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CODE OF CONDUCT

The Commission on HIV welcomes commissioners, guests, and the public into a space where people of all opinions and backgrounds are able to contribute. In this space, we challenge ourselves to be self-reflective and committed to an ongoing understanding of each other and the complex intersectionality of the lives we live. We create a safe environment where we celebrate differences while striving for consensus in the fights against our common enemies: HIV and STDs. We build trust in each other by having honest, respectful, and productive conversations. As a result, the Commission has adopted and is consistently committed to implementing the following guidelines for Commission, committee, and associated meetings.

All participants and stakeholders should adhere to the following:

- 1) We approach all our interactions with compassion, respect, and transparency.
- 2) We respect others' time by starting and ending meetings on time, being punctual, and staying present.
- 3) We listen with intent, avoid interrupting others, and elevate each other's voices.
- 4) We encourage all to bring forth ideas for discussion, community planning, and consensus.
- 5) We focus on the issue, not the person raising the issue.
- Be flexible, open-minded, and solution-focused.
- 7) We give and accept respectful and constructive feedback.
- 8) We keep all issues on the table (no "hidden agendas"), avoid monopolizing discussions and minimize side conversations.
- 9) We have no place in our deliberations for racist, sexist, homophobic, transphobic, and other discriminatory statements, and "-isms" including misogyny, ableism, and ageism.
- 10) We give ourselves permission to learn from our mistakes.

In response to violation of the Code of Conduct which results in meeting disruption, Include provisions of SB 1100 which states in part, ". . . authorize the presiding member of the legislative body conducting a meeting or their designee to remove, or cause the removal of, an individual for disrupting the meeting Removal to be preceded by a warning to the individual by the presiding member of the legislative body or their designee that the individual's behavior is disrupting the meeting and that the individual's failure to cease their behavior may result in their removal." Complaints related to internal Commission matters such as alleged violation of the Code of Conduct or other disputes among members are addressed and resolved in adherence to Policy/Procedure #08.3302." (Commission Bylaws, Article VII, Section 4.)



Black Caucus Overview

The Commission on HIV established the Black/African American Community (BAAC) Task Force in response to the 2019 National Black HIV/AIDS Awareness Day panel discussion, recognizing the urgent need to address the disproportionate impact of HIV/AIDS in Black communities across Los Angeles County. The Task Force developed strategic recommendations to take immediate action toward eliminating the health disparities experienced by Black/African American individuals. These recommendations were crafted by both Commission members and community stakeholders with direct ties to the populations they serve.

Building on this foundation, the Black Caucus was established as a dedicated space for Commission and community members to engage in open, judgment-free discussions about their lived experiences and insights. The Caucus fosters meaningful dialogue among those who share and understand the unique challenges facing Black communities in HIV prevention, care, and treatment.

Beyond fostering dialogue, the Black Caucus ensures that Black voices are effectively heard in Commission discussions and decision-making. Through advocacy and strategic engagement, it amplifies the perspectives of Black people affected by and working in HIV-related fields.

To fulfill its mission, the Black Caucus upholds four core responsibilities:

- **Facilitating a forum for dialogue** Providing a safe space for candid discussions that drive shared learning and problem-solving.
- **Developing the caucus voice** Strengthening its presence within the Commission and the broader community to advocate for policies and initiatives that serve Black communities.
- Providing the caucus perspective Ensuring that Black experiences, concerns, and priorities shape the Commission's work and improve culturally responsive services.
- **Cultivating leadership** Empowering members to take on leadership roles in advocacy, mentorship, and community-driven change.

Through these efforts, the Black Caucus remains steadfast in its mission to elevate Black voices, dismantle health disparities, and drive meaningful change in HIV prevention, care, and support throughout Los Angeles County.

The Black Caucus meets virtually on the third Thursday of each month from 4:00 to 5:00 PM and is led by two co-chairs who guide its discussions and initiatives.

Meeting Highlights

Commission Meeting

The Annual Conference is scheduled for Thursday, November 13, 2025, from 9:00 AM – 4:00 PM at St. Anne's Conference Center. The agenda and itinerary are being finalized and will be posted soon. Everyone is encouraged to save the date.

