statement of Facts (SH-CR-

607), School Truancy Arrest Reports, and Regional Allocation of Police Services System (RAPS) 300 Reports. In summarizing the data, the Office of Inspector General separately analyzed the elementary school contacts and middle school contacts.

ANALYSIS OF SRD CONTACTS WITH ELEMENTARY SCHOOL STUDENTS

For the school year encompassing July 2019 to June 2020, Sheriff's Department SRDs contacted 21 elementary school aged students (ages 5 through 11). These contacts were conducted by the Lancaster Station's SRDs in 10 elementary schools in the Antelope Valley. SRD contacts included alleged assaults on students or school employees, fights between students, and student mental health incidents. The majority of contacts involved the mental health of a student.

The following table provides summarizes the reasons for the contacts (according to the involved SRD's notes) and range of outcomes for each type of contact. A detailed list of the reasons for and outcome of each contact is appended as Attachment A.

Based on the documentation of SRDs' contacts with elementary school students, the Office of Inspector General observed several trends:

- **Resource Availability:** In multiple instances, the county's Psychiatric Mobile Response Team (PMRT) and the Sheriff's Department's MET team were unavailable to respond to calls for assistance for student mental health issues.

This indicates gaps in resources, limiting the timely intervention and support for students in distress, and leaving law enforcement as the only available option to transport youth for an evaluation.

- **Transportation to Local Hospitals:** The SRDs often transport students to local hospitals for psychiatric evaluations and place them on holds under Welfare and Institutions Code section 5585 when they perceive a risk to the students' safety. While this means that SRDs may play a critical role as first responders in ensuring students receive the necessary mental health care, especially in cases where PMRT or MET is unable to timely respond, there is a potential for negative impact upon the mental health of children when they are transported by law enforcement and have extended contact with SRDs when there has been no crime or other misconduct.
- **Absence of Arrests or Citations:** None of the SRDs' contacts with elementary students led to any arrests, citations, or prosecutions. While this may suggest SRDs play a role more like a counselor than a law enforcement officer, school discipline of elementary students should be handled by school administrators. Even without direct punishment, the record of an SRD's contact with a youth may stay in law enforcement records and be used against the youth later. The interaction may also cause trauma.

Appropriateness of Contacts

- The SRDs' contacts of students appear appropriate, as SRDs appear to have initiated contacts only in circumstances that posed a risk to the safety of the student or others.
- The contacts resulted in counseling for the involved youth rather than punitive actions such as arrest or citation. This aligns with the SRDs' role as advocates for student welfare, but SRDs should not be meeting this need absent an immediate threat of harm to others or a threat of self-harm by a student.

The following recommendations may aid schools and the Sheriff's Department in enhancing the role of SRDs to better meet the mental health needs of elementary school students:

Recommendations

1. **Increase Funding for Mental Health Emergency Response Teams:** The unavailability of PMRT and MET teams suggests a need for increased resources for mental health crisis response teams.
2. **Mental Health Follow Ups:** While the lack of other available resources meant that SRDs played a crucial role in immediate crisis intervention, there is a need

for additional mental health support and follow-up to address underlying issues affecting students' well-being.

- 3. Comprehensive Mental Health Programs:** The data highlights the necessity for comprehensive mental health programs in elementary schools to identify and support students at risk.

ANALYSIS OF SRD CONTACTS WITH MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS

For the 2019-2020 school year, Sheriff's Department SRDs contacted 165 middle school students (aged 11 through 14). SRDs from Lancaster, Century, Palmdale, Santa Clarita, and Lakewood stations conducted these contacts in 18 middle schools located in school districts that contract with the Sheriff's Department.

The data collected includes 165 documented contacts between SRDs and middle school students. The contacts varied in nature and involved a range of incidents such as fights, truancy, possession of prohibited items, and confrontations with school staff. Office of Inspector General staff reviewed the documentation for each contact to gain insight into the effectiveness of SRD interventions and their impact on students and the school environment.

