# Get ready to join us at the International Study Centre

You will find useful information on our Welcome Hub to help you to prepare for starting your course. Before you join us, there are five things you need to do first.

### 1 Apply for your visa

To study in the UK, you are required to have a valid visa. Our Admissions Centre will advise and issue the relevant documents you will need.

### Student visa

For a Student visa you will need a Confirmation of Acceptance of Studies (CAS) number which will be issued to you by our Admissions Centre. You can only apply for your Student visa once you have received your CAS number.

Step 1: You may be required to have a Pre-CAS interview. You will be contacted by Admissions to book your Pre-CAS interview via a link. Remember to then attend your interview on the pre-booked date.

Step 2: Our Admissions Centre will issue a CAS preview by email usually within six months of the course start date (three months if you are in the UK), provided you:

- Have met all academic, English language and other conditions in your offer letter.
- Have completed, signed and returned your Acceptance and Indemnity Form to the Admissions Centre.
- Are up-to-date with your payments as stated in your offer letter and payment plan.

Step 3: Carefully check all the details on the CAS preview and return the signed CAS Declaration document. Once we have received your CAS Declaration, we will issue you with your CAS statement that will include your CAS number.

**Step 4**: Before you submit your Student visa application, make sure you understand and meet all the requirements to avoid a visa refusal. Before you apply, make sure you have:

- sufficient funds in an acceptable account maintained for at least 28 consecutive days and the financial document is not expired at the time of payment for visa application.
- paid the Immigration Health Surcharge for NHS health care treatment
- all required documents in support of your visa application.

As part of your visa application you may be asked to attend a visa interview either face to face, by video conference or on the telephone. You may be asked questions about the reasons for studying in the UK, why you have chosen to study at your chosen destination and why you will study your chosen course. You should know about your chosen study destination and course and how it relates to your overall career plans as well as how you intend to fund your studies in the UK. You must answer all questions truthfully and accurately.

2 Complete our Pre-Registration form

**Student Visas are Moving to Digital** 

If your visa application is approved, you are likely to be granted

a digital eVisa. UK Visas and Immigration (UKVI) is transitioning from physical documents to an online digital immigration system. You will be able to access details of your immigration status, such as your visa expiry date, online through your UKVI account.

You will need a Share Code\* to prove your immigration status.

\*A share code is a personal identifier that verifies your immigration status. This allows us to access you<u>r eVisa and confirm your right to study in the UK.</u>

It's important that we have up-to-date information for you. Fill out and update the information in the form at any time as you finalise your study and travel plans. The form can be found on your Welcome Hub.

## 3 Book your accommodation

During your time at the International Study Centre you can choose to either live in allocated student accommodation or arrange your own private accommodation.

If you have requested accommodation on your application form, our Central Student Services Team will contact you directly regarding the options available. Keep your contact details up to date via the Pre-Registration form so we can contact you without delay regarding your accommodation request.

You may prefer to arrange your own accommodation. Make sure that you have secured your accommodation before arriving in the UK and update the details in your Pre-Registration Form.

Please note that you must live within a 60-minute commute of the International Study Centre.

### 4 Book your travel

Once you receive your visa, you can book your travel. You should arrive ready for the first day of the semester to get a good start to your studies. If you have booked your accommodation with us, it will usually be available two days prior to the start of the semester.

You should not book any flights home until you arrive in the Centre and speak with the Student Experience Team as there may be further assessments after the end of term dates shown on your offer letter. You can then book your flight back home to be scheduled after any final assessments.

Please see page 8 for your suggested arrival airport.

If you require a taxi transfer from the airport, you need to complete the relevant section in the Pre-Registration form.

### 5 Ensure you are insured

In our experience, it is essential that international students have the protection of personal insurance for the duration of their time in the UK.

When you applied to the International Study Centre, you will have had the option of taking insurance cover with StudyCare Insurance. This insurance policy covers loss of personal possessions as well as providing health and medical insurance. If you have not taken this option, please make sure you have secured your own policy.

Depending on the country you live in, you may need to have a tuberculosis (TB) test before you apply. Please read the full visa guidance at: gov.uk/student-visa

# What to bring with you to the UK

You'll need to pack some important items, such as your passport and visa, in your hand luggage for easy access, while other non-essential items can be packed away in your suitcase.

### Things to pack in your suitcase

Stockton-on-Tees has a variety of shops so you'll be able to buy everything you need to live comfortably. Many of the personal items you wish to bring with you, such as clothes, accessories and books can go in your suitcase.


