


## STEPS FOR INVESTIGATING STUDENT USE OF ICT FACILITIES

In the context of the ICT Facilities Regulations for students at Vrije Universiteit Amsterdam

The following steps must be taken to investigate the use of ICT facilities by a student. These steps are in accordance with the provisions of the 'ICT Facilities Regulations for students at Vrije Universiteit Amsterdam' (hereinafter: 'Regulations'). These regulations have been adopted by the Executive Board upon approval by the University Student Council.

3.	IT investigates	<b>Targeted investigation and four eyes principle</b> The starting point for the investigation is that only traffic data – also known as metadata – is to be investigated and not the content of files or messages such as might be found in an individual's VU email. If the latter is necessary, additional rules apply. These rules basically mean that files and messages marked as private and that may contain privileged information should be disregarded in principle. See Articles 10.1 and 10.3 of the Regulations. 	4.	In principle, the investigation is carried out by at least two employees of the IT Service Desk (according to the four eyes principle).

Check whether informing student hampers investigation	<b>Inform student</b> The student concerned is to be informed by the <u>Faculty</u> as quickly as possible about the reason, process and outcome of the investigation, and is to be given the opportunity to provide further explanation. Information may be withheld from the student if disclosure could hamper the	Inform student: Faculty

Those involved weigh the results of the investigation 6.	<b>Those involved in the investigation</b> The data collected and the outcome are only accessible – under strict confidentiality – to the <u>Dean</u> , the <u>Executive Board</u> and the <u>members of the administrative secretariat of the complaints committee</u> within the meaning of the Inappropriate Conduct Regulations, insofar as the investigation has been carried out at the request of this committee and the educational law team that has been engaged for support. 6.	Student objects? No Board agrees with objection? Yes Yes Investigation is stopped, data destroyed, etc.	<b>Objection against investigation</b> The <u>student</u> who is the subject of an investigation may lodge an objection against such investigation with the <u>Executive Board</u> within four weeks after being informed about the investigation. The Executive Board is to respond in writing as soon as possible and in any event within four weeks after receipt of the objection, stating reasons for its decision. If the objection is upheld, the investigation will be discontinued immediately and any data collected as part of the investigation will be destroyed forthwith. In addition, any measures will be repealed if they are shown to have been taken unjustly. See Articles 11.1 and 11.2 of the Regulations.	Student can lodge an objection with the Executive Board
