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Get ready to join us at the International Study Centre

You will find useful information on our Welcome Hub to help you to prepare for starting your programme. Before you join us, there are six things you need to do first.

1 - APPLY FOR YOUR VISA (IF REQUIRED)

Most international students (non-European Economic Area) need a visa to come to Ireland, although there are a number of countries where you may not require a visa.

To check whether you need a visa and to apply if required please visit the Irish Naturalisation and Immigration Service (INIS) website: inis.gov.ie

IF YOU DO NEED A VISA

Step 1: Complete the online application form.

Visit: www.visas.inis.gov.ie

Step 2: Follow the instructions on the summary application form you will receive, which will include information on where to submit your form and documents

Step 3: Submit the documents, outlined below. Documents must be sent to the local Irish Embassy/Consulate/Visa Office.

- Summary application form (printed, signed and dated) providing full details of your previous education
- · An explanation for any gaps in your educational history
- · Two colour passport photographs – not more than 6 months old

- Current passport (valid for 12 months after your arrival date in Ireland), and a copy of previous passports, if applicable.
- · Signed letter of application including your full contact details
- Letter of Acceptance from Dublin ISC confirming and specifying acceptance on your course of study. This letter should confirm the amount of fees payable and fees paid for the course. Our visa letter will provide proof of this.
- \cdot Evidence of course fees paid
- a) A copy of an Electronic Transfer of Funds from the applicant to the bank of the centre/ valid receipt showing course fees lodged to an approved student fees payment service b) Visa letter

If the course fees are:

- a) in excess of £6,000, at least this amount must be paid before applying for the visa
- b) less than £6,000, this must be paid in full before applying for the visa

· Evidence you have the academic and English ability to follow your chosen course

Such evidence will include exam results AND qualification certificates AND English certificates. While not a mandatory requirement, it is recommended that all applicants take a English language test approved by the Irish Government, and provide the original certificate with their visa application. Any certificate must have been issued within 2 years of the expected start date of your course.

· Evidence of sufficient funds to support yourself during your studies

For all academic courses due to begin after 1 July 2023, student must show evidence (e.g. bank statement) that you have immediate access to at least £10,000. This is the estimated cost of living in Ireland for a student for one academic year.

The bank statements must show full contact details of the bank – name, address, telephone number and include the name, address and account type of the account holder and the account number.

If you are a sponsored student, then details of the relationship is required. Evidence of ready access may include the sponsor's employment letter with contact details of the employer – name, address and landline phone number, and four recent payslips.

If you are funded by a scholarship, please provide details of the funding and a letter to support this.

- Evidence of private medical insurance **See point 6**
- Details of any previous visa applications for any country and visa refusal letters (if applicable)
- Birth certificate (for unaccompanied students under 18 years)
- Consent of parent(s)/ legal guardian(s)

You may be required to provide your Biometrics information as part of the application process. You need to submit the required documents to avoid your application being refused.

Processing time and visa decisions

Please allow a minimum time of eight weeks for student visas to be approved.

Visa decisions are published weekly (every Tuesday). You can search for the progress of your application using your Visa Transaction Number that will be allocated to you at the time you submit your application. Visit: inis.gov.ie

2 - COMPLETE OUR PRE-REGISTRATION FORM

It's important that we have upto-date information for you. Fill out and verify the information in the form at any time as you finalise your study and travel plans. The form can be found on your Welcome Hub.

3 - BOOK YOUR ACCOMMODATION

During your time at the International Study Centre we strongly recommend booking student accommodation.

Alternatively you can arrange your own private accommodation.

If you have requested accommodation on your application form, our Central Student Services Team will contact you directly regarding the options available. Ensure that you have provided your contact details to avoid any delay in processing your request.

You may prefer to arrange your own accommodation. Make sure that you have secured your accommodation before arriving in Ireland and let us know where you will be staying to ensure that there are no difficulties on arrival.

4 - BOOK YOUR TRAVEL

Once you receive your visa, you can book your travel. You should arrive ready for the first day of term to get a good start to your studies. If you have booked your accommodation with us, it will usually be available two days prior to the start of term.

You should not book any flights home until you have received your full academic calendar from the International Study Centre during induction week.

5 - COMPLETE THE GUARDIAN APPLICATION FORMS (UNDER 18 ONLY)

You will have received details to complete in order to consent to a guardian for you, either via our Godsil* partnership or with an alternative International Study Centre approved guardian. You will need to complete the form and your parent(s) will need to sign and have it notarised. You should make a copy, and bring one copy with you in your hand luggage and keep the other in your main luggage.

*Doesn't apply to sponsored students from Kuwait.

6 - ENSURE YOU ARE INSURED

It is essential that international students have the protection of personal insurance for the duration of their time in Dublin, Ireland as well as for registration with immigration.

When you applied to the International Study Centre, you will have had the option of taking insurance cover with StudyCare Insurance. This insurance policy covers loss of personal possessions as well as providing health and medical insurance. If you have not taken this option, please make sure you have secured your own policy.

