- 1. Call to Order and Land Acknowledgment of Indigenous Peoples: Commission President Helen Chin called the meeting to order at 12:35 p.m. with a quorum in attendance. President Chin began by reading the L.A. County Land Acknowledgment which can be found at the following link: Land Acknowledgment (lacounty.gov) and recognized the Tongva, Tataviam, Serrano, Kizh, and Chumash Peoples as original inhabitants of these lands, honoring and paying respect to their elders and descendants; acknowledged that settler colonization resulted in land seizure, disease, subjugation, slavery, relocation, broken promises, genocide, and multi-generational trauma; reminded us of our responsibility and commitment to truth, healing, and reconciliation, and to elevating the stories, culture, and community of the original inhabitants of Los Angeles County.
- 2. Review & Approval of September 9, 2024 Meeting Minutes: The motion to approve the minutes of the Commission meeting of September 9, 2024, as presented by Vice President-Secretary Ilan Davidson, was made by Commissioner Davidson, and seconded by Commissioner Moss. The motion passed unanimously with Commissioner Johnson abstaining.

3. President's Report

- 3.1 Spotlight on Staff: Ms. Aneisa Bolton, new Commission manager: President Chin welcomed new Commissioner manager Aneisa Bolton. Ms. Bolton introduced herself as an advocate of human rights in the U.S. She explains that her understanding of inclusion is due to living in a multicultural neighborhood in Long Beach. Her love for her local community runs deep in which she became a member of the Hate Crime Response team for the City of Long Beach. Ms. Bolton elaborated on her experience as a director of training for a violence prevention program called Peace Builders, where was in many school districts. She explained that most recently managed a camp-to-community transition program for youth on probation. Commissioners took turns welcoming her to the Human Relations Commission and introducing themselves by sharing what brought them to this work.
- **3.2.** United Against Hate Week launch with Supervisor Mitchell, DA Gascon, etc: President Chin briefly shared that it was wonderful to kick off United Against Hate Week before the November elections.
- 3.3. Promotion of LA vs Hate at Chinese American Museum's Historymakers Gala:

 President Chin shared that she had the honor to attend the Chinese American Museum Historymakers Gala where she got to hear Commissioner Yuen speak urgently to the importance of the LA vs. Hate campaign. Commissioner Yuen stated that this event was attended by about 600 people at the Bonaventure as their annual major fundraiser, and she felt she needed to speak on anti-Asian hate as well as about LA vs Hate and is happy she did. Executive Director (ED) Robin Toma as well as President Chin praised Commission Yuen for an exemplary speech that commanded everyone's attention to LA vs Hate and the posters, buttons and other Vote Against Hate materials there.

4 Executive Director's Report

- **4.1 LA vs Hate Unified Against Hate Week (UAHW) Sept 20**th launch: ED Toma expressed that the event was successful and was covered well by the Daily News, as well as other news media. He continued to explain that a member of the public, Frankie Aguirre, shared his positive experience of reporting to the 211 LA vs Hate system, and getting help to move away from harassing homophobic neighbors. Now, Aguirre has become a speaker at their events. ED Toma announced there will be an upcoming event on October 23rd with Spanish speaking consuls general, to spread awareness of LA vs Hate.
- **4.2 Western Justice Center, Expediente Rojo, LA vs. Hate Consulate events:** ED Toma shared that the Dream Resource Center in Inglewood High was presented the Peacemaker's Award by the Western Justice Center at its gala and shared his screen to show photos from the event. Additionally, he spoke about LA vs Hate at an event for Expediente Rojo, a nonprofit organization that reaches out to the Spanish speaking community around criminal justice issues and awarded LAPD Deputy Chief Tingarides.
- **4.3 Communications Update PIO Tony Cowser:** PIO Tony Cowser recapped the United Against Hate launch in the Second Supervisorial District on Friday, September 20. PIO Cowser said it had good media coverage, especially on KNX News radio, which did three different cuts of the United Against Hate Week event. The coverage included sound bites from Supervisor Mitchell, Robin Toma, and Frankie Aguirre, a victim of hate. PIO Cowser

then discussed the Vote Against Hate campaign and showed digital creatives from the new campaign. He said the collateral materials for the campaign launched on Saturday, September 21, and could be seen at Metro stations, bus shelters, on buses, and some beach communities. He also showed an election PSA for the 5th Supervisorial District that featured Supervisor Barger. The PSA was also translated into Armenian via subtitles to be more inclusive of a key community for that district at Supervisor Barger's request.

