## WOMEN'S CAUCUS October 21, 2024 Virtual Meeting Summary

1. Welcome & Introductions – Dr. Cielo welcomed the members and led introductions.

#### 2. Executive Director/Staff Report

Executive Director, C. Barrit shared the Commission on HIV (COH) will host its annual conference on November 14<sup>th</sup> from 9am to 4pm at the Martin Luther King Jr. Behavioral Health Center located at 12021 S. Wilmington Ave, Los Angeles, CA 90059. Registration is open and all community members are invited to attend. See meeting packet for registration information.

#### 3. Co-Chairs Report

- 2025 Co-chair Nominations
  - M. Cielo announced that the Women's Caucus is accepting nominations for the upcoming 2025 year. It was noted that at least one co-chair must be a COH member.
  - o M. Cielo and Shary Alonso were both nominated.
  - Nominations will remain open until the January meeting when elections will be held. Individuals can self-nominate. Additional nominations can be submitted to Commission staff before the January meeting.
- Loneliness and Social Isolation Event Debrief
  - S. Alonso reported that the Loneliness and Social Isolation Event was a great success. She noted panel discussions were very insightful and discussed the different types of loneliness women living with HIV may experience. She thanked panel participants and the Aging Caucus co-chairs for helping to organize the event.
  - Group members shared that they all enjoyed the event and that it was a great success. They noted that it is important to recognize and address loneliness, especially among people of color and felt that the event was very empowering. Everyone agreed more events like these are needed to bring issues to light and help combat stigma.
  - Participants are encouraged to review the event summary and additional resources provided in the <u>meeting packet</u>.
- Women's HIV Resource Launch Debrief

Commission staff, L. Martinez, reported that APLA held a Women's HIV Resource Guide Launch event on October 8<sup>th</sup> at the Vermont Corridor. The event was held to announce the release of the Women's HIV Resource Directory. The directory provides comprehensive information and support for women affected by HIV in Los Angeles County. Hard copies of the directory were distributed and B. Risley of APLA noted that an electronic PDF copy would be forthcoming and will be shared widely once available.

#### 4. Discussion

- Review Purpose of the Commission on HIV and Caucuses
  - L. Martinez provided a brief review of the role and purpose of caucuses within the Commission on HIV.
  - The purpose of the caucus is to provide a forum for women living with HIV to provide a voice withing the COH and provide the caucus perspective on various COH issues. See meeting packet for more details.

#### • 2025 Meeting Frequency

- The group had a discussion on making changes to the meeting frequency and times for the 2025 year. The group discussed the need for more consistent meeting frequency to ensure that important information is not missed, with some feeling that monthly meetings were more engaging.
- The group wants to recruit more members and have a wider representation.
   Suggestions included:
  - i. A hybrid format for meetings, combining in-person and virtual options.
  - ii. Look at the timing of the meetings, potentially shifting to early evening to accommodate more people's schedules.
  - iii. Send reminders and information about meetings via email, phone, or flyers to ensure participants are informed. Persistence in inviting people to attend.
  - iv. Develop a clear agenda for each meeting to promote engagement and activity.
  - v. Consider providing simultaneous translation for Spanish-speaking participants.
  - vi. Determine the big-ticket items and areas of focus for the women's caucus for the entire year, such as HIV prevention for women and support services for women living with HIV.
  - vii. Tap into existing groups working on similar issues, such as prep and women, for support and guidance.
  - viii. Explore cross-collaboration with other caucuses, such as the aging caucus and transgender caucus.

 Commission staff will send a survey to the Women's Caucus to gather more feedback on meeting frequency and preferred time from those who were unable to attend the meeting. <u>Click here</u> to complete survey.