The following table summarizes the reasons for the SRDs contact with middle school students and the range of outcomes for different types of contacts. A detailed list of the reasons for and outcome of each SRD contact with middle-school students is appended as Attachment B.

Based on the documentation of these contacts, the Office of Inspector General made several observations:

- Law Enforcement Involvement:** SRDs were frequently contacted by school administration or school security personnel regarding incidents requiring law enforcement intervention. A total of 140 of 165 middle school contacts (86.0%) involved violence, drugs, weapons, or other crimes (including battery, threats, possession of weapons or drugs, sexual assault, and assault on school staff) for which law enforcement intervention was appropriate.⁹
- Citations and Arrests:** In 137 of 165 contacts (83%), SRDs detained students and issued them notices to appear for legal proceedings through citations, thus

initiating a formal legal process before releasing them to their parents or guardians. In only one case did the SRDs criminally book a student and transport them to a juvenile hall.

- **Parental Involvement:** Parents or guardians were notified and involved in the resolution process in 15% (24 of 165) of the cases either through release or counseling sessions.
- **Varied Responses:** SRDs utilized a range of responses, including counseling, detention, citation, arrest, and involvement of specialized units like the Sheriff's Department's MET team.
- **Truancy Concerns:** In 25 of 165 incidents (15%), the SRD listed truancy as the reason for the contact. Truancy is an administrative issue that does not rise to the level of criminal conduct for the student involved. As such, the frequency of these contacts indicates a need to limit the role of law enforcement in this setting. Truancy among middle school students may be addressed in an administrative setting, without law enforcement intervention. The high frequency of truancy incidents raises concerns about the effectiveness of SRD involvement as a strategy to combat this issue. Furthermore, unnecessary SRD contacts or interactions with students needlessly increase the risk of negative outcomes or uses of force.
- **Staff Safety:** A number of contacts resulted from students physically assaulting school staff, behavior that would rise to the level of criminal conduct and for which SRDs would be an appropriate response.
- **Fights and Assaults:** Several incidents reportedly involved physical altercations between students. In most cases, SRDs counseled and released the students, and respected parents' decisions not to seek criminal charges.
- **Drug and Weapon Possession:** The contacts included incidents of drug possession, including marijuana and THC vape pens, and knives. SRDs cited and released the students in possession. Such behavior constitutes criminal conduct, so that SRDs would be an appropriate response.
- **Threats and Cyberbullying:** Instances of students making criminal threats towards others and engaging in cyberbullying were documented. Some incidents escalated to physical confrontations. SRDs actions included counseling and issuing citations. Unless students engage in criminal conduct, counseling should be handled by school administrators rather than SRDs. As to criminal threats or related assaults consummated by battery, such behavior constitutes criminal conduct, indicating that SRDs would be an appropriate response.

- **Mental Health Concerns:** A small number of contacts occurred when students expressed mental health issues, including suicidal thoughts. SRDs collaborated with Sheriff's Department's MET teams to address these concerns, leading to transportation to the hospital for evaluation and possible mental health holds. As with elementary school students, while this means that SRDs may play a critical role as first responders in ensuring students receive the necessary mental health care, especially in cases where PMRT or MET is unable to timely respond, there is a potential for negative impact upon the mental health of children when they are transported by law enforcement and have extended contact with SRDs when there has been no criminal conduct.