4.4 Other Program and Administrative Updates: ED Toma highlighted that United Against Hate Week was very successful in terms of its speakers (not only Supervisor Holly Mitchell, but District Attorney George Gascon), and media coverage (Daily News, etc.). He shared highlights and information about attendees, including over 28 community-based organizations and partners such as Najee Ali from LA Metropolitan Churches-who is a long-time activist. ED Toma mentioned the surprise at the Western Justice Center gala that the Dream Resource Center at Inglewood High was awarded. He also added that at the Expedente Rojo event, he spoke on a panel about the work that HRC does against hate endured by the Spanish-speaking community in LA (which is the primary audience of Expediente Rojo).

5. <u>Committee Reports</u>

- **5.1. Transformative Justice Committee (Gunning):** Commissioner Gunning announced that the report from their custody visits will be presented at the next meeting along with an improvement in human rights monitoring. Gunning briefly explained the committee's objectives are to steer the interviewing process of incarcerated folks towards a human rights point of view. She expressed that she hopes Commissioner Derric Johnson can help amplify the voices of the committee and become a convener of other groups and members of the Board.
- **5.2.** Policy and Advocacy (Legislation) Committee (Montaño): Commissioner Montaño, Chair, said there was no report at this time.
- **5.3.** LA vs Hate Committee (Montaño Commissioner Montaño, Chair, shared that LA vs. Hate has already been reported.
- **5.4.** Human Rights Education/Culture Committee (Yuen): Commissioner Yuen, Chair, stated that the Committee has not yet met.
- **5.5.** Ad Hoc Committee for Five Year Strategic Plan (Kulkarni): Commissioner Kulkarni, Chair, stated that the Committee has met to discuss the strategic planning process and timeline (contained in the meeting packet).
- **6. Public Comment: (3 minutes per person):** None was offered.

7. <u>Action/Discussion Items</u>:

7.1 Commission Committees for FY 2024-25: President Chin reviewed the Committees list for FY 2024-25 and invited any changed as needed.


Commissioner EllisRoyston asked to be added to the Human Rights Committee.

- 7.2 Collaboration with County Office of Anti-Racism, Diversity, and Inclusion (ARDI): This item was tabled without objection.
- 7.3 LA County Government's Purpose and Services, and Human Rights*: ED Toma briefly walked the Commissioners through the page of the annual Hate Crime report that spells out the international human rights laws that apply to hate crimes in the U.S. He explained that he wants the Commission to raise awareness of the human rights work already done of County government. ED Toma plans on show the Board of Supervisors how progressive they are in employing international human rights treaties in the county's operations. He went over the Commission's vision statement's first bullet point that underscores the importance of achieving human rights for all as a condition of truly healthy human relations for the county.
- 7.4 Call to Action for Commissioners in Expanding Reach of LA vs Hate: ED Toma briefly requested that Commissioners think of opportunities to put the word out about LA vs Hate as Commissioner Yuen did, because it is necessary to continually make known how people can report and get help against hate.
- 8. <u>Commissioner Announcements:</u> Commissioner Davidson urged everyone to visit the Nova Exhibition before permanently closing on October 20th. Davidson highlighted how imperative it is to remember the tragedy of what happened on October 7th, 2023. Commissioner Yuen announced her event commemorating the massacre of the Chinese victims of Los Angeles will take place at the Chinese American Museum at 7:00 p.m. on October 24th. Commissioner Moss stated his opinion that everyone should foster a better relationship with one another and to promote anti-hate aims.
- 9. Adjournment: The motion to adjourn was made by President Chin, seconded by Commissioner Moss, and Commissioner Kulkarni in memory of Kris Kristofferson, a singer/songwriter and human rights activist and Dikembe Mutombo, an NBA Hall of Famer and humanitarian. The motion passed unanimously. President Chin adjourned the meeting at 2:11 p.m.



LA VS HATE, ADDRESSING BIAS & HATE

Executive Office of the Board of Supervisors (Human Relations Commission) 211 LA, Special Service for Groups, Inc., and TaskForce

In February 2018, UCLA published a study that found school administrators were reporting an alarming increase in bulying with rates estimated at +11%. While law enforcement studies note that hate crimes are one of the most under-reported of crimes, research also notes that hate crimes are the most difficult to measure the true impact on demonizing others. In addition, there is no reporting mechanism anywhere for victims of hate to report hate crimes, hate acts, and bulying.

