Lindrick is proud to have been located within Yorkshire for every moment of its existence. Lindrick is foremost a members' club with a rich history, attracting its membership not just from the immediate locality of South Yorkshire, Derbyshire and North Nottinghamshire. The club also has long established links with Sheffield reflecting the fact that it began life over 130 years ago as the Sheffield & District Golf Club.

The 'Vulcan' image, which is the club emblem, is taken from a bronze statue of Vulcan by the Italian sculptor Mario Raggi. This impressive statue can still be seen today on the tower of Sheffield's Town Hall and symbolises the god of fire and blacksmithery which is associated with the steel production in the Sheffield area.

The club strives to maintain both the atmosphere and ethos of a members' club with golf played in the Corinthian spirit of good fellowship and a deep respect for golfing tradition. Here at Lindrick it is all about merging the historic with the here and now to create the perfect setting and ambience.

During winter months, the course is normally open without temporary greens or tees and remains in excellent condition regardless of the weather.



All distances are measured in YARDS to the FRONT of the green.



These figures indicate depth of green from front edge 'o'



L & R indicates the left and right sides of the fairway at the distances shown from each tee



Approach indicates the playing line through the centre of green



Indicates green slopes, with bolder arrows being the most severe



Direction to the next hole




Play your drive to favour the right side of the fairway to open up the green for your second shot. For the second shot play a positive shot into the heart of the green past the bunker trouble at the front.








Play your tee shot on a line just left of the fairway bunker. The approach shot is uphill and best to play right of the flag to allow for the right to left slope of the green and to avoid the bunker on the left of the green.











A testing par 3, requiring a positive shot into the middle of the green. Make sure you take enough club to carry the the bunkers in front of the green.














Aim your tee shot straight at the marker post on this tough uphill par 4. For your second shot take extra club to clear the bunkers in front of the green.

A par here is always a great score!




The green has a right to left slope so aim right of the pin to allow for this.












A par 4 where the tee shot is all about positioning yourself for the second shot. Aim to hit the ball 200 yards down the middle. This will leave you a short iron into a green with subtle slopes and give you a good birdie Chance.














Play your Drive to the left side of the fairway to keep away from the bunkers down the right – the left hand bunker is a good line to choose. The second is to a green offset to the fairway and the pin is often tucked behind the bunker. Ideally play for the left edge of the green with a gentle fade.

























A fairly generous drive but then care must be taken with the second to avoid the bunkers that stand sentry either side of the fairway. Long hitters can take them on and carry the bunkers otherwise play short and down the right side and rely on a pitch and putt for a birdie chance.










Accuracy is more important than length from the tee and the ideal line is just right of bunker. The second is to a small green that slopes away from you and you have to use the marker pole behind the green to get your line. In dry conditions you may elect to pitch just short and let the ball











Aim right of centre from the tee as the natural contours will take your ball left on landing. The approach has to be played with care as the green is narrow with a run off on the right side and bunkers too awaiting to catch errant shot.







A tough finish where players invariably under-club. A straight shot to the heart of the green will be a job well done. A par here is a satisfying end to your round.


