2. Ensuring the Use of Least Restrictive Placements for Young People in the Probation Department's Care and Custody

Recommendation as submitted by Supervisors Mitchell and Horvath: Instruct the Interim Chief Probation Officer, in collaboration with the Public Defender, Alternate Public Defender, and the Independent Defender Program, in close consultation, as legally permissible, with the Director of Youth Development, Executive Director of the Probation Oversight Commission, Inspector General, County Counsel, and other relevant stakeholders, potentially including any retained or contract lawyers as needed, and request the participation of the District Attorney and the courts, to collaborate on a weekly basis with relevant stakeholders to identify young people who are appropriate candidates for safe and early release from the Probation Department's camps and halls, take steps that are necessary to secure their appropriate release and, if the identified youth is not released, confidentially notify the Board and the Inspector General in writing of the reason within 10 days of the decision to deny release; instruct the Interim Chief Probation Officer to meet with the above-named stakeholders within 10 days of the Board's approval of this motion, and report back to the Board in writing in 30 days, and every 15 days thereafter, on such efforts to implement this directive, including, but not be limited to, youth who are:

Incarcerated on the basis of a technical violation, misdemeanor, or non-707(b) felony;

Youth awaiting a suitable placement, especially any young person who has waited more than 30 days;

Incarcerated because they do not have a safe family or home to return to;

Within 60 days of their release date for those who have received their disposition;

Able to be safely released into one of the least restrictive options, including, but not limited to, Pine Grove, Dorothy Kirby Center, the Community Detention Program, or supportive housing;

Youth who are performing well in programming; or

Other groups of young people who may be appropriate for release as they await adjudication or early release after receiving their disposition; Instruct the Interim Chief Probation Officer to share timely and complete data on detained youth with the Public Defender, Alternate Public Defender, and, as legally permissible, with the Director of Youth Development, Executive Director of the Probation Oversight Commission, County Counsel, and other relevant stakeholders as described in subsequent directives, with the data to be shared on a weekly basis at minimum, and should include individualized data on demographic characteristics, underlying offense (with data broken down by charge and/or violation), basis of detention, length of stay, release date if applicable, participation and performance in programs, and any other information deemed necessary by the partners developing release or reentry plans;

In addition to the steps described above, instruct the Public Defender and the Alternate Public Defender to provide a release plan for each young person and collaborate with the District Attorney to submit requests for release to the juvenile court in all possible cases;

Instruct the Interim Chief Probation Officer, in collaboration with the Public Defender, Alternate Public Defender, County Counsel, and, as legally permissible, Director of Youth Development, Executive Director of the Probation Oversight Commission, Inspector General, and other relevant stakeholders, and request the participation of the District Attorney and the courts, to report back to the Board in writing in 15 days with, and implement, a plan for collaboratively and proactively developing reentry plans, including alternative housing and supportive services as needed, for young people who are candidates for early release from the Probation Department's camps and halls, to be conducted on an ongoing basis at least until the Probation Department achieves full compliance with Titles 15 and 24, when appropriate, these plans should also consider facilitating access to programs that generally support young people in reentry, such as vocational skills training, higher education, and life skills training, and, in addition, the above-named stakeholders should collaboratively develop these plans regardless of whether the Interim Chief Probation Officer can, or intends to, release a young person in order to proactively prepare for an opportunity to secure a young person's release by order of the court, including, but not be limited to:

A structured process and a review committee comprised of, at minimum, the Interim Chief Probation Officer, Public Defender, Alternate Public Defender, and the District Attorney;

Criteria that the committee will use to identify and recommend young people for release;

An explanation of how, when relevant, the Probation Department will develop and make recommendations to the court about what it considers to be the most appropriate release option, including why each option is considered "least restrictive;"

A plan for the Interim Chief Probation Officer to potentially use her authority under California Government Code Section 8658 to release young people identified and recommended for release by the relevant stakeholders on this committee, including, at minimum, the District Attorney and either Public Defender or Alternate Public Defender;