LA vs Hate is a community-driven system that was implemented to address hate violence, bullying, and the prevention and response to this violence. Since its launch, LA vs Hate represented the first hate reporting line, developed a case management system with 2nLA, and integrated a network of agencies to respond to hate acts. LA vs Hate art has been used in hundreds of consumer posters, bus shelter ads, lifeguard stations, park sites, and libraries' klosks. It has been responsible for policy changes, such as a partnership with the California Civil Rights Department's Guidance for landlords, Homeowner Associations, or property management firms, to effectively address hate acts happening in residences, or development of a video training for law enforcement to address the severe under-reporting of hate acts/ crimes which has led to state law requiring reporting of hate acts. LA vs Hate launched eight school Dream Resource Centers to address bullying

Now, a model for other counties, it has substantially served over 50,469 County residents with effective services and has developed an interactive arts-led messaging campaign reporting 2 billion views and shares.



3.3 Anniversary of Massacre of Chinese in LA event at Chinese American Museum



On **Thursday, Oct. 24**, the Chinese American Museum will commemorate the Los Angeles Chinese Massacre of 1871 by remembering the victims of that tragic incident. Join the program online or in-person at **7:00 pm PDT** as we remember the memory of those who lost their lives.

The annual observance marks 153 years since Oct. 24, 1871 when a racially motivated mob of 500 Angelenos stormed into a predominantly Chinese section of L.A., assaulting residents and looting homes and businesses. The violence claimed the lives of 18 victims, including a young boy. Although eight perpetrators were convicted for their involvement in the attacks, the convictions were overturned a year later.

Since 2010, the museum has dedicated Oct. 24 in solemn remembrance of this moment in American history. CAM continues to serve as a safe space for reflection as well as discussion of contemporary issues involving race and xenophobia.

Friends of the Chinese American Museum Board Chair, Dr. Gay Yuen, will lead the candlelight vigil, which will be followed by a traditional Chinese bowing ceremony. The program will also feature remarks from keynote speaker Paula Yoo, author of the award-winning book, From a Whisper to a Rallying Cry: The Killing of Vincent Chin. Yoo will examine our history of racial violence and discrimination and how we can learn from the past to navigate today's tense social climate.



4.2 LA vs Hate Meeting and Press Conference on Anti-Immigration Hate – October 23rd



LA County and LA Consulates Held a Meeting to

Discuss the Increase of Anti-Immigrant Hate

Due to Political Rhetoric This Election Season

Amidst a Divisive Election Season, LA County and Representatives From Various Consulates of Spanish-speaking Countries, Unite to Discuss the Increase of Anti-Immigrant Hate in Los Angeles.

LOS ANGELES – OCTOBER 28, 2024 – The Los Angeles County Human Relations Commission and its LA vs Hate anti-hate campaign joined forces with the Latin American Consuls General, nonprofit Expediente Rojo Project, and the LA County Office of Immigrant Affairs to draw attention to the need to denounce all acts of hate and hostile acts of discrimination that Latino immigrants may face during the current election season.

The meeting's purpose was to discuss how Latin American Consuls in the Los Angeles area could ensure that their nationals, when victims of a hate crime or incident in LA county, would know how to receive confidential, free assistance in Spanish offered by reporting online to LAvsHate.org or by calling 2-1-1. The meeting also discussed the online LA vs Hate and 211 LA tools and resources that can offer protection against hate and create a more peaceful and civil county.

LA vs Hate is a system designed and run by the Los Angeles County Human Relations Commission, aimed at eliminating hate and discrimination, and supporting all residents and communities who are subjected to any type of hate acts.

"We know that during election campaigns, there are things said that increase antiimmigrant sentiment, and a large proportion of our communities in Los Angeles come from other countries," Robin Toma, Executive Director of the Los Angeles County Human Relations Commission, explained. "We want to prevent hate and discrimination, and to protect everyone's human rights. That's why we're expanding our system of assistance to include the consulates of Latin American countries and the Los Angeles County residents they serve."

"When we serve a population the size of the Mexican communities in Southern California, one of our fundamental obligations is to make sure that our nationals know how to clearly receive the message that regardless of their immigration status or nationality, they have a set of inalienable rights as human beings. We are here to defend and protect those rights, with the help of government institutions, starting, but not exclusively, with those offered to us by Los Angeles County," said the Consul General of Mexico in Los Angeles, Carlos González Gutiérrez.

