- 1. <u>Call to Order and Land Acknowledgement of Indigenous Peoples:</u> Commission President Ilan Davidson called the meeting to order at 12:34 p.m. with a quorum in attendance. He acknowledged the indigenous peoples, Gabrielino/Tongva and Tataviam, who were the first stewards of the lands on which we reside in our county.
- 2. <u>Motion:</u> The Commission finds that a state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of the members to meet safely in person, and/or state or local officials continue to impose or recommend measures to promote social distancing. Commissioner Preeti Kulkarni made the motion as stated, and Commissioner Isabelle Gunning seconded. The motion passed unanimously.
- 3. Review & Approval of August 1, 2022 Meeting Minutes: Commissioner Dandy de Paula stated that the minutes need to be corrected to include Commissioners De Paula and Lisa Michelle Dabbs in attendance. The motion was moved by Commissioner Derric Johnson to approve the minutes of the Commission meeting of August 1, 2022, as presented by Vice-President/Secretary (VP Sec.) Isabelle Gunning with the correction of Commissioners De Paula and Dabbs in attendance. VP Sec. Gunning seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

4. President's Report

- **4.1 Spotlight on our Partners**: President Davidson thanked everyone involved in planning the IAOHRA conference and introduced IAOHRA Conference Committee Co-Chair Diane Clements. Ms. Clements began by sharing that she thought the conference was wonderful and that she was boggled by how many moving parts there were to coordinate this conference. Ms. Clements thanked the entire planning committee, noting that the committee was able to negotiate difficult problems that arose, and that the conference went well. Additionally, she thanked the Commissioners and the Honorable Holly Mitchell for their financial support. Executive Director (ED) Robin Toma also thanked Ms. Clements for her leadership as Co-Chair of the Conference Planning Committee, emphasizing that she strengthened the committee in their ability to have a great conference. Commissioners Fredrick Sykes, Helen Chin, Lisa Michelle, Jeanette Ellis-Royston, Kevork Keushkerian, and VP Sec. Gunning each shared positive feedback in attending the conference. Co-Chair James Stowe additionally thanked the Commission and LA County, and stated he wished he had been able to meet with the Commission before the conference. He shared that the IAOHRA Conference in Los Angeles had the largest number of attendees since 2007 in Atlanta. He thanked all individuals and committees for an excellent experience.
- 4.2 Other Items: President Davidson thanked IAOHRA Co-Chairs Ms. Clements-Boyd and Mr. Stowe once more and moved on to the Executive Director's report.

Executive Director's Report

- 5.1 Update on Board motions on Budget (Meas. B, ARPA), Sheriff and Bills (AB 1947): ED Toma shared that there are two exciting things coming up. The first is Measure B funding (additional funding for trauma centers and hospitals and violence prevention). The Board of Supervisors (BOS) previously passed a motion unanimously which stated that the LA vs Hate program needs to be funded on an ongoing basis, and asked the Chief Executive Office (CEO) for assistance. The CEO and BOS had the idea that Measure B funding can be used, and at least \$1,000,000 of that could be provided each year to help fund components of LA vs Hate because of the hate violence prevention impact of the program. However, as of this morning, some questions still need to be answered before tomorrow's voting happens. This is an important part of our budget because it would help fund our rapid response network partners and would help fund part of the ability for people to call 211 at any time. It is critical to our work to have that funding and Measure B appears to be a valid source of funding for it, so we are hopeful that it will pass. The other part is follow-up work on the Sheriff's Accountability Initiative, to educate the Board and public about what we do know related to it. VP Sec. Gunning added that it would be beneficial to post some clips from the hearings and other educational information on the Ad Hoc Committee on Policing for the public to see. ED Toma agreed that the information should be on the website. However, he noted that the information cannot be campaigning on the measure. Commissioner Gunning requested the language that can be used to educate and use our voice to be heard. ED Toma stated he will follow up and figure out how information can be shared in the public way which will be effective at educating the community regarding the issues in a legal way. Lastly, Toma reported that AB 1947 did not get passed by the state legislature. It is the bill for which the Commission recommended County support, that would have increased the requirements that all police departments are up to date on their hate crime policies and training.
- **5.2 Debrief of IAOHRA 2022 Conference in L.A.** ED Toma thanked staff Siranush Vardanyan, Terri Villa-McDowell, Robert Sowell, Sharon Williams, Pierre Arreola, Commissioners Royston and Sykes, and the contracted Event Manager, Christina Zeytounian of LA Jolie events for everything that they did

to make sure this Conference went well. ED Toma noted the challenges of the conference: the escalators at the Sheraton Grand hotel not working, and the California African American Museum refusal to open before 10 a.m., denying one of the 4 groups ability to go there. Commissioner Preeti Kulkarni joined to say that the LA County Human Relations Commission really shined during the conference and that the work the Commission seemed to have been showcased well. She thanked VP-Sec. Gunning for the session she facilitated. Commissioner Sykes commented on the escalators not working and stated that they failed to comply with ADA so people suffered, and the hotel should be held accountable for that. VP-Sec. Gunning also thanked staff Arreola for being so helpful during the panel discussion, and to Asst. ED Sowell for his breakout session as well. Lastly, she commented that it would have been best to do surveys immediately after the break-out session was done right then and there rather than online surveys after.