Policies and practices that will ensure an individualized release plan for each young person is created before their release is recommended and ordered, with such policies and practices to not be a source of, or used as a reason to justify, any delays; and

Policies and practices that will ensure all individualized release plans meaningfully address a young person's needs and strengths, including the menu of services, the process by which a young person will be matched to specific services, and the level, sources, and administrators of funding that will be committed to support meaningful release plans;

Instruct County Counsel, in collaboration with the Interim Chief Probation Officer, Inspector General, and the Executive Director of the Probation Oversight Commission, to report back to the Board in writing in 20 days with a legal analysis of the Interim Chief Probation Officer's ability to release young people early, including a description of any relevant authorities she has, and options that require or don't require a court order, including an assessment of how long it could take to secure a young person's release under each option, with consideration of the Board's goal of ensuring a young person is not incarcerated for any longer than is absolutely necessary; and Instruct the Executive Director of the Probation Oversight Commission, in close collaboration with the Inspector General, and in consultation with the Public Defender, Alternate Public Defender, and other relevant stakeholders, to report back to the Board in writing in 30 days with any relevant feedback on the Interim Chief Probation Officer's response to the above directives, including any comments on the quality of collaboration with the relevant stakeholders, the status of necessary data sharing to inform collaborative decision-making for release and reentry planning, the strength of the Interim Chief Probation Officer's recommendations, an assessment of the steps the Interim Chief Probation Officer is taking to achieve the goal of safely depopulating the camps and halls as quickly as possible, and any recommendations about priority next steps needed to ensure the County is equitably moving towards the goal of safely depopulating the camps and halls. 3. Continuing to Ensure an Equitable Post-Pandemic Recovery Through American Rescue Plan Investments

Recommendation as submitted by Supervisor Mitchell: Direct the Chief Executive Officer to present to the Board at the March 21, 2023 Board meeting, with an update on the County's progress toward implementing the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act, including the amount of the County's \$1,900,000,000 that has been both obligated and expended across each ARP program and by Department. 4. Celebrating Juneteenth at CicLAvia-South LA

Recommendation as submitted by Supervisor Mitchell: Find that, pursuant to Government Code Section 26227, the use of funds in the amount of \$200,000 for the June 2023 CicLAvia-South LA event is deemed by the Board to be necessary to meet the social needs of the population of the County and serves a public purpose; instruct all relevant County Departments to support the Juneteenth Resource Fair and Community Celebration in conjunction with the Open Streets event; and authorize the Director of Public Works to execute a Social Program Agreement (SPA) with CicLAvia Inc, a 501(c)(3) organization, in the amount of \$200,000 for a term from April 15, 2023 through December 31, 2023, for the costs associated with the June 2023 CicLAvia-South LA event, with the SPA to be reviewed and approved by the Executive Officer of the Board, County Counsel, and the Auditor-Controller, and the entire cost of the SPA to be funded by eligible Second District Transportation Funds. 5. Adopting a Global Plan for the Probation Department's Halls and Camps

Revised recommendation as submitted by Supervisors Horvath and Hahn: Instruct the Interim Chief Probation Officer to issue an internal special recruitment notice for Secure Youth Treatment Facility (SYTF) staff within 24 hours of the Board's approval of this directive, and establish a formal SYTF unit or bureau within 30 days of approval of this directive; instruct the Interim Chief Probation Officer, in partnership with the Director of Youth Development, and in consultation with an ad hoc committee of the Juvenile Justice Realignment Block Grant Subcommittee (JJRBG), to report back to the Board in writing in 30 days, with finalized programming recommendations to be funded with Senate Bills 823 and 92 funds, specifically for the SYTF unit at Barry J. Nidorf Juvenile Hall, these recommendations should be informed by needs identified in the Individual Rehabilitation Plans being ordered by the Court, as well as feedback young people have given regarding their areas of interest, including art therapy, age and interest-appropriate reading materials and books, vocational and life skills training (in person or online), computer training (in person or online), tutoring and teaching that supports (but does not replace) legally mandated education, higher education, and outdoor activities (e.g., sports, meditation, yoga); and take the following actions: (Continued from the meeting of 3-7-23)

