From hope to healing

>>> Samantha Andrews

Samantha Andrews is a resilient 10-year-old who has faced the challenges of Acute Myeloid Leukemia (AML) with courage. After her initial diagnosis in 2021 followed by a year of remission in 2022, Samantha's spirit remained unbroken. Unfortunately, she relapsed in August of 2023.

Before her mother broke the news to her, Samantha had been eagerly anticipating milestones like starting soccer, embarking on her Disney 'Make A Wish' journey, and exploring the great outdoors through hiking and camping. However, her dreams were abruptly interrupted, leaving her feeling as though life's adventures were slipping away once more. Once she was told, Samantha said, "but I'm just starting to live life again..."

Samantha and her family started hosting DKMS donor drives, registering over 1,000 potential donors in hopes of finding a match for herself and patients alike. In December 2023, Samantha finally found her match and underwent a life-saving stem cell transplant from a German donor.

Samantha returned home earlier this year with her spirit renewed, and her body on the path to recovery. With

almost 100% of her cells testing as donor cells, she has achieved remission! Samantha's story serves as a reminder of the power of perseverance and of hope.



Transforming lives together

>>> Abby Pyne



In 2015, former Duke soccer player Abby Pyne had the chance to coach a young girl named Emily at a Duke soccer camp. Emily was later diagnosed with Leukemia and treated at Duke Hospital System, where she ended up undergoing a bone marrow transplant from her sister. Emily's fight inspired Abby to register as a stem cell donor herself in 2016 and eventually seek a career in medicine. Six years later, Abby, now a second year medical student at Duke, got a call from DKMS that she was a match for a patient in need. When asked if she would donate, she said yes and in April of 2023, Abby donated her blood stem cells to help a patient in need.



Now, she hopes that sharing her story will help inspire others to register as potential donors.

Trish Grannis, aka Mama G, was diagnosed with Myelofibrosis in 2021. As the cancer progressed, Mama G became in need of a stem cell transplant. Since then, her family, including daughters Misa, Emi and Kina Grannis, and son-in-law Jesse Epstein, have been tirelessly looking for a perfect match who can give Mama G a second chance at life.

When the chief operating officer of The Potter's House, Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity Inc. life member, family man, active community member, and educator, Frank Dyer, was diagnosed with the beginning stages of blood cancer, the search for a matching donor began immediately.

A bond of a lifetime

>>> Ben and Jan

Ben Clark's life changed forever in 2010 when he was diagnosed with T-cell Lymphoblastic Lymphoma, a form of blood cancer. He quickly underwent extensive chemotherapy that required weeklong hospital stays. Ben achieved remission but then learned that the cancer had come back and he would need a stem cell transplant. And for that, he would need to find a matching donor.

Miles away, Jan registered to be a potential lifesaver with DKMS. Having watched his childhood friend battle and ultimately lose the fight against cancer, Jan didn't hesitate to donate his stem cells to a stranger if that meant a second chance at life for the person on the receiving end.

Fast forward to 2023 when Ben proposed to the love of his life, he knew he had to ask Jan to be his best man.
