WAAP'S PERFECT PLATFORM FOR RISING THAI STARS

Spencer Robinson, the Asia-Pacific Golf Confederation's Communications Manager, reflects on how the Women's Amateur Asia-Pacific championship is acting as a springboard to global success on the biggest stages in women's golf for rising stars of the game from Thailand and around the region.



It's not by accident that Thailand has become a force to be reckoned with in the elite echelons of the women's game, at professional and amateur level.

Ranging from easy access for juniors and the Kingdom's huge golf course inventory, to a thriving local professional circuit and strong corporate support from companies like Singha, there are a host of contributory factors.

You can also add into the mix the aspirational pull of the LPGA Tour successes of the Jutanugarn sisters – Ariya and Moriya – and Women's Amateur Asia-Pacific (WAAP) alumni Patty Tavatanakit and Atthaya Thitikul.

When they arrived at Singapore's Sentosa Golf Club in February, 2018 to take part in the inaugural WAAP, Atthaya and Tavatanakit were starry-eyed students with dreams of making it to the big time. WOMEN'S AMATEUR ASIA-PACIFIC 2022

Although they could not have known it then, it was to prove a life-changing week for the Thai teenagers, Atthaya turning 15 the day before the championship teed-off and Tavatankit aged 18 at the time.

The history books tell us that Tavatanakit ended in a share of 15th place at Sentosa while Atthaya was crowned the first-ever WAAP champion, emerging triumphant in a four-way playoff that also included the then 16-year-old Japanese-Filipina prodigy Yuka Saso.

Less than five years on and Tavatanakit (ANA Inspiration, 2021) and Saso (US Women's Open, 2021) are both major champions who feature in the top-35 in the Rolex Women's World Rankings.

In the case of Atthaya, a major title is just about the only thing missing from her latest curriculum vitae. In the eyes of most respected judges, it's just a matter of when ... not if.

The stunning success she's achieved to date has not come as a surprise to those that have followed her career from an early age.

Atthaya was already a child star at home when she created history – and a global stir – with her victory in the Ladies European Tour's Thailand Championship in 2017. At the time, Atthaya was aged just 14 years, four months and 19 days, making her the youngest golfer (male or female) to win a professional golf event.

A few months later she once more defied her tender years, displaying skill and composure in equal measures to triumph at the WAAP.

That Singapore success earned Atthaya invitations to two major championships in 2018, the ANA Inspiration at Mission Hills Country Club in California and the Women's British Open at Royal Lytham & St Annes in England where she won the Smyth Salver as the leading amateur, a feat she replicated in 2019.

Atthaya turned professional in 2020, playing mainly on the Thai LPGA Tour that year due to Covid-19 travel restrictions, winning five times. Progressing to the Ladies European Tour in 2021, she won twice en route to topping the seasonlong Race to Costa Del Sol (Order of Merit).

There's no sign of her upwardly mobile career stalling. In her first season on the LPGA Tour this year, the teenager made 19 cuts in 20 events (as of the end of September), posted nine top-10s, including a solo fourth at the KPMG Women's PGA Championship, and claimed two victories.

Her maiden LPGA Tour win came in March following a play-off with Denmark's Nanna Koerstz Madsen at the JTBC Classic. Another extra-time triumph arrived in

Champion Atthaya Thitikul (THA) Yuka Yasuda (JPN) COVID-19 pandemic Mizuki Hashimoto (JPN) the last week of September when American Danielle Kang was repelled at the second additional hole at the Walmart NW Arkansas Championship.

Heading into October, Atthaya had soared to second in the Rolex Women's World Rankings, behind only number one Jin Young Ko of Korea and second-placed American Nelly Korda.

The first LPGA Tour player in five years to win twice in her rookie season, Atthaya, who will turn 20 in February 2023, along with Tavatanakit, are increasingly being cast as ideal role models for the next generation of female Thai golfers.

Among those seeking to follow in their footsteps is big-hitting Natthakritta Vongtaveelap, who came agonisingly close to winning last year's WAAP in Abu Dhabi. There, she led for the first three rounds but finally settled for a share of second place, pipped at the post by Japan's Mizuki Hashimoto.

The 19-year-old Natthakritta has continued to make waves this year, winning numerous titles, including both the individual and team gold medals at the 31st Southeast Asian Games in Hanoi.

Nicknamed 'Sim 300' for her 300-yard drives, Natthakritta has indicated her intent to join Atthaya and Tavatanakit in the professional ranks towards the end of this year. Before that, though, she'll be hoping to conclude some unfinished business when she spearheads the challenge of an eight-strong Thai contingent over the Waterside Course at Pattaya's Siam Country Club in the fourth edition of the WAAP.

She said: "Women's golf in Thailand is very strong right now. We are not short of inspiration. Starting from Ariya and Moriya (Jutanugarn) to Patty and Atthaya, we have had superstars who are amazing role models for all of us.

"The WAAP is the biggest championship we play in Asia-Pacific and is an amazing opportunity for us so early in our careers."

It was not always that way. Some 13 years prior to the launch of the WAAP, Virada Nirapathpongporn and Russy Gulyanamitta were the only Thais to feature on the LPGA Tour.

