



An Overview of Measure G: L.A. County Governance Reform

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What is Measure G?



July 9, 2024: The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors directed County Counsel to prepare documents for a proposed Charter amendment, which was then placed on the November 5, 2024, ballot and approved by voters.



Key Provisions: The amendment includes several key provisions aimed at enhancing governance in the County, with significant milestones set for 2026, 2028, and beyond.

Key Provisions of Measure G

- **By 2026:**
 - All non-urgency County legislation to be publicly posted for at least 120 hours before the Board acts.
 - An independent Ethics Commission will be established, and an Office of Ethics Compliance will be created to support the Ethics Commission's work.
- **By 2028:**
 - Creation of an elected County Executive with executive and administrative powers.
 - A County Legislative Analyst will be established to provide non-partisan support on County policy issues.
 - A Director of Budget and Management will be created to prepare/administer the budget and promote efficiency.
- **2030 and beyond:**
 - By 2031, the Board of Supervisors will expand from five to nine members, with staggered elections to begin in 2032.
 - By 2034, Charter Review Commission will be established to meet every ten years to review Los Angeles governance and County Charter, and make recommendations to the Board.

What is the Governance Reform Task Force?



The Governance Reform Task Force was established as part of the reforms set forth in Measure G and consists of 13 members.



The Task Force will advise on the implementation of Measure G reforms and help guide the transition.



This inaugural meeting marks the official start of the Task Force, as established by ordinance. Its term ends on December 3, 2028, unless extended by the Board.

Key Responsibilities of the Task Force

- Ensure reforms are carried out in accordance with Measure G goals, with input from diverse community stakeholders.
- Provide recommendations for enhanced public budget oversight.
- Advise on the creation of a County Ethics Commission.
- Oversee the establishment of an elected County Executive.
- Guide the transition from 5 to 9 Board of Supervisors members.