5.3 Update on IT, B, and Admin, Transition to the Executive Office: ED Toma shared that while the Human Relations Commission is down about 25% in staffing, we are in the process of interviewing candidates for the Senior Human Relations Consultant vacancies and moving towards filling the Human Services Administrator I vacancies as well. ED Toma reminded the Commission that things have been out of the ordinary due to the pandemic and the whole county is working to get back on track.

6 Committee Reports

- **6.1 Ad Hoc Committee on Policing & Human Relations:** Committee Chair Gunning stated there are no action items but noted that they are hoping to have the website redesigned by the end of this year so that the community groups will have access to the data that our partners are producing regarding suburban policing departments.
- **6.2** Ad Hoc Committee on Strategic Planning: Commissioner Kulkarni asked staff to report. ED Toma stated that the Commission's Proposed Strategic Plan for 2022-25 which it had adopted was put out for public comment and we are nearing the end of the 30-day period. The feedback will be pulled together and shared during the next meeting.
- **6.3 John Anson Ford Awards Event (JAF) Committee:** Commissioner Guadalupe Montano stated that the John Anson Ford Awards recognizes people and organizations in the county advancing human relations. She reminded Commissioners that the nomination forms are in the meeting packet so she is asking that the list of past honorees be sent to Commissioners and for them to start thinking about organizations and people in your district to nominate. President Davidson reminded the Commissioners that it will be held on Tuesday following the Martin Luther King Holiday. Commissioner Montano stated that the Committee will be convened within this month to discuss the budget and location.
- **6.4 LA vs Hate Committee:** Commissioner Montano stated a legal clinic is being planned to provide advice from law students to people impacted by acts of hate.
- 7 Public Comment: None.

8 Action/Discussion Items

8.1 Commission recommendations re: Board motions on funding our programs: The motion was made by VP Sec. Gunning that the Commission is in support of the two Board motions on its agenda

tomorrow to fund LA vs Hate via Measure B, and to approve the second tranche of the ARPA funding to include LA vs Hate; it was seconded by Commissioner Kulkarni. The motion passed unanimously.

- **8.2 Revisit FY 2022-23 Committees and their membership:** President Davidson reminded all attendees to review in the packet the chart of standing committees and ad hoc committees and let us know if you are interested in any other committees or would like to make changes so that the committees can be finalized, and leadership positions can be planned.
- 8.3 Policing Committee requests for Commission action: This was tabled due to lack of time without objection.
- 8.4 Location of Commission Offices: This was tabled due to lack of time without objection.
- 8.5 JAF Trust Fund support for IAOHRA conference: This was tabled due to lack of time without objection.
- Commissioner Announcements: ED Toma made the announcement that Commissioner Gay Yuen sent an invitation through email to all Commissioners. This is the Chinese American Museum gala event at the Westin Bonaventure Hotel on Wednesday, September 28th for which Supervisor Solis has sponsored a table and provided ten seats to go to Commissioners. Commissioners Chin and Kulkarni raised their hands to show interest in attending. President Davidson asked all Commissioners to confirm that they did receive this invitation by email and respond to the email as soon as possible if they are interested in attending. Commissioner Dandy De Paula invited everyone to join an event called Unite for Progress on Saturday, September 24th from 10am to 2pm at the Don Knabe Community Regional Park in Cerritos and stated he will send an email with the flyer. ED Toma shared that LA vs Hate will be there along with a few partners.
- 10 Adjournment: President Davidson invited a motion to adjourn the meeting in memory of Queen Elizabeth II, who did so much in her lifetime to make change for women in the UK. VP Gunning added adjourning in memory of Nichelle Nichols for using her platform and voice for positive change in addition to Barbara Ehrenreich, who did so much work in exposing the impact of systemic poverty. Commissioner Derric Johnson added Bernard Shaw, who was a trailblazer in journalism particularly for African American journalists on national news. Without objection, the meeting was adjourned.

Statement by LA vs Hate on its Withdrawal From Unite for Progress Event, September 24, 2022

For over 70 years, the Los Angeles County Commission on Human Relation has worked to promote better human relations in Los Angeles County by working to transform prejudice into acceptance, inequity into justice, and hostility into peace.

The LA vs Hate program was launched in 2019, arising from a unanimous motion by the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors to counter the historic rise in hate. LA vs Hate has three major components: 1) a social media/art-based messaging campaign that unites our residents against hate and promotes awareness of a hate reporting line via phone calls to 211 or to the website LAvsHate.org; 2) free and multilingual assistance for anyone reporting bias-motivated acts of hostility or violence, with linguistically competent caring case managers, to obtain counseling or help to protect their civil and human rights against discrimination and violence; and 3) a network of trusted partner community based agencies who work with individual, institutions and communities to respond to and prevent acts of hate. Our vision is to bring about a hate-free Los Angeles County where all of its diverse residents feel welcome and safe. In over three years of operation, LA vs Hate has received over 1,900 reports of hate; and has assisted hundreds of victims with compassion, empathy and needed resources.