Today, there are no fewer than a dozen players from the Land of Smiles plying their trade on the world's foremost women's Tour. That's the third most of any country, behind only the United States and Korea.

Since 2016, Thai players have amassed 19 LPGA wins - a title count that includes three major championships, courtesy of former world number one and 12-time LPGA winner Ariya Jutanugarn (2016



Women's British Open and 2018 US Women's Open), and Tavatanakit at last year's ANA Inspiration.

among women in her home nation.

Ranked as the world's top female amateur when she played for Duke University on the US collegiate circuit, Virada won the US Women's Amateur championship in 2003, still the only Thai to achieve that accolade. "I'm so proud of the current generation of Thai golfers and that we are now considered a major force in women's golf. If I had even a little bit to do with that, it is extremely gratifying for me," said Virada, who splits her time these days between coaching and TV commentary work. Should a Thai player be crowned champion at Siam Country Club on November 6, you can be sure that Virada, Tavatanakit and Atthaya would be among the first to offer heartfelt congratulations, along with encouragement and advice on the exciting path ahead. SIAM COUNTRY CLUB, WATERSIDE COURSE

HOLE

PAR-4 369 YARDS

The opening hole requires a drive that favours the left side or middle of the fairway. Due to the dogleg, the best angle of attack into the green is from the left side of the fairway as there is a penalty area on the right side of the green. The green has two tiers and is sloped from back to front.

HOLE 2

PAR-3 168 YARDS

This picturesque par-3 requires a short iron to the middle of the green from which the player will have a relatively good chance for birdie, regardless of the pin position as the green is fairly small and surrounded by two well-placed bunkers.

HOLE 3

PAR-4 427 YARDS

A good drive allows the player to have an easier approach shot to the green which slopes from right to left towards the bunker. The player will likely have a long iron for their second shot to a generous sized green. The right side of the green is the preferred angle to set up a good par on this tricky hole.







PAR-4 325 YARDS

A well-placed tee shot allows the player to take advantage of this short par-4 which requires an accurate second shot to set up the opportunity for a birdie. This hole plays uphill to a green which requires a player to manage the spin on their second shot.

HOLE 5

PAR-4 396 YARDS

This hole has a generous fairway with two welllocated bunkers which will significantly increase the chance of a bogey or double bogey. The bail out area on the right side of the green allows the player to scramble for a par.

HOLE 6

PAR-5 517 YARDS

A generous fairway provides the opportunity for a good drive. The key to playing this hole well is the execution of a strategic well-placed second shot. This hole requires a player to calculate the distance from which they feel most comfortable to attack the hole location with their third shot.







PAR-3 173 YARDS

This can be an intimidating par-3 with a large body of water to carry but provides a large putting green to aim for. The green is very large and will require a player to manage the speed of their putt as the whole green runs from back to front.



HOLE 8

PAR-5 562 YARDS

This is another strategic hole which requires very good placement of the second shot. The third shot will be to a green that requires a player to manage their spin as the green feeds from the back to the front. Any approach shot that travels slightly long will allow the player a good chance to scramble to save par rather than an approach that is slightly short.



HOLE 9

PAR-4 374 YARDS

The short par-4 requires a well-placed drive that would leave approximately 160 yards to the hole location. The green is large and requires an accurate second shot for a good chance of a birdie. Distance management is key to playing this hole well.



PAR-5 526 YARDS

A long hole with a very generous fairway, which allows the player to hit the fairway and concentrate on playing to their strengths by determining the distance they feel most comfortable to attack the hole location on a large green.

HOLE 11 PAR-4

358 YARDS

A straight-forward hole that plays uphill to a mediumsized green. Distance calculation of the second shot is key to setting up a chance of making a birdie. The greenside bunkers will capture any shots which miss the green slightly.

HOLE 12

PAR-3 161 YARDS

The direction of the wind will play a big factor in club selection as this hole will most likely play downwind to a green that has a number of subtle breaks.







PAR-4 411 YARDS

A drive favouring the left side of the fairway allows for a good angle of attack into the green. The green is relatively large, allowing a hole location to be tucked away closer to the edge of the green.

HOLE 14 Par-4

372 YARDS

A short par-4 which plays uphill to a green that runs from the back to the front, requiring a player to manage the spin on their approach shot to the hole location.

HOLE 15

PAR-4 322 YARDS

A short, downhill par-4 which encourages a player to hit their drive close to the green bringing various bunkers into play. The green requires a carefully coordinated second shot as the green runs from the back to front with the left side of the green also feeding towards the centre.







PAR-3 164 YARDS

The wind direction will play a key part in determining the aggressiveness in trying to attack the hole location. It is most likely that the wind would funnel from right to left, encouraging players to aim for the right half of the green which is guarded by two wellplaced bunkers.

HOLE

PAR-4 402 YARDS

A good tee shot will likely carry the bunker on the right, leaving a player with a short iron to attack a large green. There is most likely to be a subtle wind blowing from the right to the left side which makes players wary of the water on the left.

HOLE **18**

PAR-5 581 YARDS

A long and tricky par-5, which requires a strategic approach by ensuring that the second shot finishes near the bottleneck 100 metres from the green. A short and controlled iron will set up a birdie opportunity but any wayward shot will find the water, bunkers or run off the back of the green.