### You must bring:

- · Laptop computer and charger.\*
- · Comfortable clothes the International Study Centre has an informal dress code. You can bring comfortable clothing such as trainers, jeans, t-shirts, jumpers and a warm/waterproof coat.
- Study supplies e.g. pens and paper notepads - these may be less expensive in your country.
- · Mobile phone and charger
- · At least one travel adaptor plug - 240v with a three-pin plug (like the one pictured opposite).

Your accommodation may provide a bedding and catering pack.

If you have booked private accommodation, you will need to check what is supplied.





## Top Tip

Check with your airline on what you can bring in terms of size and weight for hand and checked luggage.

Calling from the UK? Once you're in the UK and calling from a UK phone, you don't need to include the '+44', just replace it with a '0'. For example, a number that internationally is +44 191 334 0698 becomes 0191 334 0698.

# Arriving in the UK

Travelling to a new country can be a little overwhelming. To make it easier for you, we've outlined the process below so that you know exactly what to expect when you arrive.



Be prepared for an immigration interview with UK Visas and Immigration (UKVI) staff.

It is common for international students to be stopped at the border, so please don't worry if this happens to you. Border Patrol will most likely just want to check that you are safe to enter the country.

You must be able to answer some questions in English and have a basic conversation without the assistance of an interpreter – failure to do so may result in you being denied access to the UK, at which point you will have to return home. The UK border control can be very busy, so don't be surprised if you have to wait in a queue.

After collecting your luggage and making your way through customs, you will reach the Arrivals hall.

# Getting to Durham University ISC from Newcastle Airport

Newcastle Airport or Durham Tees Valley are the closest international airports to Durham University International Study Centre at the Queen's Campus, Stockton-on-Tees. Alternatively, you can fly to Manchester.

### By plane and pre-booked transfer

If you are arriving by plane and pre-booked a taxi transfer, you will be met by the taxi driver in the Arrivals Hall. The driver will be holding a sign with your name on it.

You will need to have completed the Arrivals Form we will send you and return it to

If you are heading directly to your accommodation booked with our Central Student Support Team. the taxi driver will take you to collect your keys - they will have been informed where you will be staying, but it is a good idea for you to have the details to hand.

Check your room confirmation for details of where and when to collect your keys, particularly if you are arriving late at night or early in the morning when residence receptions may not be open. If you are arriving when the reception is not open, check your room confirmation for out of hours key collection information.

If you are staying in private accommodation, you will need to have provided the address at the time of booking directly with the taxi company via the Pre-Registration form.

### Making your own way

The closest train station is Thornaby which can be reached from Darlington, a station on the main rail line between London and Scotland.

# What to bring with you when you come to the Centre

Please bring the following documents, so that we can register you on the course:

- Evidence of your Secure English Language Test
- Passport
- UKVI Visa Decision Letter or EU Settlement Scheme eligibility share code and conditions letter
- Sponsor letter (if you are being sponsored)
- If you are under the age of 18, a copy of your UK Guardian's details and Under 18 parental consent letter
- Evidence of eligibility to study (e.g. CAS letter)
- Decision notification letter if you were granted an eVisa (student route application EU/EEA nationals)
- Digital photo of yourself (passport size)

- Your share code\* to prove your immigration status
- Your visa vignette showing your entry stamp to the UK (sticker in your passport) or flight evidence if your vignette was not stamped on arrival

As soon as you arrive at the centre, you must provide your registration documentations on your first day. Without submitting these documents, you **may not** be permitted to start attending your course. If you experience any technical difficulties, please speak to the student support team immediately.

\*A share code is a personal identifier that verifies your immigration status. This allows us to access your eVisa and confirm your right to study in the UK.To obtain a share code, visit: www.gov.uk/view-prove-immigration-status

### During your welcome week you will learn about: Opening a bank account

If you bring a banker's draft in pounds sterling with you (payable to yourself) or arrange for it to be sent, you can open a bank account once you have registered for your course.

In order to open a bank account you will need:

- · a passport
- proof you are a student we will issue you with a letter
- proof of a UK address
- proof of your current immigration status

### Your chosen programme

Get your all-important timetable and find out what you need to achieve to progress to the University.

### Registering with the University

Once you are registered with the University you will get your student card and be able to set up and log on to the University's internet network. You will also get information about the University sports facilities and gym memberships.

# Your checklist



### As soon as possible

- Have you checked your contact information and provided other details in the Pre-Registration Form?
- Have you paid the required fees for your tuition, accommodation and insurance (if applicable)?
