To our global community,

We are hopeful that medical advancements will slow COVID-19, however, we continue to see the toll this past year has taken on our patients and neighbors, particularly the most underserved. This is why we listen to and partner with charitable organizations, communities and our employees to understand how we can best use the power of giving to help those in need.

With social distancing requirements making many programs challenging to execute, we are energized by the new ways charitable partners continuously innovate. Clinicians have stayed up into the night to video-in and guide healthcare workers as they treat patients. Clinical education forums have shifted to virtual learning platforms. Social distanced workstations have allowed homeless youth to plug into and continue their virtual education. These are just a few examples – the stories are inspiring and the ingenuity is remarkable.

This unprecedented time called for an unprecedented response, and that is what we did: 2020 was our most significant year of giving yet, nearly doubling from \$11 million in 2019 to almost \$20 million. Edwards Lifesciences Foundation funded 277 global charitable partners in 40 countries. We donated nearly \$10 million in Edwards technologies for humanitarian care, globally. We saw employees giving more than ever through our match programs, and we were honored to triple their gifts to charitable partners.

What Makes Our Hearts Beat

Even with the hardship of COVID-19, in 2020 EHM expanded its impact on patients:

 Approximately 130,000 underserved patient lives impacted

 A total of 24 countries positively impacted

As our signature charitable initiative, Every Heartbeat Matters (EHM) has become the centerpiece of our global giving, focused where we believe we can have the greatest impact - underserved structural heart and critical care patients. We are grateful for the passion and commitment of our charitable partners as we grow EHM to support even more patients with the greatest need. Right now, that need and barriers to care are more distinct than ever with many programs halted for COVID-19.

In 2020, we set a new, ambitious goal for EHM:

Improve the lives of 2.5 million additional underserved structural heart and critical care patients by the end of 2025.

This builds on the success of our partners who, since 2014, have impacted over 1.7 million underserved people. EHM is focused on addressing an urgent need: over 11 million people¹ in the U.S. and millions more globally are affected by heart valve disease – a deadly, yet treatable, disease.

We are proud that as this initiative expands, so have our opportunities to support humanitarian clinicians, educators, and underserved patients worldwide. In partnership with MAP International, we have enhanced our product donation program, increasing access to donated Edwards technologies for underserved structural heart and critical care patients outside the U.S. Supporting our communities and patients within them continues to be what makes our hearts beat, with purpose.

Stories of Every Heartbeat Matters

Meet Woodmylens

Woodmylens, five years old, and his parents sought out treatment for him at a hospital in Port-au-Prince, Haiti. There, a visiting pediatric cardiologist determined that Woodmylens was suffering from rheumatic heart disease. With the help of a partnership between EHM charitable partners Mitral Foundation and Haiti Cardiac Alliance (HCA), he was put on a waiting list for surgery. Finally, HCA was able to arrange the operation at a hospital in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic (DR). Excited to share the good news, HCA called Woodmylens' parents, only to discover that their cell phone numbers were no longer valid. Without even a street address, which are rare in rural Haiti, HCA had no way of contacting them. All they knew was the name of the district where they lived, which was home to thousands of people. HCA decided to go to his town to search for him. When they arrived, the case manager approached a house to knock on the door. As he did, he glanced over and saw a little boy without clothes playing in the dirt with a toy car made of twisted wire and old tin cans. He recognized it was Woodmylens. Five days later, Woodmylens was in DR ready for surgery.



Within 48 hours after surgery, Woodmylens was sitting up in bed in a cheerful, brightly decorated Pediatric Intensive Care Unit, sore, but with a heart pumping as it should.

Rising to the Challenge, Innovating to Help More Patients

In collaboration with EHM partners The Thoracic Surgery Foundation and Children's National Medical Center, Dr. Craig Sable and Dr. Pranava Sinha intended to go to Uganda to perform humanitarian cardiac surgery on eight patients in March 2020. This was a recurring visit as a part of a long-term relationship to elevate patient care and rheumatic heart disease research in Uganda. However, like many other events in 2020, there was a need to pivot: 72 hours after half the team arrived, Uganda closed its borders, restricting travel and leaving the doctors and their team separated in two countries.

Determined to get the patients the care that they needed to survive, the clinical teams collaborated, deciding that Dr. Sable would lead the surgeries, with Dr. Sinha assisting via telemedicine in the U.S., and rely on the local Ugandan clinical team to take a larger role in the complex surgeries than they had in the past. Dr. Sable and Dr. Sinha knew the Ugandan team was ready – it was just a bit sooner than they intended in their robust, long-term training plan. They were right. All eight surgeries were completed with the quick adoption of including telemedicine and more native clinical involvement, helping patients, giving the local Ugandan clinicians increased clinical experience, and pushing forward in the quest for sustainable clinical care for underserved heart patients.



With at-risk children at the heart of their mission, EHM Thailand-based partner The Life Skills Development Foundation (Rak Dek) distributed patient care packages assembled by employees at Edwards' 2020 Japan and Asia-Pacific Sales Meeting. To help families and schools keep rheumatic heart disease patients safe, protected, and informed, Rak Dek also provided information and guided actions for prevention of COVID-19.

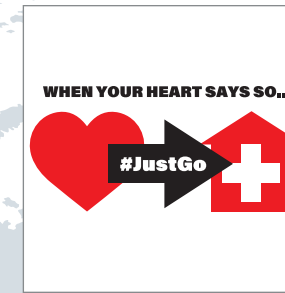
United States: AltaMed Expands COVID-19 Testing in Orange County

EHM's new flexibility to unrestrict funds allowed AltaMed to pivot and pilot a new delivery model of care for its low-income and underinsured patients. As COVID-19 hit California, AltaMed modified its programming to become a key testing site in Southern California for low-income patients. By mobilizing its many partnerships, AltaMed implemented outdoor assessment sites, designated separate exam rooms to test and treat COVID-19 positive patients, and evaluated and tested over 72,000 people since March 2020. AltaMed is leveraging these new ways to deliver health care as they begin to vaccinate seniors and other patient groups in its 300,000 patient base.