LA vs Hate was invited to participate in the upcoming Unite for Progress event set for this Saturday, September 24th. LA vs Hate is often invited to participate in grass roots led events to inform county residents about resources available for victims of hate incidents and hate crimes. However, recent news accounts involving one of the Unite for Progress event organizers has prompted us to withdraw from this event. LA vs Hate is a program dedicated to inclusion for all county residents and we do not support hate, bias-motivated hostility, or violence. LA vs Hate will continue to reach out to the Cerritos South Asian and Asian communities to ensure they know about the resources provided by LA vs Hate, the antihate Los Angeles County initiative. Whereas, a motion by Supervisors Holly Mitchell and Hilda Solis titled "Promoting Accountability and Community Safety Through Checks and Balances of the Los Angeles County Sheriff" is scheduled to come before the Board of Supervisors on July 12, 2022, which if passed by the Board would begin the process to place a charter amendment on the ballot for November 8, 2022, the goal of which would grant the Board of Supervisors the authority to remove the Sheriff, by a four-fifths vote for cause, such as a violation of law related to the performance of duties, flagrant or repeated neglect of duties, misappropriation of public funds or property, willful falsification of a relevant official statement or document, or obstruction of any investigation into the Sheriff's conduct by the Inspector General, Sheriff Civilian Oversight Commission, or any government agency with jurisdiction to conduct such an investigation;

Whereas, law enforcement misconduct, including by deputies of the LA Sheriff, has triggered community resistance and many of the largest episodes of racial violence in LA County's history, including the uprising and riots after the Rodney King verdicts in 1992, the Watts Rebellion in 1965, and the Zoot Suit Riots of 1943 (which laid bare law enforcement prejudices against racial minorities of the time, and led to the formation of our Los Angeles County Commission on Human Relations ("Commission");

Whereas, "equitable law enforcement" is at the heart of our Human Relations Commission's mission to transform prejudice into acceptance, inequity into justice, and hostility into peace, and is a core concept of our Commission's report "Redefining Policing with Our Community," led by its committee on Policing and Human Relations. "Equitable law enforcement" is explained in our report as "a change from unilateral asymmetrical power dynamics...to robust, transparent oversight by the communities they serve;"

Whereas, our Commission's Strategic Priority on Increasing Equity and Justice in LA County's Criminal Justice and Community Safety Systems and our "Redefining Policing" report take into account the pernicious impact of intentional discrimination in our criminal justice system, but also the powerful role of implicit biases that are automatically and unconsciously created in all of us from our life experiences, and have particularly dire consequences when they are not recognized, managed, and reduced in law enforcement. As noted in the Commission's Strategic Priority, "[w]hen the likelihood of being arrested, jailed, shot, executed, or rearrested after being released from incarceration in LA County is tied to one's race, ethnicity, gender or other protected characteristics, fundamental human rights are at issue;"

Whereas, our Commission specifically recommends in our "Redefining Policing" report to "[e]nsure that all civilian oversight bodies have the necessary authority to perform their mission, including subpoena power and the power to censure and/or discipline" (Recommendation #8);

Whereas, in the process of creating our report on "Redefining Policing With Our Community," which included multiple public hearings/community listening sessions in all five Supervisorial Districts, the Commission became aware of many incidents of law enforcement misconduct experienced by community members, and strong community support for effective checks and balances needed to ensure true accountability of the

office of the LA County Sheriff;

Whereas, the Board of Supervisors has responsibility under law (California Government Code § 25303) for guiding and setting County policy and supervising the conduct of County officers and employees, which include the Sheriff;

THEREFORE, the Los Angeles County Commission on Human Relations resolves and recommends to the Board of Supervisors that it unanimously approve the *Promoting Accountability and Community Safety Through Checks and Balances of the Los Angeles County Sheriff* motion, and take all actions necessary towards achieving greater accountability of the largely unbridled power of the office of the L.A. Sheriff, reinforcing the Board's policy-making authority regarding the Sheriff's Department, and ensuring permanent and independent civilian oversight.

Los Angeles County, Measure A, Removal of Sheriff for Cause Amendment (November 2022)

Los Angeles County Measure A is on the ballot as a referral in Los Angeles County on November 8, 2022.

A "yes" vote <u>supports</u> allowing the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors, by a four-fifths vote, to remove the sheriff from office for *cause*, which is defined to include: violation of laws related to the sheriff's duties; repeated neglect of the sheriff's duties; misuse of public funds or properties; willful falsification of documents; or obstruction of an investigation into the department's conduct.

A **"no"** vote <u>opposes</u> allowing the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors, by a four-fifths vote, to remove the sheriff from office for cause.

Overview

Measure A would allow the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors to vote to remove the elected sheriff from office for *cause*. The vote requirement to remove the sheriff would be four-fifths.