Appropriateness of Contacts

- In most instances, the SRDs responded to situations involving criminal conduct such as fights, drug and weapon possession, battery on school employees, and threats on school grounds.
- SRDs also served as first responders to mental health emergencies. Once responding and assessing the situation, SRDs acted as liaisons between mental health professionals and fire department personnel.
- After engaging with students, SRDs, in the majority of the contacts, opted for alternatives to arrest and prosecution, such as:
 - *Citing truant students:* SRDs cited students for habitual truancy, reinforcing the importance of attending school regularly while discouraging further absenteeism.
 - *Respecting victims' elections as to participation or declination to prosecute:* When victims or their parents did not wish to press criminal charges, SRDs respected their decisions and opted for counseling in lieu of further action.
 - *Utilizing citations for non-criminal issues:* SRDs used citations for disruptive behavior, disturbances of peace, and non-violent incidents, addressing minor infractions without resorting to severe punitive measures.
 - *Promoting conflict resolution:* SRDs counseled students involved in fights, emphasizing the importance of resolving conflicts peacefully. However, school administrations, rather than SRDs, should have this role.
 - *Counseling for student altercations:* In many cases, SRDs counseled students involved in physical altercations. SRDs should only counsel

students if there is a crime. Otherwise, non-criminal altercations should be handled by school staff.

Recommendations

The Office of Inspector General recommends the following strategies to enhance the effectiveness of SRDs and ensure the well-being of students and staff members.

1. **Tuancy:** Strengthen truancy prevention measures in an administrative setting, including early intervention programs and proactive engagement with students, parents, and school staff. Prohibit the response of SRDs for incidents solely related to truancy and other administrative concerns.
2. **Training and Professional Development:** Provide ongoing training and professional development opportunities for SRDs to enhance their skills in conflict resolution, crisis management, de-escalation, and supporting students' mental health needs.
3. **Stronger collaboration and communication:** Foster stronger collaboration and communication between SRDs, school administration, and school staff to ensure a coordinated and holistic approach in addressing student behavior issues that encourages school staff to administer school discipline and SRDs to focus on criminal behavior.
4. **Parental Notification:** Require that SRDs and school administration work together to notify parents or guardians of any search, detention, citation, or arrest of their children conducted by an SRD on school grounds, and any record of a contact with their children entered into a Sheriff's Department or other law enforcement database.
5. **Regular follow-ups and support:** Establish a system for regular follow-up and support for students involved in serious incidents, connecting them with appropriate resources and monitoring their progress. Provide continued monitoring and support for students involved in serious incidents, such as assault or possession of prohibited items, can aid in their rehabilitation and prevent recurrences.
6. **Periodic Reviews:** Conduct yearly reviews and assessments of the SRD program to evaluate its overall effectiveness, identifying areas for improvement and making necessary adjustments.

IDENTIFYING MECHANISMS FOR REFORM AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The Office of Inspector General continues to advocate for the recommendations in its two previous reports on SRDs, the [Racial Disparity Report](#) and [School Climate Report](#).

The Office of Inspector General also makes the following additional recommendations based on all reports pertaining to SRDs:

- The position of School Resource Deputy should be a Bonus Deputy position.
- Deputies selected as SRDs should have a minimum of ten years of law enforcement experience or five years of patrol deputy experience.
- Complaints regarding SRDs should go to the Community Partnerships Bureau so that they are centralized.
- Performance evaluations of SRDs should be done by the Community Partnerships Bureau.
- SRDs should wear uniforms similar to MET uniforms, such as a polo shirt, so that they are less intimidating to students.
- Amend contracts between the Sheriff's Department and the schools employing SRDs to include the following terms:

Limitations and Prohibited Conduct

1. SRD enforcement actions with students on campus are limited to criminal conduct.
2. SRD response to school staff calls for service relating to student conduct shall only be for suspected criminal conduct.
3. SRDs are prohibited from handcuffing a student or restraining a student with zip ties on a school campus unless necessary to address a violent situation.
4. SRDs shall adhere to the Sheriff's Department Use of Force policy. SRDs are authorized to use only that amount of force consistent with Sheriff's Department policy and objectively reasonable to perform their duties. "Objectively reasonable" means Department members shall evaluate each situation requiring the use of force considering the known circumstances, including, but not limited to, the severity of the crime at issue, whether the suspect poses an immediate threat to the safety of the member or others, and whether the suspect is actively resisting, in determining the necessity for force and the appropriate level of force. SRDs are prohibited from using the following force absent an imminent threat of death or serious bodily injury to students,

school staff, SRDs, or other persons: pointing or firing a gun, head strikes, pepper spray, mace, less-lethal projectiles, or Tasers.