Puerto Rico: Supporting Vulnerable Communities

To adapt to the changing needs in Puerto Rico, Fundación Dr. García Rinaldi, led by Dr. Rinaldi himself, redirected its focus to increase awareness among vulnerable, underserved structural heart patients on the risks of COVID-19. Leveraging telemedicine, the organization brought awareness and necessary treatment to over 100 adults in four areas of Puerto Rico. We mourn the recent passing of Dr. Rinaldi, and know the legacy of his work will live on in the lives of these and many other patients of Puerto Rico.



Ireland: When your heart says so...#JustGo

When the COVID-19 pandemic swept the globe, EHM partners within the Global Heart Hub initiative, an alliance of heart patient organizations, immediately collaborated to help underserved patients. They conducted a survey to learn what heart disease patients were going through, and what they needed. They found that patients were delaying medical attention due to fear of contracting the virus, despite being a potentially greater risk to their life. This led to the launch of a patient-to-patient campaign encouraging those experiencing a heart or stroke emergency NOT to stay at home – "When your heart says so, #JustGo."



Pakistan: Humanitarian Care Brought to Patients Despite the Pandemic

With support of The Thoracic Surgery Foundation, Dr. Mubashir Mumtaz of University of Pittsburgh Medical Center and his team of clinical volunteers, travel each year to Tahir Heart Institute in Punjab, Pakistan. Despite the risks, the team did not stop when the pandemic hit. They continued perform humanitarian cardiac surgeries on underserved patients and offer training to local clinicians across Pakistan.



Madagascar: Hosting Mamina

La Ribambelle is dedicated to aiding underserved children in Madagascar to receive cardiac surgery. They find host families in Marseille, France to welcome these children into their homes so they have a place to heal before and after humanitarian treatment. Mamina (age two) was already in France when the pandemic hit and borders closed. His stay abroad without his family lasted more than six months. It was a great joy to his family when he finally returned home with a repaired heart... and speaking French!

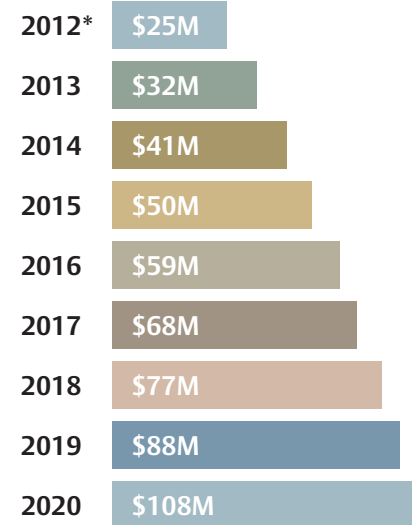

Cooking for Our Communities

As the need has continued to grow in the communities where we live and work, we are proud of our employees' commitment to helping to feed hungry neighbors. Edwards Israeli Innovation Center Team from the Caesarea and Or Yehuda locations volunteered for a special project, Cooking with a Chef.



Cooking with a Chef brings together organizations that are committed to helping families in need, the elderly, and at-risk youth. For over eight hours, our volunteers cooked 200 meals and afterwards delivered them all around the country to those affected by the pandemic.

Caring for Our Communities

While the world was focused on the pandemic, hundreds of thousands of people in Lebanon also faced hardship caused by the devastating Beirut explosion. The need to support this community was urgent and complex.



Our employees drove a global initiative with the Edwards Lifesciences Foundation to support the Lebanese Red Cross' humanitarian efforts. Our hearts, and the people of Lebanon, are full of gratitude as nearly 200 employees from 19 different countries donated over \$90,000 cumulatively with our matching gift program.

Costumes for Our Communities

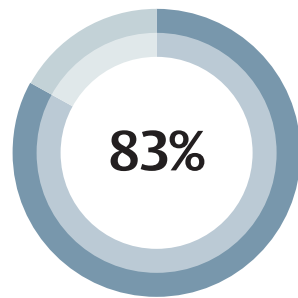

Challenges Spur Our Innovation

Listening and responding to the current state of the world, “virtual volunteerism” are words we have come to embrace and incorporate in our charitable activities globally. From food donations, book drives, donating physical education equipment to schools, making audiobooks for the visually impaired, to donating refurbished computers, the way we now engage with our charitable partners is even more creative... to say the least!

To support the needs of local students and their virtual learning needs, our information technology team refurbished 80 computers to donate to local charitable organizations, supporting staff, students, families and other neighbors in need of virtual platforms as the pandemic limited opportunities for in-person learning. For example, long-time partner, Project Hope Alliance, needed technology to support homeless youth, whom were suddenly thrust into virtual school, sometimes by borrowing their parents’ smartphones. Our donated computers for these at-risk youth have created a reliable way to access their education during this uncertain time.

The students have shown immense gratitude for these new laptops, which make learning easier than on smartphones. One middle-school student shared that this laptop allowed him to complete five assignments in the same amount of time that he would have only completed one. These laptops have increased the chance of success, and have helped cut the disparity in learning for homeless students.



To provide students and their families with the equipment needed for virtual learning, employees organized and led the assembly of 425 technology kits, which included wireless mice, laptop bags and headphones, provided to 2-5 grade students at Edwards’ adopted at-risk school partner, Washington Elementary in Santa Ana, California. “Our staff, students and families are very grateful for the outpouring of kindness and positive belief in their academic journey,” Jackie Ochoa, Washington Elementary Principal.
