Dr. Talia Mae Bettcher

Talia Mae Bettcher is an engaged philosopher who integrates critical reflection with tangible and meaningful action in our lived world. Much of her work in trans philosophy flows from her personal experience as a trans woman and through being actively involved in trans community subcultures in Los Angeles for many years. Her philosophical investigations, even at their most abstract, aim to capture realities that are experienced by flesh and blood people and that can have political and practical consequences.

Some of her articles include “Evil Deceivers and Make[1]Believers: Transphobic Violence and the Politics of Illusion” (Hypatia 2007), “Trapped in the Wrong Theory: Re-Thinking Trans Oppression and Resistance” (Signs 2014), and “When Selves Have Sex: What the Phenomenology of Trans Sexuality Can Teach about Sexual Orientation” (Journal of Homosexuality 2014). With Susan Stryker, she co-edited the Transgender Studies Quarterly special double issue “Trans/Feminisms” (2016). She is currently completing the monograph “Intimacy and Illusion: An Essay in Trans Philosophy” (under contract with University of Minnesota Press).

Bettcher is a Professor of Philosophy at California State University, Los Angeles and she currently serves as Chair of the Academic Senate.

Jazzmun Crayton

Jazzmun Crayton is a Black trans femme whose career spans decades in show business and advocacy for the Transgender community. She has appeared in over fifty television series and movies, with her most recent roles portraying Bobbie Jean Baker, a prominent Transgender Activist and religious leader in the ABC series "When We Rise"; and playing Cindy Whitman, a wrongfully imprisoned woman of Trans experience on Fox's "Proven Innocent". As an activist, Jazzmun serves as the founder and coordinator of the Midnight Stroll, which brings awareness and sorely needed self-care supplies for street-based sex workers in order to empower them to embrace comprehensive community resources such as HIV testing and treatment, housing services, substance abuse counseling, legal and victim advocacy, and medical services.

She is a Board Member of the City of Los Angeles Transgender Advisory Council and is currently the Senior Manager of Strategic Partnerships at the Asian Pacific AIDS Intervention Team in Los Angeles. As Co-Executive Producer of the play "Lovely Bouquet of Flowers: An Exploration of Non-Traditional Gender Voices" and the accompanying documentary "In Full Bloom. ... Transcending gender", she gives voice to members of the community from all walks of life, and challenges viewers to move past their preconceived stereotypes surrounding the complexities of sexual identities and orientation in order to see the commonalities that we all share as human beings.

Jayden Fields

Jaden is an LA-based organizer, cultural worker, and educator dedicated to cultivating healing-centered spaces for marginalized communities. Jaden is the incoming Co-Director of Mirror Memoirs, an oral history and national organizing project that uplifts the healing and liberation of queer, trans, intersex, and non-binary Black, Indigenous, and people of color (QTIBIPOC) who are survivors of child sexual abuse. In his work with Mirror Memoirs, Jaden is a survivor storyteller and played a pivotal role in co-designing Mirror Memoirs' strategic vision, programs, and structure.

He is the newly appointed Equity Director for the Association for Size Diversity and Health. His work within grassroots and nonprofit organizations has included designing and leading programs for trans folks to access health services, training government agencies to better serve transgender people, participatory action research, and policy advocacy at the city and county level. Jaden was an inaugural member of the Los Angeles Transgender Advisory Council, a 2017 California HIV/AIDS Policy Research Fellow, and 2019 Echoing Green finalist.

Jaden self-published his first chapbook, *Intentional Musings on Staying Alive When I Want To Die* (2019), an honest depiction of navigating mental health and systemic oppression. Two occurrences of harm added together


Racist Oppression + Trans Oppression

One single occurrence of harm that is an instance of two different kinds of oppression



The Criminal “Justice” System and Reality Enforcement


“Dirty Little Secrets”

Privileged Oppressions

Privileged Oppression is a form of oppression that is absent of other forms of oppression (either separable or inseparable ones)

Privileged Oppression confers benefits on the basis of these other forms of oppression.