For full information on StudyCare Insurance, visit: studygroup.com/studycare-ie In addition to personal insurance, all students enrolled in a programme of study at Dublin International Study Centre require Learner Protection Insurance. This is mandatory insurance cover recognised by the Department of Justice and approved by the awarding body, QQI and is automatically added to your booking when you receive your offer to study.

Learner Protection Insurance means that in the event that a study centre closes before the completion of a course, the centre will have a mechanism in place to either provide you with a suitable alternative or receive a refund of fees paid. The cost of your insurance is based on a proportion of your tuition fee and paid at the same time as you confirm your place on your course. Prior to your course start date, you will receive a certificate of insurance from the insurance provider, Arachas, confirming that you are covered.

What to bring with you to Ireland

You'll need to pack some important items, such as your passport and visa, in your hand luggage for easy access, while other non-essential items can be packed away in your suitcase.

A It is recommended that your passport should be valid for the duration of the course. If it expires during your studies, you will need to renew it in Ireland.



Things to pack in your hand luggage

- Passport and visa
- Your offer letter
- Your education certificates including IELTS or other original Secure English Language Test
- Evidence of funding for your tuition fees and living costs, including sponsor letter (if you are being sponsored)
- Accommodation documents, if vou are living on campus, please ensure that you have agreed to the University College Dublin Residences terms and conditions and that you have a copy of your booking receipt with you on arrival.
- ☐ Notarised letter naming your designated guardian in Ireland (if you are under 18)
- Any insurance documents
- Medical certificates includina vaccination records
- ☐ Mobile phone
- Essential toiletries and medications (please check with your airline what's permitted)
- Enough money to live on in the first few weeks. We advise you do not bring large amounts of cash.

Things to pack in your suitcase

Dublin has a variety of shops so you'll be able to buy everything you need to live comfortably. Many of the personal items you wish to bring with you, such as clothes, accessories and books can go in your suitcase.

You must bring:

- Laptop computer and charger.*
- Comfortable clothing such as trainers, jeans, t-shirts, jumpers and a warm/ waterproof coat. The dress code at the International Study Centre is informal.
- Study supplies e.g. pens and paper notepads
- these may be less expensive in your country.
- Mobile phone and charger.
- At least one travel adaptor plug 240v with a three-pin plug (like the one pictured below).

If you have booked private accommodation, you will need to check what is supplied.

*You must have a PC or Mac based computer available for use in order to access course materials, Learning Management System (LMS) / Virtual Learning Environment (VLE) platform and undertake assessments - it is important that all students are prepared with the appropriate technology. Linux, Chromebooks and Windows 10S/11S Mode are not supported

Please note it is not possible to complete your assessments on an iPad or a Chromebook and these are not suitable substitutes for one of the above. While it is possible to access and interact with most course content using various tablets and smartphones, such as iPads, iPhones and Android devices, these devices will not work for assessments


Arriving in Dublin, Ireland

Travelling to a new country can be a little overwhelming. To make it easier for you, we've outlined the process below so that you know exactly what to expect when you arrive.

If you are from outside the European Union (EU), when you reach border control, please enter through the Non-EU entrance. Please be prepared for an immigration interview with Irish Naturalisation and Immigration Service (INIS) staff. It is common for international students to be stopped at the border, so please don't worry if this happens to you. Border Patrol will most likely just want to check that you are safe to enter the country. You must be able to answer some questions in English and have a basic conversation without the assistance of an interpreter - failure to do so may result in you being denied access to the country, at which point you will have to return home. Please note that the Irish border control can be very busy, so you may have to wait in a queue to see an Immigration Officer. After collecting your luggage and making your way through customs, you will reach the arrivals hall.

Taxi transfer

Most students get a taxi at the airport upon arrival - as there are taxi ranks at the airport and you should have no trouble finding an available car.

If you would prefer to book in advance, you can either make this booking yourself via a taxi company of your choosing, or we can book it for you and add the fare fee to your account.

Making your own way

If you are travelling directly to your accommodation, the safest way is by taxi from Dublin Airport.

 Once you are registered with
 the University you will get your
 student card and be able
 to set up and log on to the
 University's internet network.

You will also get information about the University sports facilities and gym memberships.

- Registering with the Irish Naturalisation and Immigration Service (INIS)
 You will need to register with the INIS during your first weeks with us and have up to 90 days to do so. Staff at the ISC will help you with this. You will need:
- · Your passport
- Bank Statement of an Irish bank account in your name, showing a balance of at least £4500 (if you did not require a visa to come to Ireland)
- · Offer letter (original)
- Letter from the International Study Centre
- Your insurance policy
- Statement of Attendance from previous college (only if you have been studying in Ireland already)

If you are **over 18**, you will need to pay a fee of £300 by credit card, laser card or bank giro (cash is not accepted).

If you are **under 18**, this fee does not apply, but you will need to supply additional documents:

A letter from your parent or guardian permitting you to study in Ireland stating:

- · Name and address of the centre
- Notarised letter naming your designated guardian in Ireland. If you do not have a designated person your student advisor can help you.
- Photocopies of the biodata pages of the parent or guardian passport photograph and signature must be visible.

We want you to feel at home as quickly as possible. If you have any worries, you can always approach any of our friendly staff and they will be very happy to help.
