The TA(Y)LK To Me podcast is a youth-led, youth-created project aimed at supporting young people involved in the foster care and juvenile justice systems. Originating from the Short Term Residential Therapeutic Program (STRTP) Child and Family Team (CFT)/Youth Engagement Workgroup, co-led by the Office of Child Protection (OCP) and Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS), the podcast responds to a strong demand for relatable, visual, and audio-based educational tools. Designed by and for youth, the podcast features hosts with lived experience discussing real-life challenges alongside subject-matter experts.