"We unite against hate in all its manifestations, advocating that all immigrants and their families live without fear, enriching our society," Rigoberto Reyes, Executive Director of the Los Angeles County Office of Immigrant Affairs, stated.

"We appreciate the opportunity to be able to inform and share resources with our Latin American colleagues to ensure the rights of our migrant communities," Alejandro José Letona, Consul General of El Salvador, added.

"Reporting a crime requires courage, but also information and education. Hence the importance of building bridges," Zully Roman, Director and Founder of Expediente Rojo Project, noted.

The meeting ended with the recognition of cultural differences that would informed the best ways to enable easy reporting of hate, the importance of direct contact (not only via phone or online) between victims and service providers, and an expressed commitment that the County Commission would work to ensure that Consuls would have what they needed so that consulates could inform their nationals of LAvsHate.org and 211's free and confidential services.

About LA vs Hate

LA vs Hate is a community-centered system designed to support all residents of Los Angeles County. Led by the Human Relations Commission, LA vs Hate partners with community partners from all five County districts, representing a diverse coalition of voices committed to ending hate. The system aims to address the normalization of hate and inspire people to stand up to it, build understanding about what constitutes a hate act and how to report it, as well as support individuals and communities as they heal from the trauma of hate and work to end systemic discrimination. Hate Crime and Human Rights

Hate crimes are not only illegal under state and federal laws, they also violate human rights as defined by the international community.

In the aftermath of World War II, leaders from many nations came together in 1948 to establish the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR). Among the principles included in this declaration are affirmations that all human beings are equal in dignity and rights and no one is to be subject to torture or to cruel, inhumane, or degrading treatment. Groups and nations around the world continue to work diligently to turn the UDHR's powerful principles into action.

Since 1965, the U.S. and 176 other nations have signed the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination (CERD), which compels signatory nations to combat racial and national origin discrimination. Under this treaty, hate crimes are considered serious human rights abuses. The CERD Committee has stressed that government action as well as inaction can violate CERD, and there is no excuse for complacency or indifference by a government toward either public or private discrimination, particularly when it involves violence.

When the U.S. and 167 other nations signed the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR), they committed to respect and fulfill the right to life and the security of the person regardless of race, color, sex, language, religion, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth, or other status.

The U.S. Constitution states that the Constitution and treaties are the supreme law of the land. Thus, all levels of government in the U.S. – including counties, cities, and school districts – and individuals have a duty to uphold these treaty obligations to address discrimination in any form, including hate crime.

Human Rights First (www.humanrightsfirst.org/ discrimination) suggests the following strategies for responding to hate crime:

- Acknowledge and condemn hate crimes whenever they occur. Senior leaders should send immediate, strong, public, and consistent messages that violent hate crimes—including against migrants, refugees, and asylum seekers—will be investigated thoroughly and prosecuted to the full extent of the law.
- Strengthen enforcement and prosecute offenders. Governments should ensure that those responsible for hate crimes are held accountable under the law and that the prosecution of hate crimes against any individuals regardless of their legal status in the country is a priority for the criminal justice system.
- Develop educational and transformative approaches, particularly restorative justice mechanisms, for hate crime offenders. Governments need to use effective methods to heal communities and reduce recidivism.
- Monitor and report on hate crimes. Governments should maintain official systems of
 monitoring and public reporting to provide
 accurate data for informed policy decisions to
 combat hate crimes.
- Reach out to community groups. Governments should conduct outreach and education to communities to reduce fear and assist victims, advance police-community relations, encourage improved reporting of hate crimes to the police, and improve the quality of data collection by law enforcement bodies.

CONNECTION BETWEEN HUMAN RIGHTS AND OUR COMMISSION MANDATE

We invest our time, expertise, creativity, and resources in advocacy and action for the full effectuation of the human rights of all persons and peoples in LA County in fulfillment of the County law's mandate to our Commission and staff to:

- work for the elimination in our County of injustices and inequities resulting from prejudice, intolerance, and discrimination;
- advance public welfare and security;
- cultivate good will and better relations among all people;
- foster civic peace and intergroup understanding; and
- promote equal opportunity and full acceptance of all community members in all aspects of community life.

In compliance with the Board's explicitly assigned duties for accomplishing our mandate from them, we:

- Engage in research and education;
- Design, deliver, and manage programs;
- Collaborate with and help coordinate throughout the County the work of partner agencies and groups;
- Collaborate with County departments; and
- Recommend to the Board needed policies, including legislation.