5. SRDs are prohibited from using chokeholds and carotid restraints on any person. Law enforcement agencies may not authorize the use of chokeholds or carotid restraints pursuant to Government Code section 7286.5.
6. SRDs are prohibited from participating in school-based discipline, including detentions, suspensions, expulsions, or truancy unless the truancy is for off-campus conduct (i.e., students off school grounds during school hours).
7. SRDs are barred from displaying (a) known extremist symbols, including but not limited to symbols associated with the Oath Keepers and Three Percenters, (b) symbols associated with alleged deputy gangs or secret subgroups, and (c) tattoos alleged to be associated with a deputy gang or secret deputy subgroup.
8. SRDs are prohibited from utilizing software to monitor student online behavior without reasonable suspicion that a student is involved in criminal activity.
9. SRDs are prohibited from removing a student from campus without a warrant or court order or unless the student presents a real and immediate physical threat to students, school staff, SRDs, other persons or are a threat to public safety.

Investigations and Notifications

1. SRDs are to notify the student's parents or guardian of a student custodial arrest immediately, when possible. Arrests should occur in a private location away from other students and never in a counselor or psychologist's office. Nothing in this section prohibits an SRD from removing a student from a counselor or psychologist's office for a hold pursuant to Welfare & Institutions Code section 5585.
2. SRDs are to notify the student's parents or guardian of any student detention and the issuance of any citation, immediately after the detention or the issuance of the citation.
3. For any SRD contact with a student, the SRD must generate a written report summarizing the contact. All such reports are to be maintained

on file at the SRD's station and at the school where the contact occurred.

4. SRDs seeking to interview students on campus must first secure consent from the principal and the student's parent(s) or guardian(s). Students should have the right to have their parent, guardian, or an adult of their choosing present during questioning, and interviews should occur in a private location away from other students.
5. All students should be read their *Miranda* rights prior to questioning by an SRD and any student 17 years of age or younger who is in custody shall consult with counsel prior to the interrogation as required by Welfare & Institutions Code section 625.6.

SRD Training and Experience

1. All SRDs should attend the following training prior to being assigned as an SRD:
 - a. 32-hour block of Sheriff's Department Mental Health Team training
 - b. 40-hour block of Sheriff's Department SRD training, which must cover the following subjects:
 - i. Youth de-escalation strategies
 - ii. Child and adolescent social emotional development and mental health issues
 - iii. Cultural competency
 - iv. Federal and state disability, anti-discrimination, and special education laws
 - v. Positive behavioral supports, strategies, and interventions
 - vi. Restorative justice practices
 - vii. Trauma-informed practices for youth
 - viii. American with Disabilities training.
 - ix. Mandatory reporting requirements
 - x. School safety planning
 - xi. Crisis response

Aggregation and Maintenance of Data and Complaints

1. The Sheriff's Department must report yearly to the Board of Supervisors disaggregated data on student interactions with SRDs to evaluate the reasonableness of such interactions and ensure compliance with the prohibition against discrimination. Such reports may include the number of arrests and referrals for prosecution, the number of reports provided to the school or district regarding student misconduct, or other actions taken by SRDs with respect to individual students or others on campus.
2. The Sheriff's Department must publish CAD system statistics on all SRD contacts with students. The Sheriff's Department must also track and publish data on SRD contacts resulting in uses of force on students and the level of force used.
3. The school district and the Sheriff's Department must have a well-publicized formal complaint process open to pupils, families, and community members to report incidents of possible peace officer misconduct at schools or during interactions with pupils.
4. The Sheriff's Department and school district must maintain an electronic database of all complaints.