Instruct the Interim Chief Probation Officer, in consultation with the Chief Executive Officer and County Counsel, to report back to the Board in 30 days with legally viable, but innovative, interim contracting solutions to implement the programming recommendations developed in response to the above directive, with consideration to be given to existing contracts through relevant County Departments that can be leveraged to implement the above directive with urgency;

Authorize the Director of Youth Development, with 30 days advance notice to the Board, to execute additional sole source credible messenger contracts, as needed, to ensure credible messengers are integrated into all SYTF, and amend existing Credible Messenger Programming and Training contract funding amounts to ensure sufficient Credible Messenger staffing levels, using Department of Youth Development's existing funding and with notice provided to the Board prior to executing these amendments; Agenda

Instruct the Interim Chief Probation Officer, in partnership with the Director of Internal Services and, in consultation with the Chief Executive Officer and County Counsel, using the recommendations adopted by the JJRBG as a guide, to report back to the Board in writing in 15 days, with a potential short-term facilities plan that can be implemented within 30 days of receiving approval from the Board, subject to all analysis required under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), the short-term plan must be temporary and feasible to implement without the need for extensive renovations, security enhancements, or hiring and must be designed with the primary objective of decompressing the population at Barry J. Nidorf, with consideration to be given to the following:

Temporarily reopening Los Padrinos Juvenile Hall, with existing staff, to house as many pre-disposition youth as possible;

Relocation of all girls, women, or gender-expansive youth from Central Juvenile Hall to, primarily, Dorothy Kirby Center, and secondarily to other facilities, where an existing therapeutic model can be used to facilitate the Board's girls decarceration initiative;

Expediting security enhancements at Campus Kilpatrick and, pending completion of those security enhancements, initiating the Multi-Disciplinary Team assessments that will allow the Department to increase the SYTF population at Campus Kilpatrick to no less than 20 young people, until staffing and housing accommodations are in place to support the full temporary capacity of 42; and

Consolidation of the three east County Probation Camps, Rockey, Paige and Afflerbaugh, into two camps;

Instruct the Interim Chief Probation Officer, in partnership with the Directors of Internal Services and Public Works, and in consultation with the Chief Executive Officer and County Counsel, using the recommendations adopted by the JJRBG, to report back to the Board in writing in 30 days with potential interim facilities plan that can be implemented in one year, of receiving approval from the Board, subject to all analysis required under CEQA, and include the following:

A plan to physically partition the eastern portion of Barry J. Nidorf and create a new 72 beds SYTF campus that will operate on a traditional work schedule; A plan to expand the number of youth eligible for Pinegrove Fire Camp; and

An update on the progress made in establishing Step Down programs in line with Board Order No. 20 of December 20, 2022, "Creating Less Restrictive Programs for Eligible Secure Youth Treatment Facility and Division of Juvenile Justice Youth Essential for Successful Transformation and Community Reentry;"

Instruct the Interim Chief Probation Officer, in partnership with the Directors of Internal Services and Public Works, in consultation with the Chief Executive Officer and County Counsel, following the recommendations adopted by the JJRBG, to report back to the Board in writing in 45 days with potential long-term facilities plan that could be implemented in phases over two to five years of receiving approval from the Board, subject to all analysis required by CEQA, and include the following:

A timeline for each component of the proposed plan;

A proposed plan to upgrade Dorothy Kirby Center with the required facility and security enhancements for use as an SYTF for girls and gender expansive youth;

A plan to renovate Camp Scott to end the temporary use of Dorothy Kirby Center, return young women and girls from Dorothy Kirby Center to Camp Scott, and operate Camp Scott as the one County detention facility for all girls, young women, and gender expensive youth; and

Include a schedule for proposed renovations to Camp Miller to support staff housing, green space for outdoor recreation, classrooms, a teen technology center, offices for community-based organizations, and other ancillary needs for Campus Kilpatrick; and

Instruct the Interim Chief Probation Officer to report back to the Board at a regularly scheduled meeting on a quarterly basis with an update on the status of all the above directives. (23-0997)