#### Directives: Women-Centered Services

- The group reviewed outstanding items from previous women-centered directives.
- Although the Division of HIV and STD Programs (DHSP) released a childcare RFP, only one agency responded but did not meet the requirement as they did not provide RWP-services. The group noted that childcare remains an issue and recommended that other models of childcare in different jurisdictions be researched for potential solutions.
- DHSP requested additional detail on psychosocial and support services for women. It was noted that existing services are offered via Ending the HIV Epidemic (EHE) funds and that the Planning, Priorities and Allocations Committee has allocated for psychosocial and support services for fiscal year 2026 and 2027. The caucus will provide additional recommendations to meet the needs of women.
- Suggestions for directives can be submitted to Commission staff.

#### 5. Meeting Recap and Next Meeting Agenda

- Commission staff will send out a survey to the caucus to gather additional feedback on preferred meeting frequency and time.
- Commission staff will work with co-chairs to develop a calendar for 2025 and large action items for the year.
- Next virtual meeting will be in January 2025; more details to follow.

#### 6. Public Comment and Announcements

- The MCA Clinic will be moving down the street to the Rader Building (Building C) in November. Anyone with any questions or concerns can contact Dr. Cielo.
- M. Ramos announced that the Friends Helping Friends peer program is available for women throughout the County. The program is open to both cisgender women and women of transgender experience.
- **7.** Adjournment the meeting was adjourned by M. Cielo at 4:00pm

# Get Ready for Co-Chair Open Nominations & Elections: Your Questions Answered!

Greetings! It's that time of year again—election season is upon us, not just for general elections, but also for our Commission, Committee and Caucus Co-Chairs. The nomination and election process for COH, Committee, and Caucus Co-Chairs is underway. Below is a quick FAQ to help you prepare and make an informed decision about becoming a Co-Chair.

#### Am I Eligible?

\*Per COH Bylaws, Policies #08.1102 and #08.1104

# Commission Co-Chairs (Nominations remain open until the January 9, 2025, COH meeting)

(2) Commission Co-Chairs have two-year staggered terms – one co-chair seat is up for election which will serve the Jan 2025-Dec 2026 term.

- Only voting Commissioners can serve as Commission Co-Chairs.
- Candidates must have at least one year of service on the Commission to ensure leadership diversity and representation.
- At least one Co-Chair must be HIV-positive, and at least one must be a person of color. It is also preferred that at least one Co-Chair is female.

# Committee Co-Chairs (Nominations will open by December, with elections in January 2025)

- (2) Committee Co-Chairs serve one-year terms all co-chair seats are up for election which will serve the Jan-Dec 2025 term.
  - The Commission does not impose specific requirements, though one year of experience on the Committee is strongly encouraged.
  - Nominees must be primary members of the Committee, not serving in alternate or secondary roles.
  - Only Commissioners can serve as Co-Chairs.

## Caucus Co-Chairs (Nominations will open by December, with elections in January 2025)

Caucuses typically have two Co-Chairs serving one-year terms, except the Consumer Caucus, which has three seats, including a prevention representative. All co-chair seats are up for election which will serve the Jan-Dec 2025 term.

- One Co-Chair must be a Commissioner to ensure that the Caucus activities are aligned with the COH's scope, goals and objectives
- Note: Caucuses are not subject to Brown Act requirements but work with COH consent to set their own leadership structure, guidelines, membership, and activities.

\*All Co-Chair candidates will be asked to provide a brief statement before the election.

# What Are the Co-Chair Roles & Responsibilities?

• Lead COH/committee/caucus activities and meetings.

- Set agendas for meetings in collaboration with staff.
- Develop work plans with the Executive Director and staff.
- Facilitate meetings, guiding discussion and ensuring effective workflow.
- Summarize discussions and assist in developing work products.
- Act on behalf of the group and communicate with stakeholders.

#### **How Should I Prepare?**

- Honestly assess your accessibility, bandwidth, and time to ensure you are able to show up fully and prepared. *Co-Chair roles require at least 10-12 commitment hours per month.*
- Review the <u>COH Co-Chair training slides</u> to understand the role's expectations
- Familiarize yourself with the:
  - Ryan White Program Part A Planning Council Primer,
  - COH bylaws,
  - COH Co-Chair Duty Statement (if applicable),
  - Committee Co-Chair Duty Statement (if applicable)
  - Required Commissioner trainings.
