How to report



Police

All fraud in the UK is reported to the police at Action Fraud by phone or online:

0300 123 2040 www.actionfraud.police.uk

Action Fraud is the central reporting point for all reports of fraud, your local police force will be informed by Action Fraud.



Banks

Dial 159 (Stop Scams UK Anti-Fraud Hotline)
An automated line which takes you through to your bank's fraud team.

For alternative ways of contacting your bank only use the contact details on your bank card or the official website.



Emails

Forward fraudulent emails to report@phishing.gov.uk



Phone Numbers

Forward phone numbers sending you fraudulent messages or calls to **7726**



We secure our homes to prevent burglary.

Why don't we do the same to prevent fraud? The impact of being a victim of fraud can have a negative effect on our physical and mental health as well as financial. The crime of fraud can lead to further identity fraud, blackmail and loss of confidence. We need to start securing our lives against scams and fraud. This simple check list is designed to ensure you have basic prevention measures in place to minimise the risk from fraud.

There are four paths into your life that a criminal will explore to commit fraud.

CONSULT Challenge by cutting off communication and confirming who they are through official contact details. Ask trusted people for their thoughts.

Fraud



An accommodation scam or fraud is when someone tricks you into sending money to rent a room or property, which doesn't exist or belongs to someone else

View the property in person or at the very least via a live video call. Confirm the property is genuine and available

Gift Card Fraud

The police,
HMRC, DVLA or
any other reputable
organisation would
NEVER make a
phone call to you
requesting that you
purchase gift cards
to pay 'fines or
taxes.'

Be wary of anyone at work asking you to buy gift cards.

Sometimes criminals impersonate employees by using their email address.

- Be aware of people online striking up relationships and asking you to buy gift cards.
- Check with colleagues in person about any emails requesting gift cards.
 - Do not share details or codes of any gift cards that you have purchased.

> QR or "Quick Response" Codes look like this:



Criminals produce their own QR Codes and trick you into scanning them

> These dishonest **QR Codes** can be both **PHYSICAL** and **DIGITAL**

- Check that Physical QR Codes

have not been tampered with

- Check & use the correct Web Address or APP for the

QR Code

 Use your phones QR Code scanner



If it feels like a trap... Break the contact.

Ticket Fraud

Criminals target people who are desperate for tickets. Common targets are flights, major sporting events, summer festivals



summer festivals and big-name performers Check with the promoter or venue, how and when tickets are being distributed



Beware when booking flights and travel excursions

Criminals create fake
websites and social media
Profiles to sell tickets that
are fraudulent or
don't exist.

They will offer tickets before the real tickets have gone on sale and when events are sold out.

Social Media hacking is linked with Ticket Fraud Use Two-Factor Authentication to protect your Social Media