6. Care First, Jails Last: Holding the Probation Department Accountable and Advancing Youth Justice Reimagined

Recommendation as submitted by Supervisors Horvath and Mitchell: Reaffirm the Board's intent to transition away from a carceral juvenile system and advise the Chief Executive Officer to prepare a proposed budget for the Probation Department in Budget Year 2023-24 that reflects the Board's intent by avoiding, to the extent feasible, new investments in juvenile probation which are not directly for the benefit of young people in the care of the Probation Department; instruct the Director of Youth Development to take the lead role in establishing programs and services for justice system-impacted youth in the halls and camps, within the confines of existing legal restrictions, and in partnership with the Interim Chief Probation Officer, and, in consultation with the Chief Executive Officer, County Counsel, and other relevant County Departments, report back to the Board in writing in 90 days with:

An analysis of opportunities for the Department of Youth Development to leverage existing contracts, programs, or relationships with community-based organizations to fulfill this directive;

Recommendations on how the contracting process can be improved to allow for smaller community-based organizations to contract with the Probation Department; and

Recommendations to improve the current process to allow clearance for community-based organizations to provide programming in the halls and camps;

Direct the Chief Executive Officer, in consultation with the Interim Chief Probation Officer and County Counsel, to report back to the Board in writing, in 90 days with the following:

A completed Probation Department staffing analysis;

A list of Probation Department vacancies and the associated job duties or functions for each vacancy, the specific funding streams, if any, tied to those vacancies, the budget unit in which the vacant positions are budgeted, and the budgeted value of the vacancies; A list of all funding streams that are currently allocated to the Juvenile operations budget, including Juvenile Institutions Services, Special Services, Care of Juvenile Court Wards, Community-based Contracts, and the portions of Field Services and Support Services associated with juvenile operations, and for each funding stream, identify the source, current allocation, unspent balance, if any, method by which future or ongoing allocations are determined, and any restrictions that are tied to the funding stream;

A separate list of all funding streams that are currently allocated to any Probation Department operation that can legally be used to fund programming and services in the halls and camps, and for each funding stream, indicate if it is currently being used to fund programming and services in the halls and camps, and if not, indicate its current use;

A list of all contracts that are currently in place to provide services and programming in the halls and camps;

Identification of any unused or underutilized funding allocated to the Probation Department that can be obligated now for future allocation to the Department of Youth Development; and further, identification of any funding streams allocated to the Probation Department that are not legally prohibited, by the requirements of the originating funding source, including Net County Cost, from being transferred to the Department of Youth Development; and

Identification of any existing funding streams in the Probation Department budget that can be administered by the Department of Youth Development without violating any laws or regulations, so long as they are not removed from the Probation Department's budget;

Instruct the Inspector General, in consultation with the Executive Director of the Probation Oversight Commission, to report back to the Board in writing in 30 days with recommendations for a communications/reporting process from the Probation Department to the Board, the Inspector General, and the Probation Oversight Commission that, at a minimum, includes:

Detailed lists of the types of incidents that the Probation Department should be required to report to the Board, the Inspector General, and the Probation Oversight Commission, that is reflective of what is legally permissible for each entity; A multi-phase communication/reporting process with specific timelines to ensure the Board, Inspector General, and the Probation Oversight Commission receive initial notifications immediately after a reportable incident takes place, and subsequent reports on a set timeline until the reportable incident reaches a final resolution; and

A process to ensure that the Board and Inspector General receive a confidential detailed report of any disciplinary decision that is made by the Interim Chief Probation Officer or a Chief Deputy, including whether the final determination made by those individuals differs from recommendations made by other staff and/or Counsel;

Instruct the Interim Chief Probation Officer to report back to the Board in writing in 45 days with a plan to ensure all young people in custody maintain regular and consistent visitation with their families, including siblings and their own children;