Operational Updates

- The Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) flagged the Black and Transgender Caucuses for review under DEI Executive Orders. County Counsel indicated they are waiting for further instructions from outside counsel contracted by Los Angeles County. An internal Division of HIV and STDs (DHSP) workgroup on SOGI (sexual orientation and gender identity) is expected to provide recommendations on how to align language to ensure compliance without losing community representation; the Commission on HIV (COH) will follow DHSP's lead. Until new guidance is issued, the caucus will continue to maintain its current approach cautiously.
- The Caucus was reminded that Non-Brown Act bodies (caucuses, work groups, and task forces) no longer have standing meeting schedules. Each meeting must go through the PURGE decision-making tool before being scheduled.
- The Commission, DHSP, and the Executive Office agreed on an operating budget of \$975,000 for Program Year 35 (PY35). However, the Commission is expected to exceed the approved budget, but DHSP will absorb the overage for PY 35.
- PY 36 is expected to bring new financial challenges due to threats to Ryan White funding.

Community Listening Sessions

Due to funding constraints, the organizational capacity needs assessment for Black-led
organizations is on pause. However, the Caucus continues to hold community listening
sessions focused on the state of HIV in the Black community. These sessions have engaged
various groups, including non-traditional providers, transgender individuals, men who have
sex with men (MSM), women, faith-based groups, and other underserved communities.



• The remaining target groups for listening sessions are men who don't identify as MSM and youth (ages 15-29), including those involved with the justice system. Recent meetings with the Youth Commission secured two youth members who will facilitate the listening session. It is anticipated that the listening session will take place early next year.

Upcoming Events & Opportunities:

Taste of Soul - October 18, 2025

- Overall preparations for this Saturday's Taste of Soul event are progressing; swag bag donations are being collected, and volunteer shifts are confirmed for 7-11 AM and 12 PM 4 PM. The booth will be located at the County Pavilion on Crenshaw Blvd, near the driveway, close to Albertsons and Bank of America.
- Some of the event activities include Spin-the-wheel with HIV education questions, swag bag prizes, and general outreach materials.

2025 World AIDS Day Planning

- The caucus discussed planning the 3rd annual World AIDS Day event, set tentatively for Friday, December 5th.
- Previous events have honored community advocates and leaders, featured performances, provided resources, and aimed to give people their "flowers" while they are still here.
- Charles Drew University (CDU) is also holding a World AIDS Day. The Caucus discussed
 whether it should host a separate event, as done in previous years, or collaborate with CDU
 and participate in their event.
- Feedback & Discussion:
 - Several members supported collaborating rather than hosting a separate event.
 - One member noted low volunteer turnout and limited planning engagement, suggesting collaboration is the best use of resources.



- Members emphasized that collaboration should be inclusive, not just the Caucus passively attending CDU's event.
- The Caucus would like to potentially add its own elements, such as booths or activities, if CDU agrees.

Next Steps:

- Dr. Maultsby will contact Dr. Spencer to obtain additional details about CDU's WAD event and ask if the Black Caucus can collaborate and contribute elements (e.g., life painting, booths).
- Updates will be shared with the Black Caucus by email once more details are known.

Subordinate Working Units Meeting Decision-Making Tool

(July 2025)

For Caucuses, Task Forces & Work Groups – refer to <u>Policy #08.1102</u> for a description of the role(s), structures and governing rules of the Commission's various types of subordinate committees and working groups.

This tool is designed to help leadership for subordinate working units to decide when to hold a meeting and why, ensuring that meetings are intentional, legally compliant, and aligned with strategic Commission goals.

The PURGE Test

Use the acronym PURGE to determine whether a meeting should be scheduled. *All five criteria must be met.*

Decision Criteria	Guiding Questions		Proceed with Meeting?	
Purpose	Is there a clear purpose or deliverable (e.g., planning an event, responding to a directive, presenting to full Commission)?		Yes, if deliverable is identified	
Urgency	Is there a time-sensitive issue that must be addressed before the next scheduled Commission meeting?		Yes, if time-sensitive and cannot be addressed elsewhere	
Readiness	Are the necessary materials, leadership, facilitators, or information available to conduct a productive meeting? Is there confirmed leadership capacity, including commitment from at least two Commissioners in good standing to lead the subgroup?		Yes, if ready	
Goal Alignment	Does the topic support the goals of the Commission, integrated plan, or specific motion/request? Can an existing committee fulfill the function or task?		Yes, if aligned	
Engagement	Will there be sufficient participation or community input to inform a meaningful discussion? Consider time, date, competing/conflicting events, meeting format (hybrid/in person/virtual)		Yes, if members/stakeholders are confirmed	

If one or more PURGE criteria are not met, consider using an alternative format—such as email, workgroup, or leadership/staff facilitation—instead of holding a full meeting.