Instruct the Director of Youth Development, in consultation with the Youth Justice Advisory Group and County Counsel, to report back to the Board in writing in 45 days with a proposed concept for Safe and Secure Healing Centers that serve pre-adjudication and post-disposition youth who would otherwise be detained in juvenile hall and camp, and a first phase of implementation that is feasible and permissible under existing law;

Instruct the Director of Youth Development, in collaboration with the Interim Chief Probation Officer, Chief Executive Officer, Public Defender, Alternate Public Defender, and the District Attorney, to develop a longer-term, comprehensive plan to shrink the footprint of probation, especially its facilities and detention populations, and a phased implementation plan to building the capacity to serve all justice-involved youth;

Instruct the Interim Chief Probation Officer, in consultation with the Chief Executive Officer, the Director of Personnel, and County Counsel, to report back to the Board in writing in 90 days with a strategic staffing plan, to be informed by the Probation staffing study, that focuses on placing the most experienced and qualified staff where they are most needed and fully relies on existing staff before seeking Board approval to hire additional staff, and further direct County Counsel and Chief Executive Officer to immediately inform the Board if memorandum of understanding provisions, Board of State and Community Corrections (BSCC) regulations, County processes, or other factors become a barrier to implementing a truly strategic staffing plan; Instruct County Counsel, in consultation with the Interim Chief Probation Officer, the Chief Executive Officer, and the Director of Youth Development, to the extent allowed by law, to prepare an analysis for the Board, to be delivered in a confidential attorney-client protected format, of the County labor contract provisions that are not conducive to implementing the principles of Youth Justice Reimagined, effective management of the Probation Department, or the need to quickly adapt to the needs of the growing Secure Youth Treatment Facility population, with the analysis to include comparisons to labor contracts in other jurisdictions and any past attempts to negotiate these provisions with the County's labor partners, with the analysis to include recommendations for areas where support from the Board would facilitate the Probation Department leadership's ability to implement the Board's youth justice priorities and establish a more seamless partnership with the Department of Youth Development that includes sharing resources and responsibility for providing programming to youth in the justice system; and

Instruct County Counsel to report back to the Board in writing in 90 days with an analysis of the areas of overlap and/or conflict between the Department of Justice Consent Decree, BSCC rules and regulations, and the Board's desire to shrink the Probation Department's footprint and authority for the purpose of advancing Youth Justice Reimagined, and work with the Director of Youth Development to advise the monitors of the Department of Justice Consent Decree, and any other relevant parties, of the details and status of Youth Justice Reimagined, plans to expand the Department of Youth Development's role in youth justice, and any other aspects of the Department of Youth Development that may be relevant to the Department of Justice Consent Decree, County Counsel is to include an update on this effort in the report back. AGENDA

In accordance with the Brown Act, all matters to be acted on by the Board must be posted at least 72 hours prior to the Board meeting. In cases of an emergency, or when a subject matter needs immediate action or comes to the attention of the Board subsequent to the agenda being posted, upon making certain findings, the Board may act on an item that was not on the posted agenda.

The majority of the Board's Tuesday agenda is a consent calendar. All matters included on the consent calendar (including Board of Supervisors items and Administrative Matters) may be approved by one motion unless held by a Board Member for discussion. During the reading of the Agenda, the Executive Officer will indicate which items have been requested to be held for discussion or continued to a future meeting, and the remaining items will be approved. Items which are set for a certain time may or may not be called up at exactly the time indicated, depending on the business of the Board. The items that are held for discussion may be taken up at any time, depending on the business of the Board. Each item includes a brief summary of the Board member's motion or department's recommended action, and in some instances, a corresponding recommendation from the Chief Executive Officer, indicated in capital letters.

Included at the end of each agenda are items which have been continued from previous meetings for further discussion and action by the Board. This portion of the agenda is commonly referred to as the "A-item Agenda." At the request of a Supervisor, the A-items may be called up for consideration at any time.

INFORMATION RELATING TO AGENDAS AND BOARD ACTIONS

Agendas for the Board meetings are available on Thursday mornings in the Executive Office and on the Internet. A supplemental agenda that includes corrections, additions or deletions to the agenda is available on Friday afternoons.
